# **Desperate Widows**

When the Lord saw her, He was moved with pity for her And said to her: "Do not weep." (Luke 7: 13)

Vulnerable, destitute, defenseless—the situation of a widow in ancient times could be heartbreaking. Without a husband to protect her and provide for her, a widow faced danger and poverty. This is why throughout the Hebrew Scriptures, God reminded His people to go out of their way and look after widows. A widow's great comfort, of course, was a son—if she had one. Filling the roles of provider and protector in place of his father, a son could guarantee safety and security. But what would happen if a widow's only son died?

We meet two such widows in today's Readings. Staying in the house of a widow, Elijah begged God to bring life back to her son. And in the Gospel Reading, Jesus interrupted a funeral procession to bring a young man back to life and give him back to his widowed mother. The reaction after each miracle was enthusiastic and hopeful: surely God was with His people! He had come to help the weakest and most vulnerable!

Whether or not we are widows, these readings tell us something important about God. Have you ever felt vulnerable or defenseless? Have you ever felt powerless in the face of circumstances outside of your control? God cares! He who raised up the widow and the orphan cares for you, too! He looks on you with compassion and says, "Do not weep." (Luke 7: 13).

God's heart is moved when He sees you in a difficult situation. In fact, when you can't rely on your own powers and abilities, He can draw you even closer to His side. So let God care for you today. Let Him come into the situations where you feel least in control: an illness, a job loss, the challenge of starting over after the loss of a spouse or child. Ask Your Father to walk with you, put His arm around you, and take care of you.

A FRESH PERSPECTIVE ON THE SUNDAY READINGS HIS WORD TODAY by Rev. William J. Reilly



Tenth Sunday in Ordinary Time June 5, 2016

"'O Lord, my God, let the life breath return to the body of this child.' The Lord heard the prayer of Elijah, the life breath returned to the child's body and he revived....The woman replied, 'now indeed I know that you are a man of God. The word of the Lord comes truly from your mouth.'... 'A great prophet has arisen in our midst' and 'God has visited his people.'"

We use many expressions related to our breathing. We 'run out of breath', we experience 'heavy breathing' and sometimes when surprised 'lose our breath. CPR is employed to restore a normal breathing process.

We read that Jesus breathed on the apostles, when He gave power to forgive sins. We recall a few weeks ago, the Spirit came upon the church at Pentecost. The first story of creation finds God offering His breath, the 'ruah Yahweh' when God gave Adam his living soul.

Today the Word of God reveals two widows, now suffering the loss of their sons. The compassion of the prophet and the concern of Jesus, restores life to the lifeless bodies. Both are returned to their mothers. Did you ever wonder how they related their experience to their mothers, like the popular book of our time.

Jesus continues to restore life through the healing in the sacraments of reconciliation and the anointing of the sick. Both are viable signs of His mercy, offering health, strength and resistance to evil.

# Calling all "Vintage People"

<u>Senior "Vintage" Memories</u> – Attending Catholic elementary school in our parish was different in the 1950's than attending one today. We didn't have uniforms, and our parents didn't pay tuition. The weekly and monthly collections from the parishioners covered all expenses.

St. Thomas History - Rev. John E. Hewetson inaugurated "St. James the Apostle Mission" at the beginning of 1943. The Chancellor noted procedures to erect Stations of the Cross by the Franciscan Fathers for Hainesville. Authorization to secure money for an eventual church in Montague was then given in Dec. By later establishing a residence in Montague, St. Thomas and St. James were to be made into a separate Mission.
