The Feast of the Immaculate Conception

Every year on December 8th, the Catholic Church celebrates the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary. The feast is celebrated nine months before the feast of the Nativity of Mary on September 8th and serves as one of the most important holy days of obligation in the liturgical calendar of the Roman Catholic Church.

According to the teaching of the Catholic Church, the Immaculate Conception refers to the special way in which the Virgin

Mary was conceived in her mother's womb free from original sin. Although the Blessed Virgin Mary was conceived by normal biological means, God acted upon her soul, keeping her immaculate at the time of her conception. The creation of the Virgin Mary is explained in the Catechism of the Catholic Church, which states "the most Blessed Virgin Mary was, from the first moment of her conception, by a singular grace and privilege of almighty God and by virtue of the merits of Jesus Christ, Savior of the human race, preserved immune from all stain of original sin." This means that when she was conceived, God gave Mary a pure soul incapable of sinning. Her soul was never stained by original sin, nor by the depraved emotions, passions, and weaknesses consequent on that sin, but created in a state of original sanctity, innocence, and justice. This privilege was given to Mary to prepare her to be the mother of the Redeemer.

The doctrine of the Immaculate Conception was dogmatically defined by Pope Pius IX, December 8, 1854. It was centered on Mary's motherhood, on her as "Mother of God", and on the text from the Scripture: "Hail, full of grace! The Lord is with you" (J 1:28). The doctrine was established by tradition, by the writings of the Fathers, by feasts observed in honor of this prerogative, by the general belief of the faithful. The very controversies over it among theologians brought about a clear understanding and acceptance of the doctrine long before it was officially declared.

As affirmation of this doctrine the Blessed Virgin Mary used the title Immaculate Conception when appearing at Lourdes. When Mary appeared to Bernadette Soubirous near a cave outside of Lourdes, France, in 1858, she identified herself as the "Immaculate Conception." A mural of that scene from Lourdes stands in the Basilica.

The Feast of Mary's Conception was known as early as the 6th century in the Eastern Churches. The feast spread to the West, at least by the 9th century. In 1476 Pope Sixtus IV approved the feast with its own Mass and Office, and in 1708, Pope Clement XI extended the feast to the universal Church, making it a holy day of obligation. In 1847, Pope Pius IX proclaimed Mary as patroness of the United States, under the title of her immaculate conception. Thus, to this day, the Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception is the patronal feast of the United States.

Mary goes before us as a model of faith. Though she was conceived without sin, and remained sinless, we can follow her in faithfulness and purity. The grace that purified and sustained Mary can purify and sustain us as well. Let us strive to cooperate with God's will as Mary did throughout her whole life, even from the moment of her conception.
