

#### TRANSUBSTANTIATION

This past weekend was my first celebration of First Holy Communions here at Saint Joseph Church. It is always a special blessing to give children their First Holy Communions and see how excited and yet nervous they are on this very special day. I only hope and pray that they always have such great joy in their hearts each and every time they come to receive the Lord Himself under the appearance of bread and wine.

Recently, I was having a conversation with a family and they said that "If you asked 100 Catholics if they believed in 'Transubstantiation' I am sure that the majority of them would say 'no!'" To which I responded: "I am sure that 99.9% of the people would not know what 'Transubstantiation' means." So I guess I have the topic for my next bulletin article.

The earliest known use of the term **Transubstantiation**" to describe the changing of the bread and wine into Holy Body and Precious Blood of Christ was by Archbishop Hildebert de Lavardin, (*Archbishop of Tours, 11th Century*). This term was commonly used by the end of the 12th century.

The Fourth Council of the Lateran, (November 11, 1215) spoke of the bread and wine as "transubstantiated" into the body and blood of Christ: "His body and blood are truly contained in the sacrament of the altar under the forms of bread and wine, the bread and wine having been transubstantiated, by God's power, into His body and blood."

During the Protestant Reformation, this notion of **Transubstantiation** was heavily criticized as a make believe philosophy of Aristotle which was imposed upon Christian teaching in favor of Martin Luther's doctrine of sacramental union or just being a memorial.

During the 13<sup>th</sup> Session of the Council of Trent on October 11, 1551, the Church officially defined **Transubstantiation** as "that wonderful and singular conversion of the whole substance of the bread into the Body, and of the whole substance of the wine into the Blood – the species only of the bread and wine remaining – which conversion indeed the Catholic Church most aptly calls Transubstantiation."

This council officially approved use of the term "transubstantiation" to express the Catholic Church's teaching on the changing of the bread and wine into the Holy Body and Precious Blood of Christ in the Eucharist. This was done in order to maintain that Christ's presence is a Catholic truth while acknowledging that the appearances of bread and wine did not change.

Interestingly enough, the term "accident" was not used (which was used by the theory of Aristotle) to differentiate between the substance (essence) and the accident (the appearance) of the bread and wine.

I think this was a shame because use of these terms made it easier to comprehend a very difficult to understand and miraculous event.

According to Aristotle's theory: the accidents of bread and wine, which are the color, shape, size and the taste, do not change. However, the substance or the essence of the bread and wine, which are its "breadness" and "wineness" actually changes. Therefore, the essence changes into the Holy Body and Precious Blood of Christ while it (the species) appears to be the same bread and wine that was in the cabinet just before the Mass.

I find it so comforting and logical that the Lord chose to continue to feed His Church (the People of God) with bread and wine. Interestingly enough, Jesus comes from the town of "Bethlehem" which in Arabic means "the house of *Bread."* I believe that this is logical (at least to me) because unlike many other things in our lives what we want is so very different from what we need; we do not need a new car, a big house, a great job, expensive clothing, etc. but we do need to eat, regularly, daily and often (if you are like I am). And that Jesus chose to feed us with His own Holy Body and Precious Blood, food that we constantly need, is so perfect a tribute to His divinity and desire to feed and strengthen us as often as possible.

So is this a "hard saying" as the Scriptures say? Of course. But just because it is "hard" or difficult to understand, does not mean it is not true. It is quite the opposite, it is literally true and a foundational fact of our Catholic faith which differentiates us from our sisters and brothers in our Protestant churches. Because the Catholic (and Orthodox Churches) are the only Churches which possess the Apostolic charism and by virtue of this fact, we are the only Churches that the authority and power **Transubstantiate** simple bread and wine into the Holy Body and Precious Blood of our Lord Jesus Christ! What a gift! What a privilege! What a wonderful God we have that feeds us regularly and generously!
