WHAT WILL YOU DO WITH YOUR CROSS?

"Whoever wishes to come after me must deny themselves, take up their cross and follow me." Think about that, part and parcel of being a Christian is the Cross! It is not just a beautiful piece of jewelry we wear around our necks or even on our fingers. You wonder why so many people have walked away from their faith? They can say it was the child abuse crisis, they can say that all the Church asks for is money, they can say I do not like Father "so and so." But the real truth is that people are lazy, and people don't want to be inconvenienced, they don't like anything that is difficult, hard, or challenging. The Cross is a stumbling block to their lives, just as it was temporarily for Saint Peter.

Funny what a difference a few days made. Last week's Gospel, we heard the strength of Peter's faith by pronouncing that Jesus was: "The Christ, the Son of the Living God." And this week, Jesus is calling him "Satan!"

We must remember that Peter wanted another King David, a military leader who would restore Israel to its former glory. Therefore, Peter is ok with Jesus as the Messiah, but this Cross thing, this suffering thing, is NOT something that sits easily on his mind or his heart.

Many people feel that when we stopped celebrating Mass in Latin, when we stopped kneeling for Holy Communion, when we began receiving Jesus in the hand, having altar girls, Eucharistic Ministers, and no more fire and brimstone homilies, it was here that we lost the "real" Church and that is why people stopped coming.

Sorry, my friends, but the hard reality and cold truth is that what has changed is that we, as a people, have stopped making sacrifices; if it costs us, we do not want it. That is where free health care, free tuition, free food, free housing, free cellphones, free everything without working for any of it all comes from.

If we are challenged to give more than \$5 each week in Church, we blame the Church for being greedy. If the priest tells us we should go to Church as a family before our children are accepted into Faith Formation, we complain that he has no right to ask such a thing, and he is putting his nose into business, which is not his. He is putting difficult burdens on people's lives; doesn't he know that there is football, basketball, skiing, dancing, and being in plays is more important???

If we are challenged to stop drinking, doing drugs, being addicted to the internet or gambling, then we blame those who challenge us; our families, our friends, and even the Church for being too puritanical, controlling, oppressive and putting limits on our freedom and right to self-expression.

If we are called to pick up our Cross and follow the Lord, do we walk away because it is just too hard, too demanding, and just too much for us to accept.

It was not easy for Jeremiah, nor was it for Jesus. Keeping our focus on the Lord when the rest of the world says we are childish, unimaginative, and weak, is not easy, BUT it is our mission. To believe in something and someone greater than we, this is our calling. Picking up our crosses each and every day is our vocation. It is only when we have a profound conviction of this vocation that we are able to keep focused on our task of being faithful.

For even Jeremiah wanted to opt out and quit. Even Jesus had second thoughts about His mission when He asked His heavenly Father: "Let this cup pass from me, yet not as I will, but as You will" (Matthew 26:39).

Sometimes having the integrity of our convictions means doing something even when we don't like to, don't want to, and it does not feel good.

Sacrifice is NEVER an easy road to travel. Maybe that is what Jesus meant when He said: *"Many are called, but few are*

chosen" (Matthew 22:14). But making sacrifices shows us the best person that we are called to be. It builds character and integrity, two qualities that are as foreign as not wearing a hat inside or opening a door for a woman.

Happiness is NOT doing our own thing in our own way in our own time, but doing what is right and just, what is correct and expected, what is honorable and Christian. It means doing as Christ did while on earth.

What did He do? Jesus willingly and voluntarily picked up His Cross and followed in His mission of redeeming the rest of us!!

The only thing that makes sacrifice better (not easy) is love. Just ask a single parent Mother who works two or three jobs so her children can have clothing on their backs and food on the table. Just ask the elderly man who stays at his bride's side for days, weeks, months and even years when she no longer recognizes who he is. Just ask the priest who, when faced with obstinance, arrogance and incivility and still he commits himself to a life without a family or a partner, without much money and without support, when he challenges his people to do the right thing. Just ask the nurse who goes to work each and every day with the fear of contracting the virus and still puts on her scrubs fearlessly.

Just ask the Police Officer who puts up with no support from his superiors or the public and they still put on their badge and gun to protect and serve us, strangers, who one day might be asked to lay down his or her life for you or your children's safety.

