

LETTER FROM THE PASTOR

The Draw of the Youth to Tradition

One interesting trend that I have been taking note of recently has been the draw of the youth to tradition. I'm seeing it in college campuses as more and more young people are receiving Holy Communion on the tongue, wearing chapel veils, and attending Masses with Latin and chant. I've read articles showing the droves of young men who are entering traditional and ritual Churches such as the Orthodox Churches. I see it in Catholic poll studies which show 85% of men being ordained as priests today in the US describe themselves as "theologically conservative/orthodox" (not to be confused with politically conservative).

At some point or another, many of us have asked ourselves the question, "How do we keep the youth going to Church?" For several decades, a prevailing mentality has been to become the most "up to date" Church. "What the youth want..." we can say, "...are contemporary music styles, a softening of difficult Church teachings, and a departure from odd customs such as fasting before Mass and abstaining from meat on Fridays." The irony may be that in our well-intended efforts to be more accommodating for the youth, we may have been departing from what they actually long for: tradition, ritual, mystery, orthodoxy (right belief), and orthopraxy (right practice).

We are a Church that rejoices in the traditions handed onto us. I think of St Paul as he describes the tradition of the Eucharist in 1 Cor 11: 22-23: "For I received from the Lord what I also handed on (tradetur... tradition) to you, that the Lord Jesus, on the night he was handed over, took bread, and, after he had given thanks, broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me." In my own family, I relish the faith traditions my mom and dad handed on to me in the Jesse Tree, Dia de Los Reyes, and giving up difficult things during Lent such as video games (particularly hard for a teenager, I may say!). All of us have traditions that we return to year after year in our own families because of the memories, connection, and faith they offer.

Our traditions enrich us. They bring us into the lives of our ancestors in faith. They fill our hearts with goodness through our participation in our Catholic heritage. And at the same time, they propel us to the freshness and missionary spirit called for by the fathers of the Second Vatican Council. For by discovering our roots, we recognize that our Church from the very beginning has been in the streets, on the margins, with the outcast and suffering, active and fully alive, and always looking for the lost and abandoned to bring back into the love of the Christian family.

Perhaps one way we can respond to this question of keeping the youth in the Church is not to run away from our traditions, but to lean into and embrace them: praying the family Rosary on car rides; introducing your children and grandchildren to classic Christian literature, music, and art; passing on traditions like the Jesse Tree or Lenten mouse.

I sense that as our world constantly changes to accept the next "new thing", and styles and technology alter every week, that this hunger for tradition is only going to increase. I am thankful to be part of a community whose traditions are so rich that they lead us all the way to Christ himself.

Annunciation of the Lord

The feast of the Annunciation, now recognized as a solemnity, was first celebrated in the fourth or fifth century. Its central focus is the Incarnation: God has become one of us. From all eternity God had decided that the Second Person of the Blessed Trinity should become human. Now, as Luke 1:26-38 tells us, the decision is being realized. The God-Man embraces all humanity, indeed all creation, to bring it to God in one great act of love. Because human beings have rejected God, Jesus will accept a life of suffering and an agonizing death: "No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends" (John 15:13).

Mary has an important role to play in God's plan. From all eternity, God destined her to be the mother of Jesus and closely related to him in the creation and redemption of the world. We could say that God's decrees of creation and redemption are joined in the decree of Incarnation. Because Mary is God's instrument in the Incarnation, she has a role to play with Jesus in creation and redemption. It is a God-given role. It is God's grace from beginning to end. Mary becomes the eminent figure she is only by God's grace. She is the empty space where God could act. Everything she is she owes to the Trinity.

Mary is the virgin-mother who fulfills Isaiah 7:14 in a way that Isaiah could not have imagined. She is united with her son in carrying out the will of God (Psalm 40:8-9; Hebrews 10:7-9; Luke 1:38).

Together with Jesus, the privileged and graced Mary is the link between heaven and earth. She is the human being who best, after Jesus, exemplifies the possibilities of human existence. She received into her lowliness the infinite love of God. She shows how an ordinary human being can reflect God in the ordinary circumstances of life. She exemplifies what the Church and every member of the Church is meant to become. She is the ultimate product of the creative and redemptive power of God. She manifests what the Incarnation is meant to accomplish for all of us.


