FIRST SUNDAY OF LENT

"THE LORD, YOUR GOD, SHALL YOU WORSHIP AND HIM ALONE SHALL YOU SERVE"

With Ash Wednesday we entered the holy season of Lent. We are now at the very beginning of our forty day journey from Ash Wednesday to the great Easter Vigil. Lent is an invitation to conversion of heart. Every season of the liturgical year is filled with grace but Lent forces us to take a long hard look at our relationship with God, his Church, and all of our relationships in general.

Lent is an introspective season; Lent demands that we ask ourselves demanding questions about what our ultimate goals and values are. What is it that we prize above all else? If we don't place our relationship with God above all else then we have work to do this Lent. And that is why we have Lent every year. So that we are able to focus our attention on being open to the power of God's grace for conversion and so that we accept the power of his love as a means of encouragement and hope. The starkness of the season – with its violet colored vestments at Mass – and lack of decoration in church – calls us to examine first things and to strip away everything that does not serve our relationship with God.

Lent challenges us to internalize an essential truth of our faith: we are not given life to simply enjoy its pleasures. We are given life in order that we might live in friendship with God and to serve one another. Our first reading from the Book of Genesis shows forth the mighty power of God: Almighty God creates from nothing, he brings us into existence through his power: "The LORD God formed man out of the clay of the ground and blew into his nostrils the breath of life, and so man became a living being" (Genesis 2:7). God infuses the breath of his own life in us and we are made to take every breath that we breathe for the glory of his name. But, of course, we are distracted from our God given purpose. It is nothing new; humanity has been led astray from its relationship with God from the very beginning. Selfishness and hubris remain the destructive elements to harm our openness to the love of God.

The serpent in the Book of Genesis can be a stand-in for all of those wrong decisions, those evil intentions, those lost opportunities to live in communion with God that have taken place all through human history. When women and men are tempted to believe that they can take on the status to have full dominion and sovereignty over their own lives it is never a good thing and always has an unhappy conclusion. When all is well, life is fulfilling, and we feel that we know a lasting and permanent peace. It is tempting to think that we have accomplished this all on our own. That is the mentality that the serpent in the Garden of Eden was counting on: "No, God knows well that the moment you eat of it your eyes will be opened and you will be like gods who know what is good and what is evil" (3:5). He was not disappointed, after partaking of the fruit of the tree of good and evil, Adam and Eve realized the folly of their decision: "Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized they were naked" (3:7). Their nakedness is indicative of the lack of protection and help that they needed to live. Adam and Eve had decided to throw aside the mantle of God's love and they were naked, not only physically but spiritually, without it. Now death would exercise its dominion over them. But all was not lost. There would be another opportunity to live in paradise.

All through history, God seeks us, calls us to himself, and asks us to respond to the gift of his love even when we are stubborn and would do otherwise. The LORD sends the gift of his Son, Jesus Christ, into the world through the power of the Holy Spirit in order to redeem us and to set his creation back into proper harmony with him. Though the Son of God, Jesus is also human, he too knows the temptation to power and he knows the inclination to trust in his own power alone. But the Son of God responds perfectly to the will of his Father. As we move through Lent and we hear the readings of the season proclaimed at Mass, we come to understand that God is not only present to us in all of the joys of life but is also present – and sometimes more so – in the burdens we all must carry in one way or another along the Way of the Cross.

It is not coincidental that the gospel that we hear proclaimed today is of the temptation of Jesus in the desert. In the desert, the place of physical and spiritual desolation, Jesus is stripped of all of the trappings of the world; he is alone and in need of God's protection. In the desert he could have easily given into the temptation to believe that a simple affirmative answer to the devil's temptations could have brought him the comfort, even worldly power that could have delivered him from the barren desert. But Jesus, living in perfect communion with his Father does not give into such illusions. Jesus is the model for all of us who seek to put God first in our lives.

Anything or anyone that we let take the first place that God deserves in our life is always going to lead us toward an unhappy conclusion. The final answer of Jesus to the temptations of the devil in this week's reading in Saint Matthew's Gospel is the perfect reflection for us throughout the days and weeks of Lent: "The Lord, your God, shall you worship and him alone shall you serve" (Matthew 4:10). During these grace filled days of Lent, let us pray to put God first in our lives so that everything else in life finds its proper place.

DAILY MASS FOR LENT

So very often, people ask, "What can I give up for Lent?" It is helpful to give up some food during Lent to remind us to purify from our lives all those things that do not serve our friendship with God. However, one of the best things that anyone can do for Lent is to attend daily Mass. Those who take part in the celebration of the Eucharist daily will tell you that it grounds their day and helps them to find strength and peace that they never knew was possible. If you cannot take part in daily Mass, at least think about taking part in Mass on one extra day each week; I guarantee if you do that you will experience Lent and celebrate Easter in a way that you never have before.

WELCOME HOME TO HEALING MONDAY EVENING CONFESSIONS DURING LENT

Bishop Sweeney has asked all parishes of the Diocese of Paterson to emphasize the special gift of the Sacrament of Reconciliation during the Lenten Season. Because confession is such an important way to prepare for Easter, the Bishop has asked every parish of the Diocese of Paterson to have a confessor available on the Monday evenings of Lent between 7:00-8:30 in the evening. I encourage you to take this opportunity to receive the Lord's healing mercy in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. People often say, "I have been away from confession too long, there is no way I can go." Not true. The Lord is always waiting for us to welcome us home to his healing love. Taking advantage of the grace of sacramental confession will change your heart and renew your relationship with the Lord and his Church. Please take this opportunity to experience God's mercy and love through sacramental confession. The Stations of the Cross help to assure us that in our difficulties the Lord walks with us and strengthens us.


The 2023 Mass Book Is Now Open!

Father English Food Pantry **Needs Volunteers**

The Father English Food Pantry of Catholic Charities, Catholic Family & Community Services, 435 Main Street, Paterson, NJ 07501 is in dire need of volunteers to sort food donations and pack bags of food to be handed out to clients at the door. We have gone from providing food to 5,000+ in February to 21,000 in December. We are blessed with donations of food, but we don't have enough workers to get the food organized and packaged to be distributed to clients and two low income senior projects in Paterson.

Volunteers are needed Monday-Friday between 8:00 AM and 4:00 PM and Saturdays between 8:00 AM and noon. You can come for an hour or more on any day. We practice COVID protocols. Each volunteer has a temp taken and completes a questionnaire. We all wear masks, use hand sanitizer, and practice social distancing. The building is sanitized on a regular basis.

Volunteers unpack donations, sort them and then package bags of food to hand out at the door. Volunteers do not come in direct contact with clients.
