Pensamientos del Padre Juan . . .

Gracia y paz a ustedes, mis hermanos y hermanas:
 En este Cuarto Domingo de Pascua —a menudo llamado el Domingo del Buen Pastor— escuchamos a Jesús describirse a sí mismo con una imagen impactante: «Yo soy la puerta. Quien entre por mí se salvará». Este domingo es un momento maravilloso para que elevemos una oración por nuestros sacerdotes. Sé que nuestra realidad aquí en Racine está cambiando, con algunos de nuestros sacerdotes que se marcan y otros nuevos que llegan. Por favor, oren por nuestros sacerdotes y pidan al Señor, en este domingo, que moldee sus corazones conforme a su propio Corazón.

El Evangelio utiliza a menudo imágenes de nuestra vida cotidiana para transmitir un mensaje poderoso. Una puerta no es simplemente un límite; es un punto de acceso a una realidad diferente. Para nosotros, Jesús, en cuanto Puerta, se convierte en el umbral entre el lugar donde nos encontramos y el lugar donde Dios desea estar. Jesús no se limita a mostrarnos el camino; Él es el Camino. En la primera lectura, escuchamos a Pedro predicando, lleno del Espíritu Santo, proclamando con valentía al pueblo y a sus líderes que la salvación proviene únicamente de Jesucristo. Esta proclamación enciende algo en los corazones de sus oyentes. El pueblo se sintió «compungido en el corazón» y preguntó: «¿Qué debemos hacer?». El encuentro con Jesús siempre provoca una respuesta. Una vez que comprendemos quién es Él, permanecer pasivos deja de ser una opción. Él es la Puerta, y nos sentimos impulsados a cruzarla para adentrarnos en su Gracia y en su Realidad.

Jesús se presenta ante nosotros como la Puerta: abierta, acogedora y vivificante; pero una puerta debe ser cruzada. La fe en Cristo no consiste meramente en estar de acuerdo con una idea —como mencioné el domingo pasado en mi homilía—, sino que es una decisión de cruzar el umbral, de establecer una relación con el Señor, de permitir que nuestras vidas se reordenen en torno a Él. Ruego para que nosotros, al igual que las multitudes ante Pedro, sintamos el deseo de «hacer más», de vivir nuestra fe de manera más intencional. Esa es la invitación que el Señor nos hace este fin de semana.

Los invito, esta semana, a reflexionar sobre lo que significaría para ustedes entrar por la Puerta que el Señor ha abierto ante sus ojos. Podría significar renovar su compromiso con la oración, especialmente prestando oído a la voz del Señor que guía nuestras decisiones. Podría significar una participación más profunda en los sacramentos, donde la Gracia salvadora de Cristo se hace tangible en nuestras vidas. Puede significar dar testimonio valeroso de nuestra fe —en el hogar, en el trabajo o mediante actos de caridad—, tal como lo hizo Pedro, incluso cuando resulte incómodo.

Este tiempo pascual nos recuerda que Jesús resucitado ha abierto la Puerta a la vida abundante. La pregunta que se nos plantea es sencilla y, a la vez, desafiante: ¿La cruzaremos? Y una vez que lo hayamos hecho, ¿cómo ayudaremos a otros a reconocer dónde se halla la verdadera vida? Al igual que a los primeros cristianos, que nuestro encuentro con Cristo nos impulse de la creencia a la acción, del deseo a un discipulado gozoso.

Preguntas frecuentes sobre el futuro de nuestra parroquia

Hoy les comparto la visión de la Comisión de Asuntos Humanos de la parroquia San León Magno. Tras reunirme con representantes de la Comisión de Asuntos Humanos, hemos iniciado un renovado proceso de planificación para San León Magno. A continuación, presento la visión de trabajo de la comisión, ofrecida como una invitación a la oración, el discernimiento y el servicio.

¿Cuál es el propósito de la Comisión de Asuntos Humanos?

- Discernir y responder a las necesidades humanas en nuestra parroquia, en nuestra comunidad local y en el mundo en general, identificando recursos e invitando a los feligreses a participar en obras concretas de misericordia y justicia.

¿Qué hace la comisión en la práctica?

- Trabajando en colaboración con el párroco, el personal y las organizaciones asociadas, la comisión coordina actividades de servicio, defensa de derechos, difusión de la Doctrina Social de la Iglesia y apoyo práctico, con el fin de asegurar que ninguna necesidad sea pasada por alto y que ningún ministerio actúe de manera aislada.

¿Qué tipo de necesidades buscamos atender?

- Entre los ejemplos se incluyen la inseguridad alimentaria, el acompañamiento a familias en situación de crisis, el apoyo a madres e hijos, y la creación de oportunidades para servir a nuestros vecinos con dignidad a través de programas y alianzas confiables.

