From the Pastor's Desk

What An Encounter!!

A few weeks ago, I was walking in Lincoln Park on a drizzling, late afternoon when I met a man whose story is the reason we have our Wall of Lamentation on the south wall of our church.

I was wearing my Roman collar and this man approached me asking if I was a priest? Over the next 45 minutes, he told me the story of his deepest sorrow and most painful lamentation. A few years ago, he lost his son in a climbing accident. With weary eyes and a haggard looking face, he told me of the hole in his world now. He described having the center of his life torn away by the accident. He declared, "All I have is a hole in my life." His son had been a young man of adventure, hope and promise. Now all he had was an unfillable hole in his world. "My son," he told me, "had a unique perspective on our world. Our world is emptier now. My son is gone. A hole in my life will never be filled."

As I listened to this father standing beside me as we stood in the rain, I thought of our Wall of Lamentation and invited him to follow me to our church. I accompanied him to the Wall watching him write his son's name. I told him our church saw lamentation as a form of prayer and that we would hold his particular sorrow in our community prayer. This stranger was overwhelmed by how many prayers of lamentation were on the Wall.

I received a note this week expressing his gratitude for our Wall of Lamentation and telling me that he went to his church for the first time since his son's funeral. This father asked his pastor if they could have a lamentation wall? The pastor invited this father to build it for their church and he is doing so with renewed faith and commitment to others who suffer loss.

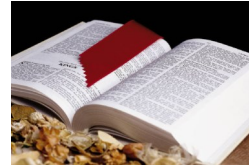

It has been a Catholic tradition as well as a Family Faith Sunday tradition. The Stations of the Cross, as we know them today, developed for people who could not make the journey to Jerusalem to visit these holy places. This is a wonderful time for families to pray and experience the Stations of the Cross together. - Lent means spring - a time of new growth.
- Ash Wednesday is February 18th this year.
- Priests wear purple vestments signifying a season of penance and reconciliation.
- Lent lasts 40 days - the amount of time Jesus spent praying in the desert.
- Lent is marked by prayer, fasting, abstinence and almsgiving.
- Lent ends with Holy Saturday, April 4th, the day before Easter Sunday.
- The third Sunday of Lent priests wear a different color, one that signifies joy! Watch for it!

Help Abolish The Death Penalty In Washington State

In October, OLG's Life, Justice and Peace Commission hosted a discussion night on the Death Penalty and encouraged all in attendance to take action. With the Washington State legislative session in full swing, we now have another opportunity to help abolish the death penalty with two bills that were recently introduced in the House and Senate. Both bills (HB 1739) and (SB 5639) are supported by the Washington State Catholic Conference (thewscc.org). The Mayor of Seattle, as well as the Seattle City Council and the City Attorney, also sent a recent letter urging Seattle's representatives in Olympia to support safe and just alternatives to the death penalty. Experiencing The World Through A Motorized Chair! OLG Delivers!

Seeing the world through the eyes of riding a motorized chair has indeed enhanced my awareness of people in our community with mobility issues. Recently, a parishioner requested that she would like to borrow one of the motorized chairs we have in storage. My immediate dilemma was how to get the chair to the recipient, who lived at Bridge Park, as I did not have a truck or a ramp to transport it. The only way feasible was to ride the motorized chair myself. After fully charging the chair and making sure that everything worked properly, it was time for my test drive as this was my first experience sitting in a motorized chair let alone driving one. Once the test drive proved to be successful, as no children or adults were harmed as I drove through our campus, it was determined that I was safe to drive.

My first awareness was how more vulnerable I felt sitting rather than standing. The sidewalk was not always flat due to tree roots causing breaks and bumps. I was, however, so pleased that our city had the foresight to make safety changes in the curbs as this made my navigation much easier. As I traveled at "rabbit speed" going down 35th Street (my two speeds being tortoise and rabbit), I was aware that it would take some time for me to get to my destination. When I reach Bridge Park and delivered the motorized chair to the parishioner, I was met with such gratitude and appreciation as this chair was truly going to make life easier as well as safer to get around.

I have noticed during my nine years of ministry with our senior community, that many of our community members have various degrees of mobility issues from needing the assistance of a motorized chair, a wheel chair, a walker or cane. These devices all assist our community members to get around safely. This experience has enhanced my awareness of some of the limitations and challenges our community members face with mobility issues. If all of the parking spaces are taken in our south parking lot and you have to use the north lot, it is harder to walk from the north lot as there is an incline as well as the distance. It is also a challenge to open the door if you are alone using a walker or another assisted device.

For me, this experience has opened my eyes and therefore, when coming to church, I will:

- try to park my car in the north lot giving the spaces in the south lot to those with mobility issues.
- Allow myself more time to come to church earlier and choose my seat in the middle of the pews giving more seats in the front pews to those who may benefit from them.
- Be aware of opening the door, from time-to-time, for those who would appreciate that assistance.

These are just a few suggestions from the seeds of my own personal experience and I offer them to you.
