Religious Education Program Information

Classes will start Sunday September, 11th, 2022 until June, 2023

Registration will start at the end of August and will be announced during Mass and will be posted in the Bulletin, online and Flocknote.

- First Communion

The preparation is a 2 year formation and usually starts in First grade.

- Faith Formation

The Religious Education continues in 3rd grade through 6th grade.

- Confirmation

The preparation is a 2 year program, typically in 7th and 8th grade.

Remedial program

This is a program for the children who have not attended the Religious Education Classes after their First Communion or have missed some years of Faith formation but wish to get confirmed. Fr. Edwin is in charge of guiding the children, 2h classes per week.

**Saints Peter and Paul, Apostles
Wednesday, June 29**

**St. Peter's Church
Mass at 12:30PM**

Peter, rescued from the power of Herod, and, Paul, protected from his enemies, proclaim with their lives that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of the living God.

Peter, + c.64 in Rome under Nero; Galilean fisherman; spokesman for the Twelve who became "Prince of the Apostles"; two epistles are ascribed to him; patron of those in the fishing industry.

Paul, according to tradition, was martyred in Rome c.67; Pharisee who became the "Apostle of the Gentiles"; his letters may be dated from c.50-65; patron of the lay apostolate, the Cursillo Movement and Catholic Action; also of Malta and Greece.

The *Depositio Martyrum* places the Solemnity of these apostles on this date. Both are the principal patrons of Rome and are mentioned in the Roman Canon.



**Venerable Pierre Toussaint
Thursday, June 30th**

**St. Peter's Church

**Patron Saint of:
Barbers and Hair Stylists**

Born in modern-day Haiti and brought to New York City as a slave, Pierre died a free man. He became a renowned hairdresser, and one of New York City's most well-known Catholics.

Plantation owner Pierre Bérard made Toussaint a house slave and allowed his grandmother to teach him how to read and write. In his early 20s, Pierre, his younger sister, his aunt, and two other house slaves accompanied their master's son to New York City because of political unrest at home. Apprenticed to a local hairdresser, Pierre learned the trade quickly and eventually worked very successfully in the homes of rich women in New York City.

When his master died, Pierre was determined to support himself, his master's widow, and the other house slaves. He was freed shortly before the widow's death in 1807. Four years later, he married Marie Rose Juliette, whose freedom he had purchased. They later adopted Euphémie, his orphaned niece. Both preceded Pierre in death. **He attended daily Mass at St. Peter's Church on Barclay Street, the same parish that Saint Elizabeth Ann Seton had attended.**

Pierre donated to various charities, generously assisting blacks and whites in need. He and his wife opened their home to orphans and educated them. The couple also nursed abandoned people who were suffering from yellow fever. Urged to retire and enjoy the wealth he had accumulated, Pierre responded, "I have enough for myself, but if I stop working I have not enough for others."

Pierre originally was buried outside St. Patrick's Old Cathedral, where he was once refused entrance because of his race. His sanctity and the popular devotion to him caused his body to be moved to the present location of St. Patrick's Cathedral on Fifth Avenue.

Pierre Toussaint was declared Venerable in 1996.

Reflection

Pierre was internally free long before he was legally free. Refusing to become bitter, he daily chose to cooperate with God's grace, eventually becoming a compelling sign of God's wildly generous love.
