## From the Pastor's Desk

#### **The Sacraments and Sacramentals**

This week I want to explore with you the importance of the sacramentals we have in our church. Sacramentals are "sacred signs which bear a resemblance to the sacraments." They signify effects, particularly of a spiritual nature, which are obtained through the Church's intercession" (SC, 60). The Apostolic See is the sole authority that "can establish new sacramentals, authentically interpret those already received, or abolish or change any of them (c. 1167 § 1)." Some of the common sacramentals are the rite of blessing, the dedication of churches, the consecration of altars, the consecration of virgins and chrism, exorcism, religious profession, the institution of ministries such as lectors and acolytes, the crowning of the images of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and blessing objects such as holy water, blessed candles, blessed palms or ashes, blessed medals, and blessed scapulars.

The celebration of sacramentals often brings about the reality of sacredness and confers spiritual comfort and security to the lives of the recipients. For instance, a pregnant woman may find some spiritual comfort in a blessing she receives from her parish priest before she goes into labor. The wearing of scapulars may precipitate spiritual comfort and security to those who wear them.

A cleric is a proper minister of sacramentals. In conferring or administering a sacramental, the minister must carefully follow the proper rites and formulas approved by the Church (c. 1167 § 2). A local ordinary may in certain cases permit a properly trained layperson who possesses the necessary qualities to administer some sacramentals. For instance, a layperson may be allowed to administer ashes to the faithful on Ash Wednesday for pastoral reasons.

However, sacramentals such as dedication of churches, consecration of altars, or consecration of the oil of chrism have episcopal character and therefore, a bishop is the proper minister. A priest can administer a dedication or consecration only when permitted by law or by special concession as stated. Objects that are consecrated, dedicated, or blessed are to be accorded the reverence they deserve and are not to be profaned or used inappropriately.

A deacon can impart only those blessings that are expressly permitted by law. For instance, the law permits a deacon to impart blessings when he presides over liturgical celebrations, such as the liturgy of hours, baptism, marriage, Holy Communion service, or when he administers viaticum (communion) outside Mass.

A blessing as a sacramental is to be imparted first to Catholics. It may be given to catechumens and even non-Catholic Christians, unless Church law says otherwise. Another sacramental which is often imparted to Catholics, non-Catholics and even non-Christians is exorcism by which "the church asks publicly and authoritatively in the name of Christ that a person or an object be protected against the power of the evil one and be withdrawn from his dominion (CCC, no. 1673)."

## **Words of Pope Francis**

"Let us also remember Peter: three times he denied Jesus, precisely when he should have been closest to him; and when he hits bottom he meets the gaze of Jesus who patiently, wordlessly, says to him: 'Peter, don't be afraid of your weakness, trust in me.' Peter understands, he feels the loving gaze of Jesus, and he weeps. How beautiful is this gaze of Jesus—how much tenderness is there! Brother and sisters, let us never lose trust in the patience and mercy of God!"
