



FROM FR. MARCIN,

My dear parishioners,



Today's Gospel reading about the risen Christ begins with the account of the two disciples who encountered Jesus on their way to Emmaus and who recognized him in the breaking of bread: "Then the two told what had happened on the road and how Jesus made himself known when he broke bread with them." The two disciples recognized Jesus when he repeated what he had done before; the disciples remembered him in the breaking of bread.

In the Gospel account of the appearance of the risen Jesus to his followers, he tried to show that it was indeed he himself before them: "Look at my hands and feet and see that it is I myself. Touch me and see for yourselves that a ghost has no flesh and bones as I have. As he said this, he showed his hands and feet." It was the same Jesus they knew who was before them.

The Gospel reminds us to be mindful of the things that we do and the words we say and the things we see. For all these contain memories of events and people of the past and of other things yet to unfold. These actions and words can hold other information about ourselves and of events which could contribute to our growth and the development of others around us.

The Gospel also reminds us to be aware of the things happening to us and around us. It is often said that God speaks to us at times in ways we can understand and at times in ways we may not be able to understand. Yet we can only hear God speaking to us in whatever way if we listen, if we are attentive, if we are purposeful in our words and deeds.

Each Sunday we listen to readings from Scripture in order to learn how the Spirit was with Jesus, and how the Spirit wishes to inspire us. In our first reading from the Acts of the Apostles, we see a new Peter speaking through the power of the Spirit. Now he and the other disciples are no longer paralyzed by fear. They speak, often in unfriendly situations, with the confident, joyful honesty and boldness of Christ himself. It is the Spirit who enables us to know Christ and to live as he lived. In the second reading, John tells us we can be sure that our knowledge of Christ is true faith if we keep his commandments—essentially to love others as he has loved us.

The Spirit enables us to share in the Easter joy of Christ. The complete joy of the Spirit's presence is anticipated in the disciples' experience of the Risen Lord: They did him homage and then returned to Jerusalem with great joy. Today in our breaking of bread with the Lord, we pray for the grace to accept the gift of the Spirit, the promise of his Father, with all our heart so that we might live and act as Christians without fear—in freedom, in truth, in love, in joy.

Christ's mission to preach repentance and forgiveness of sins is extended to all nations. Jesus knew that without his Spirit the disciples and those who would follow them would be totally unable of fulfilling his command.

Let us not forget that we are Christ's missionaries in the world of today and unless we speak out the Good News will not be heard and mankind will be the less for it. Jesus says in the last line of the Gospel that the forgiveness of sins will be preached to all the nations. Who will do this preaching if it is not us?

FROM FR. SLAWOMIR...

St. Bernadette Soubirous – April 16

Visionary of Lourdes (1844 – 1879)

St. Bernadette was born in Lourdes, a small town on the northern slopes of the Pyrenees. A sickly child, she lived with her family in a basement hovel. One morning in 1858, when she was fourteen, Bernadette and two other children were gathering firewood near a remote cave. Passing the grotto, Bernadette looked up to see a beautiful young woman holding a rosary. The other children saw nothing. But as word spread of the apparition, crowds began to follow Bernadette as she returned and conversed with the Lady, who identified herself as "the Immaculate Conception." In one of her encounters, the Lady instructed Bernadette to drink from the waters in the cave. Although there was no visible sign of water, when Bernadette scratched in the ground she unearthed a growing stream.

Before long it became a gushing spring, which continues to the present.

Far from rushing to embrace these miraculous events, Church officials were initially reserved, subjecting Bernadette to interminable interviews and cross-examinations. To escape the attention, both positive and negative, Bernadette entered an order of nursing sisters and was sent to a convent in Nevers. There her health deteriorated, and she died after great suffering in 1879 at the age of thirty-five. By that time Lourdes had become the most popular pilgrimage site in Europe, famous for its healing miracles. The Church embraced this cult, erecting a Basilica. Bernadette was canonized in 1933.

TEACHING FROM THE CATECHISM OF THE CATHOLIC CHURCH -THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

The Eighth Commandment

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. It was said to the men of old, "You shall not swear falsely, but shall perform to the Lord what you have sworn."

My dear brothers and sisters according to the Catechism of the Catholic Church The eighth commandment forbids misrepresenting the truth in our relations with others. This moral prescription flows from the vocation of the holy people to bear witness to their God who is the truth and wills the truth. Offenses against the truth express by word or deed a refusal to commit oneself to moral uprightness: they are fundamental infidelities to God and, in this sense, they undermine the foundations of the covenant.

The Old Testament attests that God is the source of all truth. His Word is truth. His Law is truth. His "faithfulness endures to all generations." Since God is "true," the members of his people are called to live in the truth.

Also the Catechism says: *In Jesus Christ, the whole of God's truth has been made manifest. "Full of grace and truth," he came as the "light of the world," he is the Truth. "Whoever believes in me may not remain in darkness." The disciple of Jesus continues in his word so as to know "the truth [that] will make you free" and that sanctifies. To follow Jesus is to live in "the Spirit of truth," whom the Father sends in his name and who leads "into all the truth." To his disciples Jesus teaches the unconditional love of truth: "Let what you say be simply 'Yes or No.'*

Man tends by nature toward the truth. He is obliged to honor and bear witness to it: "It is in accordance with their dignity that all men, because they are persons . . . are both impelled by their nature and bound by a moral obligation to seek the truth, especially religious truth. They are also bound to adhere to the truth once they come to know it and direct their whole lives in accordance with the demands of truth. God Bless You.
