

## **From the Pastor's Desk**

### **Resurrection Life At OLG!!!**

During my Easter homily, I shared with you that Easter is not just about eternal life, as wonderful as that will be, but also, Easter is about God's desiring us to have new and deeper life here on earth. I used the phrase, "God wants to resurrect somebody". As the great prophet Russell Wilson says, "Why not us?" After Easter, I reflected not on "Why not us?", but on the amazing Easter Life here in our parish.

Every Sunday, I look around our worship space and see Liturgical Ministers serving in the choir, as Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers, Altar Servers, Ushers and Greeters. Thank you for the Easter Life all of you bring to our parish.

I sat in on the meeting of the School Accreditation Team with our faculty. I believe teaching is one of the most challenging and important works in our world today. When I witnessed the affirmation of our school and faculty, I realized how teachers in every school are bringing forth new life in students. To be a good teacher is to participate in resurrection by supporting the growing new life of students.

Last year, we had a meeting with the women of the homeless shelter. Our shelter women are true witnesses to courage and commitment as they seek new life during a difficult period of their lives. We are approaching six months in our agreement to host our homeless. Their prevailing attitude is gratitude.

Keep your eyes open and you will see and experience Easter at OLG.

### **Shared Parish?**

Recently, I attended a day long workshop at St. Louise Parish in Bellevue. During the day, which focused on best practices for parishes to deal with the cultural diversity within our parish, the presenters pointed out that during the time of the European immigration to the United States the church played an important role in helping migrants to find a home, keep their faith, learn English and stay connected to their cultural roots. The Catholic Church accomplished this through forming "national parishes" focused on particular national groupings. On the east coast and midwest, you still find a Polish parish two blocks from an Italian parish two blocks from a German parish. These parishes and schools were often the point of welcome for millions of European immigrants.

What is happening today? A quick look around OLG will tell you that immigration is still happening, not from Europe, but from almost every other corner of the world. Many of today's immigrants are Catholic as our European ancestors were. The European immigration of the past brought Sisters, Priests and Brothers with them to help with the "national parishes". Our current influx of immigrants to our shores is not bringing their own national religious support system. Today, we are being challenged to see every parish as a "shared" parish. This shared parish concept is more than providing a pew space, but actually focusing time, staff and resources to our new immigrants to our shores. I hope to encourage our parish to actively pursue being a shared parish. Our parish is everyone's parish. If we ignore our immigrant Catholics, everyone will be poorer for our failure.



## **WHEEL Vigils For Homeless Deaths**

Did you know that WHEEL (parent organization of our women's shelter) gathers with Mary's Place (an empowerment ministry for women and children) to hold "Women in Black" silent vigils every time a homeless individual dies on the streets of Seattle? The vigils began in May, 2000 and are held to honor the lives of those who have died as well as to draw visibility to the issue. When they learn of a death, they gather the following Wednesday at noon at the Seattle Justice Center (5th and Cherry), where they stand in silent vigil for an hour. Supporters also leaflet passersby with information about the vigil and how the community, working together, can solve homelessness. Sadly, this year Women in Black is bearing witness to the highest rate of homeless deaths that they've seen in their 15-year history. "Just as the commandment 'Thou shalt not kill' sets a clear limit in order to safeguard the value of human life, today we also have to say 'thou shalt not' to an economy of exclusion and inequality."** (Evangelii Gaudium, n.53)

## Consider a Donation to OLG from Your IRA

Individuals may begin taking distributions from their Individual Retirement Accounts (IRAs) as early as age 59 1/2 but are required to begin taking them at age 70 1/2. The IRA Charitable Rollover provision, established under the Pension Protection Act, allows individuals who have reached age 70 1/2 to donate up to \$100,000 to charitable organizations directly from their IRAs or ROTH IRAs without paying tax on it. Donors may receive no goods or services in return for their contributions, and must obtain written documentation of their contribution from each recipient charity.
