#### LITURGICAL CORNER

Mother's Day: From Global Peace to Greeting Cards



The celebration of mothers and motherhood has ancient roots, reaching back to the Greeks and Romans, who honored the mother goddesses *Rhea* and *Cybele*. However, the origins of Mother's Day as we know it in the United States trace back to the 19<sup>th</sup> century and are deeply tied to women of faith and conviction.

Julia Ward Howe, known for penning the "Battle Hymn of the Republic" in 1861, was also a peace activist and advocate for women's rights. Shaken by the violence of the Civil War and global conflicts like the Franco-Prussian War, she issued a passionate "Mother's Day Proclamation," calling women to unite against war. In 1870, she proposed an annual "Mother's Peace Day" to be observed each June 2. This observance was celebrated in Boston and other places for over three decades but faded by 1905.

The modern Mother's Day is largely credited to the devotion of Anna Jarvis and her mother, Ann Maria Reeves Jarvis. Both women believed that mothers were uniquely positioned to foster peace in their communities. After her mother's death in 1905, Anna Jarvis, who never married or had children, committed herself to creating a national day to honor mothers. On May 10, 1908, the first official Mother's Day was celebrated at a Methodist church in Grafton, West Virginia. Anna's efforts led President Woodrow Wilson to proclaim the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day in 1914. Sadly, Anna later became disillusioned with the increasing commercialization of the day she envisioned as sacred. She opposed the use of greeting cards and gifts, believing they diluted the original intent of honoring a mother's sacrificial love. By 1943, she was campaigning to remove the holiday altogether. She died in 1948 in poverty and blindness—her medical bills ironically paid by florists and card companies she had once protested.

Today, we remember the deep spiritual roots of this day. May it be for us not just a celebration, but a reflection of the sacred calling of motherhood and the legacy of peace it can inspire.

The La Salette family is a global community of priests, brothers, sisters, and lay people (*La Salette Associates* and *La Salette Laity*) united by a common mission: to live and spread Our Lady of La Salette's message of reconciliation.

The La Salette Laity includes Catholic women and men, age eighteen and older, inspired by the 1846 Apparition. Found in over twenty-five countries, they strive for holiness and serve as co-missionaries alongside La Salette religious and La Salette Associates in Shrines, parishes, and ministries.

Every three years, a special summit brings together lay members from across the United States who are inspired by the La Salette message for prayer, formation, and fellowship. The Summit offers participants a unique chance to grow in faith and deepen their connection to the La Salette charism. It also emphasizes the vital role of laypeople in spreading Our Lady of La Salette's timeless message of conversion, reconciliation, and faith, while deepening their connection with the wider La Salette community and the universal Church. In this light, the Summit is meant to spread the universal message of Our Lady of La Salette; strengthen the partnership between the La Salette religious community, the people they serve, and friends and neighbors; deepen faith and foster a stronger connection to Jesus through Mary's message of reconciliation.

### Your Prayer. Your Intentions. **Leave Them in Mary's Care**



In the last issue of our bulletin, we introduced the new *Development Office* "Seeds of Hope" and shared our commitment to educating our visitors, friends and faithful community on **meaningful ways** to support the ministries of the National Shrine of Our Lady of La Salette. This week, we highlight a beautiful and prayerful opportunity: lighting a memorial/votive candle in our Chapel of Lights.

The use of candles in prayer has deep roots stretching back to ancient times. In the Jewish tradition, lamps were kept burning in sacred spaces as a sign of God's abiding presence. Early Christians embraced and transformed this custom—lighting candles during worship, at gravesites, and in moments of personal devotion. Over time, these simple flames came to symbolize something very profound: the soul's longing for God, the light of faith amidst darkness, and the connection between heaven and earth. When lit in memory of the departed or in supplication to Mary, these lights became visible prayers—offering a quiet vigil even after the one who lit them has gone. From this practice came the term votive candle, from the Latin *votum*, meaning a prayer or sacred offering.

At the *National Shrine of Our Lady of La Salette*, lighting a memorial candle is more than a gesture—it's a sacred act of remembrance, hope, and prayer. Whether in memory of a loved one, or as a sign of trust in Mary's intercession during a difficult time, your candle becomes a visible prayer that continues to burn—even when you cannot be there.


Candles may be lit for a week, a month, or a year. Yearly candles include a personalized plaque, while weekly and monthly intentions are prayerfully displayed in our Chapel of Lights—where thousands come to pray each year.