¿Cómo sabremos si estamos progresando?

- Buscaremos señales claras de crecimiento, tales como un mayor número de feligreses dedicados al servicio, una coordinación más sólida entre los distintos ministerios y un apoyo constante que llegue a quienes más lo necesitan.

¿Qué ministerios o comités podrían formar parte de esta labor?

- Algunos ejemplos son el Ministerio Pro-Vida, el Programa de Comidas, el Banco de Alimentos y el grupo de Doctrina Social de la Iglesia (pudiendo formarse comités adicionales a medida que surjan nuevas necesidades y líderes).

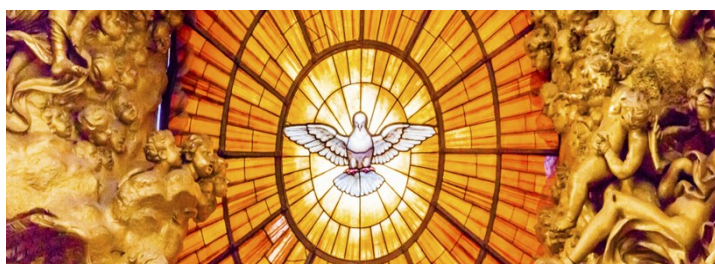
Catholicism 101

Thoughts from Father Juan . .

Grace and peace to you, my brothers and sisters, On this Fourth Sunday of Easter, often called Good Shepherd Sunday, we hear Jesus describe Himself with a striking image: **“I am the gate. Whoever enters through me will be saved.”** This Sunday is a wonderful moment for us to say a prayer for our priests. I know our reality is changing here in Racine, with some of our priests leaving and new ones coming. Please pray for our priests and ask the Lord on this Sunday to mold their hearts to his Heart.

The Gospel often uses images from our everyday lives to convey a powerful message. A gate is not simply a boundary; it is a point of access to a different reality. For us, Jesus as the Gate becomes the threshold between where we are and where God desires to be. Jesus does not merely show us the way, he is the Way. In the first reading, we hear Peter preaching, filled with the Holy Spirit, boldly proclaiming to the people and their leaders that salvation comes only through Jesus Christ. This proclamation fires something in the hearts of his listeners. The people were **“cut to the heart”** and asked, **“What are we to do?”** Encountering Jesus always provokes a response. Once we realize who he is, remaining passive is no longer an option. He is the Gate, and we are compelled to step into his Grace and Reality.

Jesus stands before us as the Gate, open, inviting, and life-giving; but a gate must be entered. Faith in Christ is not just agreement with an idea, as I mentioned last Sunday in my homily; it is a decision to step through, to enter into a relationship with the Lord, to allow our lives to be reordered around him. I pray that we, like the crowds before Peter, may sense the desire to “do more,” to live our faith more intentionally. That’s the invitation that the Lord makes to us this weekend.

I invite you this week to consider what it would mean for you to enter through the Gate that the Lord has opened in front of you. It may mean recommitting to prayer, especially listening to the voice of the Lord guiding our choices. It may mean deeper participation in the sacraments, where Christ’s saving Grace becomes tangible in our lives. It may mean courageously witnessing to our faith, at home, at work, or in acts of charity, just as Peter did, even when it feels uncomfortable.

This Easter season reminds us that the risen Jesus has opened the Gate to abundant life. The question before us is simple and challenging: Will we step through? And once we do, how will we help others recognize where true life is found? Like the first Christians, may our encounter with Christ move us from belief into action, from desire into joyful discipleship. Blessings,

Frequently Asked Questions about the Future of our Parish

Today, I am sharing about the vision for the Human Concerns Commission for Saint Leo the Great. After meeting with representatives of the Human Concerns Commission, we have begun a renewed planning process for Saint Leo the Great. Below is the commission’s working vision, offered as an invitation to pray, discern, and serve.

What is the purpose of the Human Concerns Commission?

- To discern and respond to human needs in our parish, our local community, and the wider world by identifying resources and inviting parishioners into concrete works of mercy and justice.

What does the commission do in practice?

- Working with the pastor, staff, and partner organizations, the commission coordinates service, advocacy, Catholic social teaching, and practical support so that no need is overlooked and no ministry stands alone.

What kinds of needs are we trying to meet?

- Examples include food insecurity, accompaniment for families in crisis, support for mothers and children, and opportunities to serve neighbors with dignity through reliable programs and partnerships.

How will we know we are making progress?

- We will look for clear signs of growth such as more parishioners serving, stronger coordination across ministries, and consistent support reaching those who need it most.

What ministries or committees may be part of this work?


- Examples include Pro-Life, Meal Program, Food Pantry, and Catholic Social Teaching (with additional committees formed as needs and leaders emerge).
