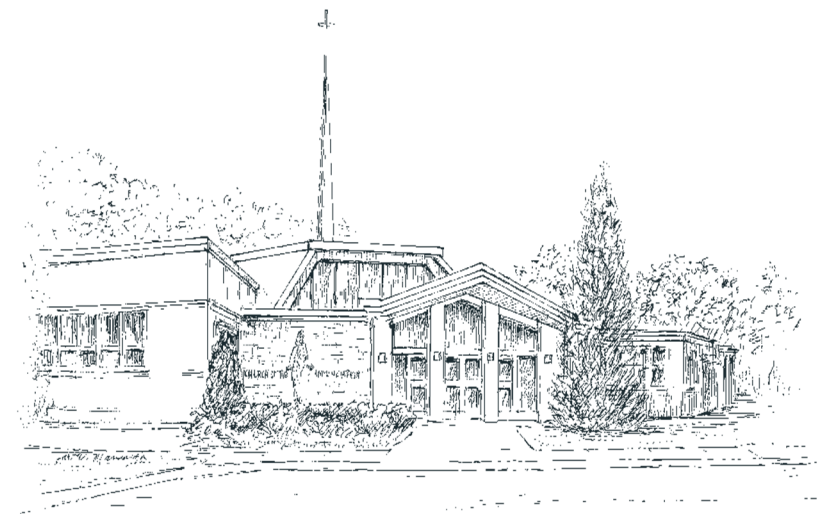

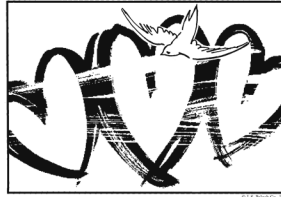

Oct. 31, 2021 Reflection

Scribes, Sadducees, and Pharisees were the three groups of Jews, who were organized in their hostility toward Jesus. All were part of the educated class. They used their skill in language and debate to try to trick Jesus into saying something blasphemous or illegal. We can only imagine that Jesus must have been tired of the insincerity. Tired of answering attempts at entrapment. And tired of answering with respect and dignity.

Our passage today, begins – surprisingly - with a sincere scribe; a scribe who heard and saw Jesus' integrity. He did not allow his personal perspective to blind him. He listened to the considerate and persuasive way Jesus answered. He candidly asked: 'Which commandment is the first of all?'

With over six hundred commandments in the Torah this could definitely be a trick question. By ranking the commandments in some order, Jesus would offend someone.

Jesus was not hampered by any debilitating caution. He answered boldly. He reached into Israel's storehouse of wisdom. And, although only one commandment was requested, Jesus decisively compressed two commandments into one. And then he unapologetically pronounced this new formulation to be not just the 'first' but the 'greatest'.

You will love the Lord, your God with your whole heart, your whole soul, and your whole strength. And your neighbor as yourself.

I assume these words are very familiar to you. For most of us, these words were carved on our minds and hearts at a very young age. Perhaps they are so familiar that we may not even "hear" them! In essence, Jesus asks only 2 things of us: to love God with all our hearts and to love our neighbor as ourselves! Sounds simple, doesn't it? The hidden challenge in this statement may be our inability to love ourselves the way we should.

Most often, I find it easy to love and accept another person just as he or she is. However, I often struggle to "love myself as I am." I don't think I'm alone in that. I'm certain that many, if not most of us, struggle to love and accept ourselves as we are. We know our failures. We know our faults.

It often becomes automatic to criticize ourselves. What do we criticize? Looks? Choices? Abilities? Intelligence? You fill in the blank.

Today I invite you to examine the many ways you strive to "love your neighbor." Then examine the ways you "love yourself." Are you as loving and understanding with yourself as you are with your neighbor? If not, I suggest that you consciously try to be loving, accepting and gentle with yourself today.

You may find out that you will have a much better day when you maintain a loving stance toward yourself. You may also discover that you like it. You may realize that in "loving yourself", you become more patient and forgiving. Loving yourself in spite of the negatives gives practice in overlooking shortcomings. Life becomes more grace-filled and peaceful. Truly loving others becomes so much easier.

Solemnity of All Saints

As we celebrate the Solemnity of All Saints we thank God for the example of holiness of countless generations of Christians who have come before us. On All Saints Day we remember those who have been canonized and raised to the honors of the altar by the Church but more importantly we pause to remember those many saints who have never been canonized: our family members, friends, and so many Christians whose names are known only to God. We would bristle at the notion that we could be called a "saint" ourselves but that is our mission. Our reading from the First Letter of John for this feast reminds us: "See what love the Father has bestowed on us in letting us be called children of God" (1:3:1). Children are often surprised that as they grow and mature they become more and more like their parents. That really is not unusual at all; our parents teach us the faith, they show us how to be loving people, and inspire us to have hope in God's plan for our lives. As we emulate our parents given to us by God, so to do we grow in the image of the God who calls us into existence. We know how to emulate our Heavenly Father by following in the way of Jesus Christ, His Son, through the power of the Holy Spirit. In the Gospel reading for this liturgy, Jesus tells us how to best order our lives by giving us the Beatitudes. In Saint Matthew's Gospel we read: "How blest are the poor in spirit: the reign of God is theirs" (5:3). This is not poverty of material things that the Lord Jesus speaks of; it is that humility that recognizes our dependence upon God for everything we are and all that we need. On this Feast of All Saints, we thank God for the privilege of being like Him and for the gift of working to establish His kingdom of justice, love, and peace in this world.
