Sponsor Certificates/Letter of Eligibility:

Letters of recommendation for sponsors of the Sacraments can be issued only to active registered members of the parish who are receiving the Sacraments on a regular basis but also who have completed their Sacrament of Initiation (Baptism, Eucharist and Confirmation)

Preparing to Receive Our Lord in the Eucharist

We can start preparing to receive the Eucharist before we step into Mass by dressing neatly and modestly. When we dress modestly, it demonstrates to our Lord that we desire to show reverence toward Him. The Mass is a banquet where Heaven meets Earth, with God present at all times. Why would you dress immodestly in front of our Lord at His banquet?

Before 1957, it was required by the Church that Catholics fast from midnight before receiving Holy Communion. Pope Pius XII changed the fasting laws to abstaining for three hours from food, but water was acceptable to drink. Paul VI, in 1964, declared that we needed to abstain for only one hour. Thus, before we receive Communion, we need to abstain from food for one hour at the very least. If we are able to abstain for three hours or even from midnight, we should attempt to do so. Of course, those who are ill or in danger of death are exempt from this fast.

Before we receive Christ, we must examine our conscience and ask ourselves if we are free of mortal sin. If we have mortal sin on our soul, then we cannot receive Communion, for it is a sin to receive Him in that state. We can receive Him only in the state of grace. Venial sin does not prevent us from receiving the Eucharist, but it does prevent us from receiving more of the graces that we receive from Communion.

St. Paul says in 1 Cor. 11:27-28 that we should not receive in an unworthy way: "Whoever, therefore, eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord in an unworthy manner will be guilty of profaning the body and blood of the Lord. Let a man examine himself, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup." As St. Paul says, to receive the bread of our Lord in the state of mortal sin defiles the Eucharist. He says we must examine ourselves before we receive Christ, making sure our souls are clean, so we do not commit this offense. Thus, we must receive Holy Communion worthily by being in the state of grace.

When we receive the Eucharist, we should spend time praying and meditate on Christ's sacrifice and the beauty of the Eucharist. We can spend that time thanking the Lord, asking Him for blessings or help in being able to love and obey Him more, or simply adoring Him.

It's summer and everyone gets to play. It's tempting to schedule weekend getaways and forget about church. But Church doors will always be open and there is daily Masses and Sunday Masses. People will say it doesn't hurt to miss a week or two. And while weekly Mass attendance doesn't make you holy, or earn you points with God, it is our best hope for growth in grace. And it does draw you closer to God. What's the purpose of vacation if not to reconnect with family? What's the purpose of summer activity if not to connect with friends and loved ones? And our relationship with God is no different. Use the blessing of slower schedules, beautiful weather and longer days to nurture your relationship with God too. Summer offers us so many opportunities to grow in our faith. If you take advantage of it, you may just find you have a better summer than you ever imagined you would!

We wouldn't expect our bodies to stay healthy if we binged on sugar or never exercised. We can't expect our souls to stay healthy either when we don't feed our spirits the Word of God and experience Him in Eucharistic celebration. From Lastor's

By frequent attendance to Mass-the Eucharistic celebration we express our gratitude for His blessings and favors in our lives.

Dominic Tang, the archbishop of Canton was imprisoned in China for 22 years, from the 5th of February 1958 to 9th June 1980, for his faith and loyalty to the Church and papacy. Of these 22 years of imprisonment, 7 years were in solitary confinement. His solitary

confinement cell was not large enough to stand up nor to lie down and stretch your legs fully. And so, he prayed the Rosary all the time with his fingers. One day, Archbishop Tang was surprised with the news that he could leave his solitary confinement cell for a few hours to do whatever he wanted. His persecutors wondered what he would ask for: A hot shower? A change of clothes? A long walk outside? A chance to call or write to family? What would it be? Archbishop Tang responded without hesitation, as he must have been longing of this every day of his 22 years of imprisonment. He says, "I would like to say Mass!" One other similar story is the Vietnamese Jesuit, Joseph Nguyen-Cong Doan, who spent nine years in labor camps in Vietnam, relates how he was finally able to say Mass when a fellow priest-prisoner shared some of his own smuggled supplies. "That night, when the other prisoners were asleep, lying on the floor of my cell, I celebrated Mass with tears of joy. My altar was my blanket, my prison clothes, my vestments. But I felt myself at the heart of humanity and of the whole of creation." Both stories point to the value and the importance of Eucharist to these men of God. So, on this Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Jesus, may we again appreciate our freedom and accessibility of Eucharist in our lives which we may often take for granted.

The readings on this Solemnity highlight the importance of Eucharist. The emphasis is on the theme of Covenant blood. For instance, in the first reading from the book of Deuteronomy, Moses spoke to the people about their exodus from Egypt and from slavery. By sprinkling of the blood of the animal, their homes were differentiated from the homes of the Egyptians which consequently led to Angel's "Passover" and execution of the first male born of Egyptians. The Israelites made a covenant with God. In thanksgiving for God's delivery, they must honor this covenant and celebrate this Passover every year. In the second reading, St. Paul affirms that Jesus sealed the New Covenant with his own Blood, thereby putting an end to animal sacrifices. Today's Gospel highlighted how Jesus converted this ancient ritual of Passover celebration into a Sacrament and sacrifice. Thus, instead of the lamb's blood, Jesus offered his own Divine/human Body and Blood, and instead of sprinkling us with blood, Jesus changed the Passover and instituted at the last supper the new pattern to be followed. That is the celebration of the Eucharist. At the last supper: "After taking the cup, he gave thanks and said, "Take this and divide it among you. For I tell you I will not drink again of the fruit of the vine until the Kingdom of God comes. And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, this is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me. In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you" (Luke 22: 17-20).

In today's gospel from John, Jesus details the importance of Eucharist to his audience, "I am the bread of life... Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I him...whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life and I will raise him up on the last day." So, our belief in this Real Presence of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist derives from the literal interpretation of the promise of Christ to give us his Body and Blood for our spiritual food and drink (John 6: 51-58). The theologians explain the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist by a process called transubstantiation: the entire substance of bread and wine is changed into the entire substance of the risen and glorified Body and Blood of Christ, retaining only the "accidents" (taste, color, shape) of bread and wine.

Brothers and sisters, on this Solemnity, may we remember the value of attending Mass and receiving communion. Therefore, let us appreciate the "Real Presence" of Jesus in the Holy Eucharist, by receiving Him with due preparation and reverence. By receiving Holy Communion, we become Christ-bearers. Consequently, we take Christ into our family, in our towns and streets, in the workplace, and everywhere. By coming to Eucharistic celebration frequently, we express our gratitude for His blessings and favors in our lives. By receiving Christ in the Eucharist, we take him to our world, we carry his message and become a beacon of hope to the failing world, a beacon of love, mercy, peace, forgiveness, self-giving, sacrificial service. — Fr.
