

Pastor's Page



Dear Friends in Christ,

Each year toward the end of September and the beginning of October, the Catholic Church calls all her children to remember and to be renewed in one of the most ancient and important ministries that make up the mission Christ summoned his disciples to carry out in his name. I am referring here to the ministry of “catechesis” (e. g., Matthew 28:16-20). The term catechesis comes from a Greek word that literally means “to echo.” A catechist is one who echoes the voice of Christ in proclaiming and teaching the Gospel the Lord himself announced and taught. It is through catechesis that the Good News of Christ is transmitted to others, that the seeds of the Gospel are planted, nurtured, and cultivated in the minds and hearts of children, youth and adults, so that they might come to believe in Christ, and to follow him in faith that leads to eternal life.

This year, what is known as **Catechetical Sunday** will be observed and celebrated at OLG at all our Masses for the 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time—October 1st/2nd. Prayers will be offered for those who are taking on the formal ministry of catechesis via the teaching and guidance they will offer in our Faith Formation Programs for Children and Families, in our sacramental preparation processes for First Reconciliation, First Communion, Confirmation and the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults, and in all the ways that we strive to pass on our faith in relation to the spiritual questions and moral challenges of contemporary life. And while there are those who respond in a more direct and explicit manner by offering themselves as catechists, and who undergo training and formation for catechetical ministry, it is also important to recognize that every Christian is called to be a catechist in the sense that we are all meant by Christ to echo his truth as we follow his way and share his life. As Saint Francis of Assisi is alleged to have said, “Proclaim that Gospel at all times, if necessary, use words.” We all echo the gospel, or fail to, in the ways we speak to others. We all reflect the Gospel, or fail to, in the way we interact with others. We all proclaim and spread the Gospel, or fail to, by the quality of faith, hope and love with which we live our lives.

I believe that one of the most critical and urgent needs facing us as Catholics today is for all of us to grow in our understanding of our Catholic faith and in our ability to “echo” it compellingly and persuasively to others. To this end, I would urge everyone to read books and magazines pertaining to our Catholic faith, to listen to and to watch audio-visual resources that can help you to appreciate Catholicism’s richness and depth, to prayerfully ask the Holy Spirit to kindle in our lives that fire of faith which enlightened and energized the first apostles at Pentecost, and to find one aspect of the many-faceted catechesis that is offered at OLG, and get involved in it. May this year’s Catechetical Sunday be an occasion of renewal and revitalization for us all as we answer the call to catechesis and thereby become more fruitful and effective echoers of Christ’s Gospel.



Responding to mass Incarceration in the U.S.

Over the summer, a new social justice ministry began after a group of parishioners finished studying 3 courses of JustFaith's Racial Justice curriculum. Deeply impacted by the curriculum, the HEART (Healing, Equity, and Anti-Racism Team) ministry was born. As one of our first initiatives, HEART plans to launch a One Parish, One Prisoner (OPOP) ministry in November, but first we need to hear from our you, the Our Lady of Guadalupe community. On October 9th and 16th (after the 11:00 a.m. Mass), the HEART team will host discernment meetings to answer your questions, determine interest, and assess our parish's capacity to support this initiative here at OLG. To hear more details, we have the pleasure of hosting Joe Cotton as our speaker during all Masses on **October 8th and 9th**; Joe is the co-founder of OPOP and head of the Seattle Archdiocesan Criminal Justice Ministry.

One Parish, One Prisoner "seeks to equip parishes... to build supportive pre-release relationships with just one person returning to their community from prison. DEDICATION AND BLESSING OF OUR NEW BLESSED SACRAMENT CHAPEL AND TABERNACLE OCTOBER 8-9 (at all Masses)

"And the Word became flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1:14)

PART I: Historical Perspective

In preparation for this special occasion, we will explore the history, meaning and significance of our new tabernacle and the Blessed Sacrament Chapel for our parish. This week we will look at the history of the tabernacle.

"The incarnation is not merely a historical event. It is a present reality. The evangelist, John, writes that the Word 'became flesh and dwelt among us'" (Cardinal Donald Wuerl). The English word *dwelt* is not the best translation of the Greek original, *eskenosen*, which means "pitched his tent among us" or "tabernacled among us". During Old Testament times, the Chosen People recognized God's presence in their midst in the portable sanctuary (or tabernacle) of the Ark of the Covenant which carried the Ten Commandments. In fact, they constructed a cloth canopy above the Ark, similar to a tent. Once the people settled in the Promised Land, they built a Temple where the Ark was reserved in the Holy of Holies.



As Christians, we recognized Jesus Christ as God's presence in our midst which we celebrate in the Mass. Our faith in the real presence of Christ in the Eucharist and the respect shown to this sacrament led to the particular care in providing a sacred place in which the remaining hosts were kept after the conclusion of the Mass. And thus, for the Catholic Church, we understand the tabernacle as the place of Jesus' abiding presence, where the consecrated hosts are reserved for the communion of the sick, for those unable to attend the Sunday celebration, and as Viaticum for the dying. As early as 155 AD there are references to the practice of taking communion to the homebound. The Church Fathers gave careful instructions for reservation of the Blessed Sacrament which shows reverence and manifests their deep faith in the Eucharist. **"The consecrated bread must be reserved because it is Christ; and Christ must be adored because he is God"** (Catechism of the Catholic Church #1418).
