

A TRIBUTE TO OUR TRUSTEE GEORGE I. HAYEK

(Taken from the homily at George's Funeral Mass)

My dear friends, my name is Father ST Sutton, and I am the pastor of Saint Joseph Church here in Newton. First, please allow me to welcome Father Philip-Michael Tangorra, the pastor of Our Lady Queen of Peace in Branchville, for his fraternal presence here this morning.

Also, on behalf of our entire pastoral staff, please allow me to once again offer my sincere and personal condolences to the family of George: to his wife Agnes, his children his grandchildren, great-grandson, his sister and his caretaker, as you mourn the loss of the Patriarch of the Hayek family.

George Ian Hayek. Where do I begin to celebrate a life that was so full of faith, love, energy, enthusiasm and a wonderful sense of humor? Of course, we begin in the place which George held in the highest esteem in his life: in his Catholic Church.

Today, we gather to celebrate the life and legacy of George Hayek, a Trustee of Saint Joseph Church, a former volunteer of the Father Michael J. Burke Thrift Shop, a Fourth Degree Knight of Columbus, a generous benefactor and a stalwart column placed in the middle of this community. But even more importantly, we gather to do what George loved to do the most, and that is to celebrate the Holy Eucharist with family and friends.

The family chose this morning's Readings from Sacred Scripture where we heard *(George's Grandson Andrew)* read from the Book of Sirach with the age-old wisdom that: *"For the Lord sets a father in honor over his children... And those who honor their father is gladdened by children and when they pray they are heard."* The author continued: *"Take care of your father when he is old and grieve him not as long as he lives. Even if his mind (should) fail, be considerate with him, revile him not in the fullness of your strength."* So, anyone who knows George's children, know they loved and honored their dad so very much.

This Reading has special meaning to the Hayek children for they remember well hearing this passage in the cycle of Readings each year, greatly anticipated by George as his children would poke and kick him, making fun of the fact that one day he would be old and perhaps his mind might fail. But at the age of 94, I can say that George never grew old (at least on the inside) and his mind never failed.

(George's favorite daughter, Patricia) read to us from the Letter to the early Church living in Corinth, as Saint Paul tried to explain how: *"Christ is the first fruits of those who have fallen asleep..."* For just all in Adam came to death, so in Christ, all have an opportunity to come to the newness of life. And this was George's faith, this was his hope, this was his strong, Catholic faith. For he knew that God was truly *"All in all!"*

George was truly a man of many seasons, but the greatest season of all for him was his Catholic faith. George truly lived out the Franciscan notion that: *"It is in giving that we receive."*

I learned that when George was very young and his parents would bring him and his sister and brother around in the carriage, because George was the darkest in color of skin, they put him in the back of the carriage so people would not see him first. It was here that he learned to put others before himself, always willing to sacrifice for others and to serve with a servant's heart, always desirous of living in humility and always putting other people and their feelings first. This is also how he lived his fatherhood with such compassion, humility and great love.

For in his life, he truly imaged the unconditional love of God the Father as he shared this love, this joy and this mercy with his own children. Like a true Syrian Patriarch, George loved gently and protected fiercely. That is why the Eastern Catholic bishops often have crosiers with two opposing snakes in remembrance of the Gospel when Jesus said to His Apostles: *"Behold, I send you forth as sheep in the midst of wolves, so be as wise as serpents*

and gentle as doves" (Matthew 10:16). Daddy was both.

Over the past several days, I have heard of George's business acumen and shrewdness, of coming to Newton with his father and establishing Hayek's Market. Certainly, you can read his obituary and read all of his many financial accomplishments. However, I want to focus only on three this morning; the first is the hotel in Waikiki Beach (which any Hayek child can fill you in about). But each and every time I saw George, I reminded him that we could have been enjoying the Hayek Hotel in Hawaii if it weren't for his cheapness.

The second business insight was when George worked diligently at the front desk of the Father Michael J. Burke Thrift Shop and he would often ask the customers: "Do you know Hayek's Market in town?" To which many answered: "Of course. We shop there often." To which he quickly would say: "Next time you go there, tell my son Dan that I sent you, and he will give you 10% off." Of course, if you think George was shrewd in business, just know that the apple did not fall far from the tree.

But truly, the best business advice George ever gave me was one day when I was visiting the thrift shop on a Friday when he told me that he had a dream that one day the shop would be empty and we would ask our parishioners to bring their old clothing to church. So, of course, I heeded his sage advice and made an announcement at all the Masses that weekend. Well, I think there are some volunteers who still do not speak to me to today, as bags and bags of clothing started piling in that very week. Thank you, George! Maybe I'll have better luck with the 10% discount!

But in all that we say today, I wanted to keep it light and somewhat humorous because George truly had a great sense of humor. I do not know a time of ever being in his company when I did not hear that booming laughter, as he tried to make sense of what I was saying to him in Arabic. He was truly a contagious, positive influence in so many people's lives. It could be a nurse, a doctor, someone in his store, someone coming to the thrift shop, someone he met in church or on the street, he always had a love for people and like a good Arabic man, always invited them to dinner. For being with family and friends around a meal was truly the hallmark, not only of his Syrian heritage, but also of his Catholic one as well.

So, that is why it makes perfect sense what we do today; we gather as family and friends around this altar to share in a meal and sacrifice that has been prepared by Christ Himself. And as we heard His prayer of unity in this morning's Gospel of Saint John: *"May they be one, as we are one, I in them and you in me, that they may be brought to perfection as one."* This oneness, this unity, not only was the moving force in George's life, but it was also the foundation of his deep and profound Catholic faith.

It makes perfect sense that George truly imaged his life after the Prayer of Saint Ephrem the Syrian: *"O Lord and Master of my life, take from me a spirit of hopelessness, sloth, love of money, and idle talk. But give to me, your servant, a spirit of sober-mindedness, humility, patience, and love."* George truly possessed all four of these.

So, as we continue this Mass of Christian Burial for George, let us take from George the great example of living our Catholic faith with enthusiasm, trust, hope and a profound and humble life of service to those in need.

Thank you, George, for your life and thank you for being such a great example of our Catholic faith. *Allah yar-hama-hoo.* God rest his soul.

May he rest in peace, may his soul and the souls of all the faithful departed now rest in peace. **Amen.**

LIFE BEGINS AT CONCEPTION

It is an error to claim, "It's not a human, it's a fetus."

That would be like saying, "It's not a human, it's an infant," or, "It's not a human, it's an adolescent." These are category fallacies.

The proper answer to these assertions would be, "Sure it's a fetus, sure it's an infant, and sure it's an adolescent. It's a *human* fetus, a *human* infant, and a *human* adolescent." These are simply stages of development in the human life cycle.

A human starts as an embryo, becomes a fetus, is born an infant, develops into a child, grows into an adolescent, matures into adulthood, and eventually dies.

Scientifically and philosophically, there is no good reason to believe a human being is created at birth, because *nothing* is created at birth. At birth, a fetus simply changes location and changes its mode of acquiring food and dispensing waste, but at no point does the child become something entirely new or different.

Life begins at conception and proceeds through its stages until death. From the moment of conception, the unborn are human beings.


