



FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



In today's Gospel, James and John ask Jesus if they could sit at his right and at his left when he comes into his glory. Like many of the Jews of that day, these two brothers were expecting a political / military Messiah through whom God would defeat their enemies, conquer the world, and establish a reign of justice and peace (that's what they meant when they talked about Jesus coming into his glory).

The seats on either side of the royal throne were places of honor that the king reserved for the prime minister and the prince successor. Those who sat in these seats were in a very powerful position because, unlike everyone else who had to request a special audience with the king and perhaps wait days or weeks for the opportunity to talk with him, the prime minister and the prince successor just had to lean over and whisper in the king's ear. So we can conclude that James' and John's request to sit at Jesus' right and left was nothing less than a bold attempt to gain power by trying to get Jesus to ensure that they would occupy the places of honor when Jesus, the Messiah, established his kingdom. There are two explanations why James and John thought they deserved special treatment.

Scripture scholars believe James and John were probably part of Jesus' inner circle of disciples because whenever the Gospels list the twelve apostles, they always name Peter first, and then James and John second and third. It seems as if Jesus favored these three apostles and even allowed them to witness events the other apostles did not (or example the Transfiguration and when Jesus brought a little girl back to life).

According to three of the Gospels (Matthew, Mark and Luke), James and John were fishing with their father Zebedee and the hired hands when Jesus called them to be his disciples. Zebedee's fishing business must have been providing him with a comfortable living if he was able to employ his own sons, but others as well. Since James and John were from a more financially prosperous family than most people, including the other apostles, they may have thought that they were better and deserved special and preferable treatment or honors.

Tradition tells us that all of the apostles were martyred except John. But today's Gospel ends with Jesus predicting that John, too, would die for his faith. Was John a martyr or did he live to a ripe old age? No one knows for sure.

The apostles experienced petty jealousies and they competed for Jesus' attention and approval. Jesus told them not to worry about who was the greatest but to focus on serving others. Who or whom is God calling you to serve?

As I am writing this, the priests of the Diocese of Oakland are preparing to gather for their Fall Clergy Study Day / Mini-convocation (this Monday to Wednesday) and the focus is on how priests working in the diocese are called to journey together, alongside with their staffs, in order to provide quality ministry with our East Bay Catholic communities. This three-day mini convocation will take place both at San Damiano Retreat Center in Danville, and at St. Isidore Parish in Danville. Joining me for the Tuesday parish staff session at St. Isidore will be Dianne Cola (Pastoral Associate), Dr. Chiquita Tuttle (Parish Pastoral Council Chair), Ofelia Wanzer (CCD Director), and Deacon Ron Tutson. Parishes are allowed four staff members to accompany the pastor.

There are so many things that divide us as priests and parishes in the East Bay. Many of us are defined by the events which dictated the life of the church over the past 50 years, such as the Second Vatican Council, the election and papacy of John Paul II, and perhaps now the papacy of Francis. As priests in the East Bay, we are also defined by where we were born and raised, and where we received our theological training. Added to this dynamic is the

particular characteristic that distinguishes St. Benedict from other Catholic parishes in the East Bay - namely our African American identity, which we share with St. Columba and St. Patrick, also in Oakland. Folks here at St. Benedict have been blessed by having the best of both worlds. Previous pastors such as Fathers Bill Kennedy, Paul Vassar, Jay Matthews, and today myself, are native Berkeley/Oakland folks, born and raised, and all of us trained and educated at St. Patrick's Seminary in Menlo Park. Fr. Vince Cotter, who has joined us in his retirement, is a native of San Francisco, and was ordained as a Salesian, but joined the Diocese of Oakland some years later.

St. Benedict has also been graced by the presence and ministry of Fathers Bert Aronyu, Benedict Ehinack, Sylvester Odirunde, and Aris Martin, who bring a global perspective to our parish, and they enrich the preaching and sacramental life of the Catholic community in the East Bay.

As people are drawn to the Bay Area from all over the world, priests from throughout the globe are also attracted to the Bay Area, and in particular the East Bay, due to its educational opportunities, gentle climate, and a diverse, progressive and hospitable populace.

The influx of foreign-born priests has not been without issue. Throughout the diocese, I hear complaints about parishioners unable to understand their priests, or that cultural issues around the treatment of women and clericalism can make such situations problematic. But for the most part, and in the overwhelming majority of parishes in the diocese, the diverse presence of clergy has been a positive experience.

This is an opportunity to know the many priests of the diocese, most of whom are foreign-born, and ordained after 1995. They tend to be fairly conservative theologically and politically, which often leads to much disagreement. However, the intent of the mini-convocation is to find ways that we can bond together as priests and staffs working in East Bay parishes.


As in years past, the small-group discussions at these clergy gatherings will focus on practical ways that we can connect fraternally, through mutual respect, understanding, acceptance, inter-parish cooperation, trust, sharing scarce resources, sensing the needs of our Catholic faithful and how we need to respond as clergy, in collaboration with parish staffs.

Many of us who were trained in the post-Vatican II church have worked for a more inclusive church, one where the talents of laity, particularly women, are nurtured and affirmed. Influenced by Jesus' universal call to a lived faith, and aware of the East Bay's uniquely expansive vision of inclusivity and justice, we continue to strive for that here in the Diocese of Oakland, and I hope that we continue to those ends here at St. Benedict, building on the work done by my predecessors, especially Fathers Jay Matthews and Paul Vassar.

Congratulations to Deacon Ron Tutson, who will be celebrating his 10th Anniversary of Ordination to the Diaconate on All Saints Day, November 1st. It is a joy and a blessing to work with him and have his gifts and ministry here at St. Benedict!

As a heads up, I'll be at the FBI Academy at Quantico, Virginia from Thursday, October 25th to Thursday, November 8th; and from Tuesday, November 13th to Thursday, November 15th, I'll be in Oceanside, CA, at the Major League Baseball's annual retreat for its Catholic priest-chaplains from throughout the MLB - I'll be representing the Oakland Athletics as their priest-chaplain.
