

The Journey of the Magi from the East

"Epiphany" means "revelation" or quite literally, "shining forth." In the larger Christian family, Epiphany celebrates our Lord's gift to all the world." It is the day we not only celebrate God's manifestation to the gentiles but also recall the time when Magi-three kings — popularly called "wise men"— brought priceless gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh to the infant Christ. The prophecy of Second Isaiah from the First Reading: "All from Sheba shall come bearing gold and frankincense and proclaiming the praises of the Lord" is fulfilled in the Magi's long journey from the east, and their presentation of the treasures and gifts to the newborn child.

Matthew's gospel narrates the travel of three kings from an unnamed land in the east, an itinerary that first stopped in Jerusalem looking for the newborn king. They secure an audience with Herod asking, "Where is he born 'King of Jews'? We have seen his star in the east and have come to worship him." This information was not what Herod wanted to hear! In fact, the news of a new born king will set off an alarm bell for king Herod. After an inquiry, the kings leave Herod following that star and come to a house in Bethlehem and there present their gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. But being warned in a troubling dream about Herod's treacherous plan, they journeyed home "by another way."

The wise men gave a treasurable gift to Christ. Of course, they were completely single-minded and sincere in their gift-giving. Their gifts were expressions of their respect, reverence, gratitude and love for the child. Their gifts were given with no strings attached, no conditions, and no mixed motives. "The story of the visit to the Crib by the Wise Men is a story of giving and receiving. It speaks of how gifts express love between persons, and of how gifts given with love bind people together. But it is not simply about the giving of things (in this case gold, frankincense, and myrrh) but the giving of persons, the sharing of selves." Our Christmas gift giving practice could have originated from the Magi offering gifts to Christ. There is immense joy in giving and receiving a gift. However, Christmas must not just be about giving presents. It should also be about *being present*, i.e., sharing ourselves with warmth, affection and kindness to our family and people. Like the three kings, we should give with no condition but only with pure love. The Magi offered their time and valuable gifts to Christ. What can you offer to Christ this 2018?

BAPTISM OF OUR LORD

This Monday, we will celebrate the baptism of our Lord which; marks the end of Christmas season. We probably wonder why Jesus requested John to baptize Him. Jesus did not have any sins to repent of and the baptism offered by John the Baptist was for repentance of sins (Luke 3:3). When sinners went to John at the river Jordan they did so because they acknowledged their sinfulness and their baptism symbolized turning over a new leaf in their lives and leaving sin behind. Jesus, although like us in every way, was without sin, as the Letter to the Hebrews assures us (Heb 4:15). That explains why John the Baptist objected to Jesus' request for baptism in the Gospel of Matt, "I need to be baptized by you, and yet you are coming to me?" (Matt 3:14). The answer Jesus gave John helps us to understand why Jesus wanted to be baptized, "Allow it now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness."

The dialogue between John and Jesus in Matthew's gospel answers the question Jesus did submit, but it was "to fulfill all righteousness," not to concede superiority. This is a clear sign of Jesus' humility. In his book, *Jesus of Nazareth* Pope Benedict writes, "Sinless Jesus did not have any sins of his own to take down into the river Jordan, therefore it could only have been our sins that he took down into the river Jordan. Naturally no one would understand this at that time but they would realize this later when they understood that Jesus died on the cross for our sins. So Jesus' baptism in the Jordan and his dying on the cross go together; he did both for our sins. He took our sins on his shoulders as he went down into the Jordan and as he died on the cross."

Why would Christ desire baptism? "Christ is baptized, not to be made holy by water, but to make the water holy, and by his cleansing to purify the waters which he touched. For consecration of Christ involves a more significant consecration of the water. For when the Savior is washed all water for our baptism is made clean, purified at its source for the dispensing of baptismal grace to the people of the future ages." Since Christ went in to be baptized, He models and paved a way for all Christians to go into Baptism with confidence.
