From the Desk of Our Pastor

#### Religious Sisters, Brothers, and Priests

Many of us have been influenced by a religious sister, brother or priest. Like some of you I recall attending an elementary school taught by religious sisters who rendered much discipline to my life. I live with a heartfelt memory of a spiritual director in seminary, Sr. Maryanne Huddleston, a member of the Sisters of the Immaculate Heart of Mary who inspired me with meaningful social justice concerns, and brought to light the value of human relationships in the life of a priest. There are other religious who provided much insight into my life, which includes some Franciscan priests as well as Sr. Margaret Foster O.P., a former staff member of St. Patrick Church. My aunt, Sr. Marita, a religious sister of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, bonded with me in a graceful way upon my entrance into seminary as we would often share a holiday dinner and chat about our lives. After 44 years of dedication in religious life, my aunt passed away on the day of my 1<sup>st</sup> year anniversary as a priest, but conferred upon me a wonderful image of a religious sister as she spent most of her years attending to the sick at a hospital and nursing facility in Philadelphia. Unfortunately, the one thing that escaped me in my connection with those in a religious order were the financial needs of these people. I lived with the belief that there were funds to take care of them upon retirement from active ministry.

Next weekend we light the 3<sup>rd</sup> candle on the Advent wreath; it symbolizes joy. The parish gives prominence to the work of many in religious life through the annual support of the Retirement Fund for Religious, which makes a difference in roughly 33,000 senior sisters, brothers, and religious order priests who benefit from this annual appeal. Many of these people are the cause of much gladness and joy in our lives. In 2015, the fund for the Retired Religious distributed \$25.6 million to 395 religious communities for the direct care of senior members. Additional funding was allocated for education, consultation, and resources that enable religious communities to plan more effectively for retirement. An independent study of Planning and Implementation Assistance, a program for congregations with critical funding deficits, found that 81 percent of participants reduced their retirement shortfalls.

Despite the progress and tremendous generosity to the Retirement Fund for Religious, too many religious communities still struggle to provide a modest, safe retirement for aging members. Of 550 communities providing data to the National Religious Retirement Office, only 45 are adequately funded for retirement. Historically, Catholic sisters, brothers, and religious order priests received small stipends for their work that just met the needs of their day. Any surplus funds were reinvested in ministry and the education of younger members. As a result, hundreds of U.S. religious communities lack adequate retirement savings. During the early and midtwentieth century, the Catholic Church in the United States experienced a surge in vocations to religious life as numbers peaked in the mid-1960s. Care for elderly members was provided largely by younger ones. Over time the number of vocations decreased while lifespans increased. The result lead to far fewer younger members available to support the retirement and eldercare needs of senior members. In 2016, 68 percent of the religious communities had a median age of 70 or older.

Since eldercare costs continue to rise while the number of religious requiring care grows, aging religious need your help. Thousands of senor sisters, brothers, and religious order priests spent years working in Catholic Schools, hospitals, and agencies for little pay. Your gift to the Retirement for Religious collection helps provide prescription medications, nursing care, and more. As the church has moved from a Year of Mercy into a Year of Grace, your help in this collection renders respect and compassion to these people who have provided many generations with their gifts of time, wisdom, love, education and grace as many retired religious have offered their lives in service by way of educating the young, comforting the sick, and seeking justice for the oppressed. Today many are frail, elderly, and in need of assistance. Next weekend the parish welcomes St. Margaret Foster O.P. to speak to us about life as a religious sister. Your gift to the Retirement Fund for Religious helps furnish ongoing needs for so many of these people. Please be as generous as possible.

Here's a holiday surprise that only the dictionary can provide. Do you find the word "Xmas," as an abbreviation for Christmas inappropriate? Many people do. Each year at this time, we try to remind ourselves from whence this phrase, XMAS, derives

Keep Christ in Christmas?? Absolutely! But when we read Merry Xmas, we are really being more authentic to the word Christ, than if we were to write: Merry C-Mas." the X in XMAS isn't an X at all: it's a Chi. Chi is the first letter of "Christ" in Greek (and has a CH sound): Χριστός. When ink and paper cost a lot of money, shorthand would be used for economy's sake. X'temmas dates from 1551 and Xmas dates from 1753-that is far before modern secularization. The Greek name Χριστός is also responsible for one of the most visible Christian symbols, the Chi-Rho (see picture) which uses the first 2 letters of Jesus' name. (What looks like a P is Rho which makes and R sound.) There's a long and sacred history of the use of X to symbolize the name of Christ, and from its origin, it has meant no disrespect.

You won't find Xmas in church songbooks or even on many greeting cards. Xmas is popularly associated with a trend towards materialism, and sometimes the target of people who decry the emergence of general "holiday" observance instead of the particular cultural and religious ritual HOLY DAY. We keep Christ in Christmas by our actions and full participation in the spiritual elements of the season. God bless you and everyone as we celebrate the day when heaven touched earth, and the Son of God became a man.
