FROM THE DESK OF FR. MICHAEL POPE FRANCIS IN AMERICA

In what can only be described as a captivating week, we have witnessed the Vicar of Christ in our midst in our country this week. It has been a phenomenal experience to see this Pope loved by thousands, and his message declared with clarity and always in humility. The Popes energy for a man of 78 years of age, and one who lives with just one lung is truly amazing.

Over the last couple of years of his papacy, he has called us to think, and to have a greater conscience. Sometimes, as he has done on this journey, he has ruffled some feathers, and caused people to question him in regard to doctrine. But is this Pope really wrong, or is he calling us to be more Christ like and thoughtful?

When he speaks of global warming, or care for the environment, is he all wrong? Personally, I don't fully buy the global warming argument as I have spoken to

meteorologist and admirals who have been in the Artic and Antarctica who have debunked global warming. However, the Pope is right that we must be stewards of God's creation. It is a fact that we have serious global polluters like China, and global greenhouse gases that are still high in many countries. It is also true that both corporations and individuals can do more to preserve the environment. Polluting our waterways with chemicals is wrong, and so is the disregard of natural lands. It is a proven fact that the natural landscape is being altered to the detriment of future generations. So, indeed we are called to care for God's beautiful creation.

Pope Francis is called a "liberal" because he calls us to be mindful of the less fortunate. He derides capitalism in the sense of its abuses. Christ didn't cast away the less fortunate, nor should we. Likewise, over-zealous capitalist greed by some is hurting future generations. There are some capitalist who have made a bundle at the expense of future generations by living in the unrealistic high of zero interest and cheap, borrowed money, and the increased debt of this country while letting our young people have to foot the future bill.

This is not promotion of divorce, but rather a welcome to those who have had a very horrific marriage to be invited to an annulment, and come back into the full graces of the Church. Gone is the extended delays that have torn people away from the faith.

Though priests are already permitted to absolve the sin of abortion in the Confessional in our country, the Pope has called all dioceses in the world to help women around the world through the sacrament. At the same time the Pope has emphatically called the taking of the child in the womb murder.

The chapter on the Francis papacy is long from completion, but no matter how you may look at him, he has called us to pause, be merciful, and care for all of God's gifts. Truly, there has not been a pope like him, and yes, sometimes it may be hard to accept every word he says, but if we step back, it will be a call to a deeper conscience, and understanding of who we are in life.

As I concelebrate with the Pope on this Sunday in Philadelphia, you will be in my prayers for a deeper faith, and a new found love for Jesus.


