Dear Parish Family,

In the movie *Shadowlands*, Anthony Hopkins, portrays the deep pain of C.S. Lewis losing his wife Joy to cancer. In words from Lewis' classic *The Problem of Pain*, he gives us this insight: "God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pains: it is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world."

Pain and suffering have a leveling effect on us. Whatever virtue we might have thought we had at least seems to have quickly vanished. Living with pain can certainly make us experience having little or no patience; or that our charity towards others is contrived, that our anger flares up much too easily, and so forth. It exposes our pride, because pain is such a humiliation. It makes us dependent on others and a burden to them at the same time. Yet, it surely makes us value our health and encourages us to remain healthy. It causes us to appreciate what others might be experiencing in their lives. It is in times like this we can be thankful for our faith, which can carry us through hard times.

Dr. Peter Kreeft, in his essay on "Evil," tells us, The origin of evil [therefore pain] is not the Creator but the creature's freely choosing sin and selfishness. Take away all sin and selfishness and you would have heaven on earth. Even the remaining physical evils would no longer rankle and embitter us. Saints endure and even embrace suffering and death as lovers embrace heroic challenges. But they do not embrace sin.

He also explains, "The Cross is God's part of the practical solution to evil. Our part, according to the same Gospel, is to repent, to believe, and to work with God in fighting evil by the power of love."

A great example of this is the saint we celebrate this Monday, October 1st, Saint Thérèse of Lisieux. She knew much about pain and suffering. I had a Spiritual Director who suffered greatly. Eventually I had to ask how he endured all of it. He spoke of his devotion to Our Lady of Guadalupe and Saint Thérèse. I knew the message of Our Lady, who said to Juan Diego (concerned about his uncle's sickness), "Do not let anything afflict you, and do not be afraid of any illness or accident or pain. Am I not here who am your Mother? Are you not under my shadow and protection? Is there anything else that you need?" But, I had to ask him about Saint Thérèse. I was not aware that she suffered greatly—to the point that would have caused many people to despair.

Her sister, the prioress Mother Agnes, said to her a week before she died, "what a terrible sickness and how much you suffered!" She replied, "Yes! What a grace it is to have faith! If I had not any faith, I would have committed suicide without an instant's hesitation." (Last Conv 22.9.6). About a month earlier she was in such pain that she spoke of nearly losing her mind (CG 22.8.97). At this time too she said to her sister:

Watch carefully, Mother, when you will have persons a prey to violent pains; don't leave near them any medicines that are poisonous. I assure you, it needs only a second when one suffers intensely to lose one's reason. Then one could easily poison oneself. (Aug 30, Green Notebook).

This was a heroic woman being tried at the depths of her being. This was the saintly young woman who tells about when she was about to enter the novitiate to begin her life as Carmelite Sister, that she had to make a General Confession, basically a review of her whole life. She admits that the priest told her that he believed that she never committed a Mortal Sin. He did not stop there. He told her the reason she didn't is that God preserved her. It was not that God took away her freedom or free will. No, he gave her sufficient grace to avoid sin (as he does us); except, she cooperated with it. This was the life the Resurrected Christ shared with her, beginning at Baptism. For the rest of her life she was conscious of the fact that she could have committed all the sins in the world, except that God showed her his Mercy. She believed that he did this because he knew how weak she was. Hence, in the midst of suffering and pain she willingly became an instrument of God's Love-where, she also knew she could have been a conduit of her own sin and personal evil with the world.

Dr. Kreeft says, "the origin of evil is not the Creator but the creature's freely choosing sin and selfishness." It all goes back to Original Sin. We should think about the enormous amount of pain and suffering this has caused. And we need not go back very far in history. In the last century or so, more of this has been recorded than in the history of the world. We witness now that even within the Church we surely find a trail of this.

In today's First Reading, God chose to share the Spirit he had given to Moses with seventy other men, but two were apart from the crowd when God did this. Obviously then, the people did not witness them receiving it, even though God bestowed it. Seeing the results, a man complained, "But Moses answered him, 'Are you jealous for my sake? Would that all the people of the LORD were prophets! Would that the LORD might bestow his spirit on them all!'" (Num 11:27-30).

Moses understood better than anyone else that this Spirit was not his own and he was not to be the sole possessor. No! The Spirit of God is given to us so that God empowers each of us, with his own life, to minister to others. We are called upon to share it with others that they may come to know the Lord, that he may be able to bestow his Spirit upon them also. Jesus instructed his disciples, "Go to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, make this proclamation: 'The kingdom of heaven is at hand.' ... Without cost you have received; without cost you are to give" (Mt 10:6-8).

God wishes Mercy for all, like he did for Saint Thérèse, Moses and others. We live in discord—one way or another. Saint James told why we do in last week's Second Reading (see Jas 4:1-3). To resolve this he says, "Submit yourselves to God. Resist the devil, and he will flee from you" (Jas 4:7, ff.). He's referring to the real battle present—within and out of us!

In different words, maybe Saint James is telling us, become like Saint Thérèse. Let the Mercy of God strengthen us so we can live good lives, free from sin.
