

During the season of Lent, the Church urges the faithful to reflect a spirit of penance in their daily livres through performing acts of faith and abstinences.

ASH WEDNESDAY and GOOD FRIDAY are days of <u>Fast and Abstinence</u>.

FRIDAYS in Lent are days of Abstinence.

ABSTINENCE prohibits individuals from eating meat on a particular day. Abstinence obliges all those who have reached the age of 14 and continues to oblige throughout their lives. Those who are not specifically obliged to abstain from eating meat are encouraged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they are able to.

Did you know?

What is considered meat to abstain from on Lenten Fridays?



First, any obvious forms of meat fall into this category, including chicken, beef, turkey, etc. Questions come when we get to a more minute interpretation of meat and by-products of it. According to the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), by-products of meat (ie. milk or eggs) do not count as part of the abstinence because they do not have a meat flavor. While meat-flavored broths or spices are not technically considered meat for this purpose either, the USCCB does say they should be avoided if possible, but are not forbidden. Finally, fish do not count as meat because they are considered a different type of animal (but this doesn't give license to replace one's typical meat meal with a lavish seafood buffet; as they note, that kind of misses the point). Additional fun fact: Originally, Catholics were required to abstain from meat every Friday, not just during Lent. Many people believe that Vatican II rescinded that, but it's actually just that a different sacrifice or penance may be made in its place; otherwise, the faithful are encouraged to continue to abstain from meat on all Fridays, except when there is a solemnity that day. Each Friday is to be seen as a mini Lent, and each Sunday as a mini Easter.
