

## FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK:



As I am writing this, I am sitting in the parish hall at St. Paschal Baylon Church, just up the street from St. Benedict. The priests of the Diocese of Oakland are gathered for their Fall Clergy Study Days, and the focus is on Presbyteral Unity, or how priests working in the diocese are called to journey together.

There are so many things that divide us as priests in the East Bay. Many of us are defined by the events which dictated the life of the church over the past 50 years, such as the Second Vatican Council, the election and papacy of John Paul II, and perhaps now the papacy of Francis. As priests in the East Bay, we are also defined by where we were born and raised, and where we received our theological training.

Folks here at St. Benedict have been blessed by having the best of both worlds. Previous pastors such as Fathers Bill Kennedy, Paul Vassar, Jay Matthews, and today myself, are native Berkeley/Oakland folks, born and raised, and all of us trained and educated at St. Patrick's Seminary in Menlo Park.

St. Benedict has also been graced by the presence and ministry of Fathers Bert Aronyu and Benedict Ehinack, who bring a global perspective to our parish, and they enrich the preaching and sacramental life of the Catholic community in the East Bay.

As people are drawn to the Bay Area from all over the world, priests from throughout the globe are also attracted to the Bay Area, and in particular the East Bay, due to its educational opportunities, gentle climate, and a diverse, progressive and hospitable populace.

The influx of foreign-born priests has not been without issue. Throughout the diocese, I hear complaints about parishioners unable to understand their priests, or that cultural issues around the treatment of women and clericalism can make such situations problematic. But for the most part, and in the overwhelming majority of parishes in the diocese, the diverse presence of clergy has been a positive experience.

This clergy study day was an opportunity to know the many priests of the diocese, most of whom are foreign-born, and ordained after 1995. They tend to be fairly conservative theologically and politically, which often leads to much disagreement. However, the intent of the study day was to find ways that we can bond together as priests working in the East Bay.

Much of the small-group discussions focused on practical ways that we can connect fraternally, through mutual respect, understanding, acceptance, inter-parish cooperation, trust, sharing scarce resources, sensing the needs of our Catholic faithful and how we need to respond as clergy. Also discussed was the need to decrease jealousy and gossip among us, and to share social time with other priests outside of structured events such as clergy study days.

Many of us who were trained in the post-Vatican II church have worked for a more inclusive church, one where the talents of laity, particularly women, are nurtured and affirmed. Influenced by Jesus' universal call to a lived faith, and aware of the East Bay's uniquely expansive vision of inclusivity and justice, we continue to strive for that here in the Diocese of Oakland, and I hope that we continue to those ends here at St. Benedict, building on the work done by my predecessors, especially Fathers Jay Matthews and Paul Vassar. Please pray for us, that we may always be faithful to God's call in our lives!

# October 25, 2015 THIRTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

## READING I Jeremiah 31:7-9

Thus says the LORD: Shout with joy for Jacob, exult at the head of the nations; proclaim your praise and say: The LORD has delivered his people, the remnant of Israel. Behold, I will bring them back from the land of the north; I will gather them from the ends of the world, with the blind and the lame in their midst, the mothers and those with child; they shall return as an immense throng. They departed in tears, but I will console them and guide them; I will lead them to brooks of water, on a level road, so that none shall stumble. For I am a father to Israel, Ephraim is my first-born.

# RESPONSORIAL PSALM Psalm 126:1-2, 2-3, 4-5, 6 (3)

R. The Lord has done great things for us; we are filled with joy.

When the LORD brought back the captives of Zion, we were like men dreaming.

Then our mouth was filled with laughter, and our tongue with rejoicing. R.

Then they said among the nations,
"The LORD has done great things for them."
The LORD has done great things for us;
we are glad indeed. R.

Restore our fortunes, O LORD, like the torrents in the southern desert. Those that sow in tears shall reap rejoicing. R.

Although they go forth weeping, carrying the seed to be sown, they shall come back rejoicing, carrying their sheaves. R.

#### READING II Hebrews 5:1-6

Brothers and sisters: Every high priest is taken from among men and made their representative before God, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal patiently with the ignorant and erring, for he himself is beset by weakness and so, for this reason, must make sin offerings for himself as well as for the people. No one takes this honor upon himself but only when called by God, just as Aaron was. In the same way, it was not Christ who glorified himself in becoming high priest, but rather the one who said to him:

You are my son:
this day I have begotten you;
just as he says in another place:
You are a priest forever
according to the order of Melchizedek.

#### GOSPEL Mark 10:46-52

As Jesus was leaving Jericho with his disciples and a sizable crowd, Bartimaeus, a blind man, the son of Timaeus, sat by the roadside begging. On hearing that it was Jesus of Nazareth, he began to cry out and say, "Jesus, son of David, have pity on me." And many rebuked him, telling him to be silent. But he kept calling out all the more, "Son of David, have pity on me." Jesus stopped and said, "Call him." So they called the blind man, saying to him, "Take courage; get up, Jesus is calling you." He threw aside his cloak, sprang up, and came to Jesus. Jesus said to him in reply, "What do you want me to do for you?" The blind man replied to him, "Master, I want to see." Jesus told him, "Go your way; your faith has saved you." Immediately he received his sight and followed him on the way.

# Practice of Faith

Mark describes Bartimaeus sitting alongside Jesus's fateful road to Jerusalem. Bartimaeus began with enough faith to call Jesus "Son of David" and to beg for help. When Jesus gave him sight, Bartimaeus's faith increased to the point that he chose to follow Jesus on the road toward the Cross and Resurrection. • The song "Amazing Grace" proclaims "I once was blind, but now I see." Use your journal to describe one time when God opened your eyes to greater faith or understanding. • Together with your faith group or a friend, read and discuss numbers 515 and 517 of the Catechism of the Catholic Church. Share your experience of encounters with the mystery of Christ that have brought you growth in faith. • The crowds tried to hush Bartimaeus. This week, make a point of seeing people who are crying out and respond to them or help them find someone who can help.

# Scripture Insights

Today's First Reading is from a section of the Book of Jeremiah, the prophet, referred to as the book of consolation (30:1—31:40). It offers a hopeful view of the future, when God will rescue Israel. That time will be like a new exodus. God, like a loving parent, will gather and guide Israel. Among the returning people are the blind and lame, the poor, the humble, those without status or power who depend upon God as their sole source of hope and help. These people are traditionally referred to in the Old Testament as the *anawim*.

Mark's Gospel account for this Sunday tells us about one of the anawim, Bartimaeus, a blind man outside Jericho. Bartimaeus demonstrates his incipient faith by calling out to Jesus, in spite of the disciples' efforts to silence him. In turn, Jesus calls Bartimaeus, inviting him to come forward toward Jesus and also to move toward insight, relationship, and faith. When he hears Jesus's voice, Bartimaeus springs up, an expression of his readiness and hope. In response to his approach, Jesus poses his question, and Bartimaeus requests his sight. Mark tells us that he immediately receives it and follows Jesus on the way. Of course the sight he received isn't just physical vision, but the insight of faith that each of us receives with our call from and encounter with God. Faith and spiritual sight set Bartimaeus on a new path; he couldn't go back to live as he had, nor can we after an encounter with God. We simply must accompany Jesus into our hopeful future.

Like all Second Readings, today's passage from the Letter to the Hebrews, is a *lectio continua*—that is, a selection that follows last week's excerpt. Thus the theme of Jesus as the great high priest appears again: Christ, in his humility, as one of the *anawim*, did not glorify himself. The Father exalted him.