None of this easy. Life is not always a bowl of cherries or a basket of roses. But love always allows us to turn the stumbling block into a stepping-stone to greatness.

Easter Sunday is our goal, but Good Friday is how we get there. The Cross comes before Resurrection and the pain and suffering of life comes before the glory. You wonder why people walk away?

The Cross means that we sometimes have to suffer for our faith, for the choices we have made and for the kingdom, we hope to enjoy one day. The Cross is not a likelihood of life, but it is a certainty. If it were part of Jesus' life, what makes you think it will not be part of ours?

Now the question is: **What will you do with this Cross?** By your presence here today, I assume you decided to stay, pick it up and follow the Lord. So, let us be focused, let us be committed, let us be single-minded in our dedication to the Lord Jesus and His saving Cross.

Maybe many people have lost the courage to be challenged and to change. Maybe we can truly say that Jesus is: "The Son of the living God." But are we willing to honestly and faithfully pick up His Cross and follow after Him?

The Lord never "duped" us, never conned us, never lied to us. Rather, He left us an example of what selfless love is all about. As the Prophet, Isaiah told us: "He was oppressed and afflicted, Yet He did not open His mouth" (Isaiah 53:7).

Maybe that is what Saint Paul meant when writing to the Romans, how we should: *"Not conform ourselves to this present age." Instead, we should: "Be transformed by the renewal of our minds, so that we may discern what is the Will of God, what is good, pleasing and perfect."*

You see the Cross! You know the Cross! You feel the Cross! The only question left is: Do you have enough love to pick it up and follow the Lord?

We adore You O Christ and we praise You, for by Your Holy Cross, You have redeemed the world.

SHIRLEY D. RATTI SCHOLARSHIP

It was the wish of Mrs. Shirley D. Ratti, formerly of Newton, that as part of her Last Will and Testament, funds would be put aside for Saint Joseph Parochial School. Unfortunately, the school was closed and through many conversations with her family and Pope John XXIII High School (who was also left in her will) a special “**Shirley D. Ratti Scholarship Fund**” has been established for any parishioner of Saint Joseph Church.

The following understanding of this scholarship is:

- To benefit K-7 students attending The Reverend Father George A. Brown Memorial Elementary School.
- Students are to be parishioners of Saint Joseph Church.
- Awards are based on financial need or merit based.
- Funds to be managed by Pope John XXIII Endowment Fund, Inc.
- 5% of the initial gift (\$125,000) will be given out each year (approximately \$6,250).
- Awards may vary annually as agreed upon by The Catholic Academy of Sussex County and Saint Joseph Church.
- Initial grants will begin 2020/2021 academic year.

Her parents dedicated themselves to equipping her with the foundational skills she needed to go out into the world.


Kathleen has a very vivid memory of being sick as a seven-year-old when, for the first time in her life, rather than praying formal prayers, she spoke to God from her heart. She looks back on this memory and realizes this was the first time she started a conversation with Him and to this day, that conversation continues. Once confirmed, Kathleen began to take her faith seriously. She went to confession more frequently and she also found herself growing stronger in faith when talking about her own journey with others.

At Christendom College in Front Royal, Virginia, Kathleen earned a B.A. in History and a minor in Theology. Even as a crazy busy college student, she continued to make time for God by going to daily Mass and frequent confession. There she met the Salesian Sisters of Saint John Bosco and was introduced to the possibility of religious life, even though at the time, she was convinced she was called to married life. When she asked God, He made only one thing very clear to her: He wanted her to work with the young!

After graduation, Kathleen worked at a diocesan Catholic School as a second-grade teacher for five years. Not only did she teach the young about Jesus, along with all the trappings of a second grade curriculum, but she also revived the theatre program for the children, a work which is one of her passions!

Subconsciously, Kathleen knew in her heart religious life was God’s will for her as she discerned the idea. Our Lord can be very patient, but He is also very persistent. After a few years Kathleen reconnected with the Salesian Sisters and courageously visited them in North Haledon, New Jersey for a week! In the beginning, she was looking for all the reasons why religious life would not work, but she quickly felt right at home by the joy of the Sisters. She left the Sisters with an application in hand and entered in September of 2018. Sister Kathleen is now a First Year Novice at Sacred Heart Center.
