Memorial of Saint Francis of Assisi - Patron Saint of Animals

St. Francis (1182-1226) was born and died in Assisi. He was the son of a rich merchant, Bernardone,

received a good education and in the beginning followed the ways of the world. He was taken prisoner in the battle between the Assisians and Perugians and after his release decided to abandon everything for Christ. His father became extremely



displeased at his action and disinherited him. In 1220, he founded a new order which in ten years numbered five thousand brothers. His followers were called Friars Minor because they were to consider themselves as the least among religious. Out of humility, Francis never accepted the priesthood but remained a deacon all his life. He had a great love for God's creatures and called them his brothers and sisters. His ardent love of God merited for him the name of Seraphic.

Exclusive invitation makes the recipient feel fortunate and special but...?

Exclusive is a very powerful word. It is the word that is so prized today. "We want to belong to *exclusive* private clubs. We want to have access to *exclusive* member benefits, reserved for only the elite top tier of the organization. We clamor for invitations to *exclusive* sales at stores, in advance of sales offered to the public, reserved for only their best customers." Exclusive clubs, exclusive hotels, and exclusive invitations sound very good. "Of course, they make the recipient feel fortunate, special, and remarkable, as if they are totally unlike the rest of the huddling masses of humanity." Sadly, the "exclusivity"

divides people into artificial rankings and sets people into unhealthy competition with each other. Exclusivity tends to protect the self-interests of the status quo, and separates the world into the small group of haves and the enormous group of have-nots.

The practice of exclusivity is not new or only confined to our modern day cultural practice. It is as old as the stories in the scripture. At the beginnings of the early Church, the Jewish people felt that God's blessing is exclusive to them. This conception of exclusiveness among the Jewish, consequently, caused problems in the early church for the admission of Gentiles converts into their worship community.

Our readings today from both the Old Testament and the Gospel illustrates exclusive attitude and division among God's people. For instance, in today's first reading from Numbers, God poured His spirit upon the 70 elders Moses had selected to help him govern the people of Israel during their wilderness wanderings. Moses had gathered these men for a retreat outside the camp. When the spirit came upon these elders, they began to prophesy. But two (Eldad and Medad) of the 70 elders were not present for the meeting. But the text tells us the spirit of God, and the gift of prophecy, fell upon those two men back in the camp, just as upon the other 68 who attended the retreat. When word of their prophecy back in the camp reached Moses and the others, Joshua entreated Moses to stop them. And why not forbid them, Joshua and others reasoned? The answer of Moses is as profound as it is gracious; Don't be jealous. And in our Gospel reading from Saint Mark, is a similar story. An exclusive member of Jesus' disciple was casting out demons in His name. They wanted Jesus to stop him because he's not part of their group. "But rather than endorse the stated proposal to forbid this practice, protect His brand, and keep a tighter control on the movement He was launching, Jesus replied, "Do not stop him; for no one who does a deed of power in my name will be able soon afterward to speak evil of me. Whoever is not against us is for us."

Sadly, exclusivity is highly priced in today's political culture. This brings about a lot of unhealthy completions, divisions and ugly practices. In a world filled with opponents and competitors, Jesus offers us a much gentler, kinder, more inclusive way to view the world. He says, "Whoever is not against us is for us." Besides, Jesus' lesson, as we lean to exclusivity, we must also be sensitive to those who have not. Because we may not be in the same political party, the same group or circle of friends, we must neither monopolize the right to do good, nor belittle the good and the great things others do.
