Why should your child/grandchild attend? The office of Education, Evangelization & Catechesis of the Archdiocese of Hartford has summed up CCD classes as follows:

Religious Ed teaches the same concepts and values as Mass but in a fun way that the very young can understand. These classes engage students thru song, books and games all while reinforcing religious truths.

On a social level, attending CCD classes help children make friends in an atmosphere of positivity and love. The classes become mini-communities where students can ask questions and discuss their beliefs with like-minded peers. They'll come to understand that they are a part of a much larger congregation that is equally as loving and supportive.

On a higher level, Religious Education jumpstarts young children's connection with God. Kids are generally more receptive than adults, and if a bond with God is established and a Catholic identity is formed early, they are both likely to last a lifetime. Lastly, Religious Ed classes promote the same feelings of well-being, peace, and hope as well as desire for good behavior that you experience when you attend Mass. When registering your children for CCD/Confirmation, you must also register your family if you are new to the parish.

Lastor's

### "Love and the need to be loved is a very basic and primal human instinct but money cannot buy true love."

Love is Christ's great message to His followers - His parting word. And it is profound. "As the Father loves me, so I also love you," Jesus said. Think of that: how deep and how eternal that love must be. But Jesus then followed that statement with a challenge at once bold and unimaginable. "This is my commandment: that you love one another as I have loved you." How can we truly love others? "Psychologists tell us that we cannot genuinely love another person until we first know how much we are loved. One of the lingering tragedies of child abuse is the difficulty abused children have with love. Why? Because the important people in their lives – parents, often relatives – have turned what is supposed to be warmth and affection into pain and heartache." Love and the need to be loved is a very basic and primal human instinct. In fact, many people spend their entire lives on a quest for it. It is the one thing money can't buy and sadly some people never do seem to stumble upon it whereas others manage to locate the true love. But this is not type of love Jesus is talking about here. He rather calls us to love despite the person, their personality, their looks and so forth.

"Love one another as I have loved you." He said. What is this love He has for us? His love, which the Bible calls <u>agape</u>, is a love that knows no limits, no boundaries, no qualifications. It is an unmerited love that cannot be earned. It is the love we see in our Lord's giving of his life for us. "No one has greater love than this," said Jesus, "to lay down one's life for one's friends." It is a love that never fails. A love that is willing to climb Calvary. A love that says to each of us: "Whatever happens, I will be there." "But this radical, generous love rarely penetrates our crusty, self-centered hearts. Our resistance makes this awkward commandment even more, well, uncomfortable. Our wills wiggle, our palms sweat just thinking about loving other people with such self-giving, self-less devotion as Christ commanded us."

Most of us have little trouble loving Jesus probably the way He expects of us. However, we can joyfully sing of our love for Jesus and openly affirm His love for us. In this sense, loving Jesus may not be all that difficult. But translating our love for Jesus into our love for others is where the rub comes. Most of us can say, "I love God but there are annoying, difficult, mean people I can't stand." Unfortunately, the more you think about what another person said or did to hurt you, the disappointment the person caused you, the betrayal you suffered, the more distance you create between you and that person. The list of wrongs grows, the catalogue of hurts in your mind enlarges, and distance is created.

But, Christ insists, telling us this Sunday to, "Love one another," as I have loved you." Despite your differences, love one another. Despite the hurt someone has caused you, love one another. Despite the angers you are nursing or the grudge you can't let go of, love one another. "The great work of Christian love - of literally loving like Christ. It is giving, when we know we'll get nothing back. it is sacrificing, when we know there's nothing to be gained." The greatest love we can give to another person is when it is unmerited, undeserved but we give it any way. God loves us so deeply, devotedly and mercifully without end. He Carries us in His heart. Thus, the great challenge of this Sunday's gospel is to look at the world around us, the people around us - all those we like and those we don't, those we care for and those we don't, those we respect and those we don't - and love them like that too. On this Sunday as we reflect on Christ's command on love, it again offers us a great opportunity on this Mothers' Day to thank mothers for their priceless love and care for us.
