Reflecting on his life and works on my book shelves, I see his call to all of us to bring our daily work and lives to be congruent with our belief in Jesus Christ. The gospel is always calling to a new and more abundant life. Petersen refers to parishes and the people of God as the topsoil where God works in our lives.



OLG is excited to host "The Detention Lottery", an immersive drama written by attorney/playwright Margaret O'Donnell. This educational play is performed by immigration attorneys who also helped with the detainee profiles. Come join us for a realistic day in Immigration Court with real stories and real outcomes. During the performance, audience members (or their randomly selected, fictional family member) will be detained and have their merit for relief from deportation determined by an immigration judge (you can opt for a U.S. passport and just be an



observer). The goal is to promote greater understanding of our immigration enforcement system, as well as empower participants to stand up for immigrant protections and rights.

Catholic Bishops Endorse Initiative 1639 To Support Gun Violence Prevention

Highlighting the sacredness of human life, the Catholic Bishops of Washington State issued a statement today endorsing Initiative 1639 on gun violence prevention. The Bishops acknowledged the importance of individual liberties such as gun ownership, while pointing out that the U.S. Catholic Church has long supported reasonable measures to ensure a higher level of public safety. Initiative 1639 would strengthen gun sale background checks, require safety training, extend waiting periods for semi-automatic weapons, and establish safe-storage conditions for gun owners. Additionally, I-1639 would prohibit the sale of assault rifles to people under the age of 21. The full statement is available at WACatholics.org.


