FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Most Pharisees strictly observed the smallest details of the Jewish laws (a practice they believed made them holier than others) and didn't associate with those whom they considered sinners out of fear of being contaminated by these people. In today's

Gospel, this group is angry because Jesus doesn't act the same way. Instead of eating with the Pharisees, Jesus dines with tax collectors and those the Pharisees consider below them in social standing.

First-century Jews who believed God was their king had a strong dislike for tax collectors. The Jews felt outraged when the Roman armies conquered Palestine and declared that the emperor (not the one, true God) would rule over them. As if it wasn't bad enough that this mere human tried to take God's place, he also imposed taxes on the Jewish people, taxes the Jews believed should go to God, their king, for the upkeep of God's house, the Temple in Jerusalem. By collecting taxes, they believed that the emperor was actually stealing from God, and the tax collectors were helping him do it. That's why the Pharisees were so angry when Jesus chose to eat with the tax collectors instead of respected Pharisees.

In the parable in today's Gospel, the younger son asked for his share of the inheritance. Jewish law entitled the eldest son to twice as much inheritance as his brother(s) because he would become the head of the family and would have more responsibilities. If there were only two sons, they were supposed to divide the estate into three parts, with the younger son getting 1/3 of it. So, the younger son in today's Gospel caused a great financial hardship on his family.

After spending his money on loose living, the son gets a job feeding pigs. Since the Jews regarded pigs as unclean animals that they could not eat or sacrifice to God, the son had really hit rock bottom because he was caring for useless creatures.

Returning home, the son asked the father to take him back not as a slave but as a servant. Slaves had more security because they were part of the family, and the master had to take care of them. Servants, on the other hand, were not part of the family and could find themselves unemployed and out on the streets at any time.

Rejoicing that his son returned, the father gives him a robe (symbolic of royalty), a ring (a sign of authority and power), and sandals for his feet (worn by important individuals). He restores the son to his previous position in the family.

Return to your heavenly father this Lenten season.

I've been thinking about the late spiritual father of St. Benedict, our dear and beloved Father Jay Matthews, who anniversary of his passing into eternal life took place exactly six years ago this Sunday. I think about Jay every day, as many of you do as well. I'll invite folks to share about him at our 10:00 AM Mass this weekend.

Lent, the church's annual retreat for the liturgical year, began with Ash Wednesday. Lent prepares us for the events of Holy Week, in which we commemorate the passion, death and resurrection of Jesus through our Sacred Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter Vigil) and the subsequent Easter Sunday celebration and the Easter Season. Lent is the time where we focus our spiritual journey on the three traditional practices of the season: prayer, fasting, and almsgiving. Our hope is that by the end of the Lenten Season, our particular spiritual practices during Lent will have drawn us closer to Christ and his will for us, not just during the Lenten and Easter Seasons, but throughout the rest of the year as well.

Please make sure to take home numerous copies of our Lenten prayer guides, located at the entrances of the church.

We also have Stations of the Cross on Friday afternoons (at noon) during our Lenten Season. Divine Mercy Parish has theirs at 6:30 PM, with the Stations of the Cross alternating between St. Paschal Baylon Church and St. Lawrence O'Toole Church.

Thank you to those who were at the Ceasefire Walk here at St. Louis Bertrand last week. Fr. Paul Vassar powerfully and emotionally addressed the murder of Cristo Rey De La Salle East Bay (the former St. Elizabeth High School) student Derbing Alvarado. Fr. Paul volunteers his time (along with Jaylynn St. Julien) at the school. We continue working diligently to reduce violence, particularly gun violence, in our Eastmont and Deep East Oakland neighborhood.

Continued prayers and blessings as we together journey through this Lenten Season.
