

Did you know?

Why should we pray for people who have died?



On November 2, we celebrate All Souls Day, a day we use to remember and pray for all who have died. But why should we pray for the deceased? Isn't there nothing left we can do for them? Well, that's not entirely true. When people die, Catholics believe that their souls can go one of three places: Heaven, Hell, or

Purgatory. Heaven and Hell are pretty straightforward, spending eternity either with or without God, respectively. But Purgatory is a little harder for us to wrap our minds around. The basic premise is that Purgatory is a sort of "waiting room" where souls are purified prior to joining God in Heaven. These souls will not

go to Hell, but they must spend time in Purgatory to atone for their sins before going to Heaven. So we should pray for the dead for a few reasons: 1) to ask God that their souls may be at peace and hopefully in Heaven with Him, and 2) to pray for those in Purgatory awaiting their entry into Heaven. Since their earthly life dictates their path, the souls in Purgatory cannot pray for themselves or get themselves into Heaven any faster, but our good works and prayers for them can expedite the process. Similarly, the Holy Souls in Purgatory can pray for us. So, we set aside

November 2 as a particular time to remember to pray for the deceased, but one can and should pray for them any day of the year!
