The Limitations Of Being Spiritual but not religious

WOW! What Changes In A Few Years

Recently, I came across this startling yet not surprising information regarding the average age of priests:

1970 - 35	During my ministerial years, I have lived through this change and in fact I am probably the next
1985 - 52	statistic of being 69. I hope this helps us to understand
1993 - 57	why the Archdiocese is planning to keep
2001- 61	parishes alive, not only with fewer priests but
2009- 63	with old priests like me. These figures come from the Center for Applied Research.

Missionary Discipleship

What will it take for our parish to be involved in the South Seattle Plan for the new arrangement of staffing parishes with fewer priests and the re-aligning of parishes? A term you will hear frequently is that of Missionary Discipleship. This phrase is drawn from the experience of the biblical disciples and the beginning of the new communities we read about in the Scriptures. We see disciples picking up and changing their lives to follow Jesus on his journey. The disciples going back to fish again where they had fished all night long. This took faith and a willingness to learn new approaches to life and to discover what it would mean to follow Jesus more deeply. As the South Seattle Plan emerges, we will all need to let some things go in order to find the fish and be more effective parishes. Many of the details of this plan will be worked out during this fall and spring. Missionary Discipleship was a challenge during Jesus' ministry and it will be a challenge today, but it produced great fruit as the Gospel spread to every land and nation. Pray that we all deepen our response to the call to be Missionary Disciples in the spirit of Pope Francis.

OLG Debt Could Be Paid Off If

If I had a dollar for every person who has told me, "Father, I am spiritual but not religious.": In our contemporary society, and yes in many families connected to our parish and school, this is a common thought. I offer this article by Rabbi David Wolpe for your thought and prayer. You may even wish to share it with a spiritual person you know. Fr. Jack

Do you like feeling good without having to act on your feeling? Boosting your self-esteem no matter your competence or behavior? Then I've got the religious program for you.

According to the latest Pew report, almost one in five Americans identify themselves as "spiritual but not religious." In other words, they have some feeling, some intuition of something greater, but feel allergic to institutions. Yet, as we approach Passover and Easter, it's important to remember that it is institutions and not abstract feelings that tie a community together and lead to meaningful change.

All of us can understand institutional disenchantment. Institutions can be slow, plodding, dictatorial; they can both enable and shield wrongdoers. They frustrate our desires by asking us to submit to the will of others.

But, institutions are also the only mechanism human beings know to perpetuate ideologies and actions. If books were enough, why have universities? If guns enough, why have a military? If self-governance is enough, let's get rid of Washington. The point is that if you want to do something lasting in this world, you will recall the wise words of French Catholic writer Charles Péguy: "Everything begins in mysticism and ends in politics." Got a vision? Get a blueprint.

Spirituality is an emotion. Religion is an obligation. Spirituality soothes. Religion mobilizes. Spirituality is satisfied with itself. Religion is dissatisfied with the world. Religious create aid organizations; as Nicholas Kristof pointed out in a column in the New York Times two years ago, the largest U.S.-based international relief and development organization is not Save the Children or Care, it's World Vision, a Seattle-based Christian group.

Aid organizations involve institutions as well, and bureaucracies, and—yes—committee meetings. There is something profoundly, well, spiritual about a committee meeting. It involves individuals trying together to sort out priorities, to listen and learn from one another, to make a difference. I have found too often that when people say, "I stay away from the synagogue - too much politics," what they mean is that they did not get their way. Institutions enable but they also frustrate, as do families and every other organized sector of human life. If you want frictionless, do it alone.

To be spiritual but not religious confines your devotional life to feeling good. If we have learned one thing about human nature, however, it is that people's internal sense of goodness does not always match their behavior. To know whether your actions are good, a window is a more effective tool than a mirror. Ask others. Be part of a community. In short, join. Being religious does not mean you have to agree with all the positions and practices of your own group; I don't even hold with everything done in my own synagogue, and I'm the rabbi. But it does mean testing yourself in the arena of others.

No one expects those without faith to obligate themselves to a religious community. But for one who has an intuition of something greater than ourselves to hold that this is a purely personal truth, that it demands no communal searching and struggle, no organization to realize its potential in this world, straddles the line between narcissistic and solipsistic. If the spirit moves you to goodness, that is wonderful. For too many, though, spirituality is a VIP card allowing them to breeze past all those wretched souls waiting in line or doing the work. Join in; together is harder, but together is better.

- 100% polyester thread any color.
- Cutting wheels.

You can bring any donation to the parish office between 9:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The beautiful quilts that you see in the back of our church are quilts made by our Prayers and Squares ministry team which meets on the first Tuesday of each month from 1:00 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. in the Parish Pastoral Center. If you want to join our ministry, please call the parish office at 206-935-0358. It does not matter if you have been a quilter for years or have no experience and just want to learn, please come and fellowship with some wonderful ladies who serve our community so faithfully.

Quilts become prayer quilts as a result of the prayers that are tied into them. When a request for a prayer quilt is made from a family, we ask for any special prayer intentions that we can make available for our community to pray for when tying the prayer knots. When the prayer quilt is presented, they can feel each prayer by all of the prayer knots that are tied just for them. Here is what you do:

- Pick up untied thread and make a square knot (right over left, then left over right). Pull the knot firmly against the surface of the quilt.
- Offer a prayer for the person who will receive the quilt. Please remember that person in your regular prayers throughout the week.


