Campaign for Human Development - This Weekend





FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Because a king is the embodiment of his kingdom, whatever you do to him, you also due to his subjects. So insulting the king is just like insulting all the people he rules, and honoring him is like honoring the entire kingdom. The king, for his part, acts in the name of all of his subjects. When he

forgives or pardons, the entire kingdom forgives or pardons through him.

Being our king, Jesus died on the cross not as an individual but as our representative. In a way, we were also tortured and nailed to the cross with him. That is why Jesus' suffering and death atone for our sins, something that would not have been possible if Jesus were not our king.

Just as we can say we hung on the cross and died with Jesus, we can also use the same reasoning to claim we have risen from the dead with him. Death no longer has power over Jesus nor any power over us. At the end of the world, we will rise from our graves, never to die again. This is a central teaching of our Christian faith.

In today's Gospel, the crowd, the soldiers, and one of the thieves crucified next to Jesus mock him, contemptuously asking if he is the Messiah they are expecting. Because God was supposed to anoint the Messiah with his spirit, some of the Jews believed the Messiah would lead them in battle against their enemies and would eventually gain control of the world. Jesus, who is neither a successful military leader nor a powerful political figure, failed to meet these expectations when he suffered a very disgraceful death as a common criminal. It seemed like Jesus was the exact opposite of what the Messiah was supposed to be.

When the Romans to led a man outside the city for crucifixion, a soldier usually went before him carrying a sign announcing the man's crime. The soldier later nailed this sign to the top of the cross. In today's Gospel, the inscription above Jesus' head identifies him as the king of the Jews, a charge, that according to John's Gospel, appeared in Latin, Greek, and Hebrew. In pictures of the crucified Jesus, this sign usually contains letters INRI, the first letters of the Latin words Iesus Nazarsenus, Rex Judaeorum, which means "Jesus of Nazareth, the King of the Jews."

One of the criminals crucified next to Jesus recognized him as the Messiah after everyone else give up on him. How do we give up on Jesus when he doesn't respond as we expect? Pray today for the faith to except Jesus as our own Messiah and Savior even when things do not go our way.

If there is any time that the Lord's presence as King in our world is most sorely needed, it would be at this time! We

continue to feel the effects of our political and economic anxieties, and there's a deep feeling of unease in our country and across the world in light of our current situation.

This Catholic Feast of Christ the King came about after World War I during the rise of Communism in Russia, Fascism in Italy and National Socialism in Germany. Pope Pius X wanted the world to know that neither Hitler, Stalin nor Mussolini were kings but Christ was/is the King. It would be good for the world to heed that in today's environment.

Today marks the end of the Catholic liturgical year, as we begin the First Sunday of Advent next weekend!

By the way, it's good to have Fr. Ken Hamilton back with us this weekend here at St. Benedict.

Please take special notice of the African American Catholic images that are around the church, particularly this month of November, as we commemorate the Feast of All Souls and Black Catholic History Month. As I have been mentioning, placing images of Black Saints or those preparing for veneration, beautification or canonization was something that I did during the month of November when I was pastor at St. Columba in North Oakland. I invite you to pay particular attention to the images that currently grace us here at St. Benedict. These folks, sheroes and heroes in our African American Catholic heritage, remain models of faith for all of us, and their stories are familiar to some of you. Get to know some of them over the next few weeks!

Don't forget about our Thanksgiving Day Mass here at St. Benedict - 10:00 AM, Thursday, November 24th, followed by our traditional post-Mass reception with light snacks and Gin Fizzes, courtesy of the Santi family. Fr. Paul Vassar will be your presider for the Mass, since I'll be at Divine Mercy parish. Please join us as we start off the holiday season!
