

Preventing Child Abuse is Everyone's Responsibility

It is every adult's moral responsibility to protect possible victims (any age) by reporting suspected abuse or neglect to the responsible authorities. For help you may call: The Office for Healing and Prevention, Diocese of Worcester, at 508-929-4363. The Diocese of Worcester requires Safe Environment training for all staff and volunteers.

Fasting and Abstinence March 2 to April 15

Lenten fast and abstinence regulations for the Diocese of Worcester are as follows:



- Abstinence from meat is to be observed by all Catholics fourteen (14) years of age and older on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all the Fridays of Lent.
- Fasting is to be observed by all Catholics who are eighteen (18) years of age but not yet fifty- nine (59) years of age on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- Those who are bound to fast may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength according to one's needs, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted. Catholics should not lightly excuse themselves from these prescribed Lenten penitential practices.

Lenten Season 2022

- Ash Wednesday: there will be Mass in the morning at 9:00 a.m. and in the evening at 7:00 p.m. Ashes will be distributed at both Masses.
- Friday weekday Mass throughout the Lenten season
- Confessions on every Sunday between 8:30 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Confessions on every Wednesday between 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. throughout Lent
- Stations of the Cross on Wednesdays at 12 noon No soup following
- Stations of the Cross on Wednesday evening at 7:00 p.m. soon after the Benediction at 6:55pm
- Lenten Meditation conducted by Three Hearts apostolate in the Parish Hall after 10:30 a.m. Mass. Soup will be provided.

Ash Wednesday Collection for Priest Retirement

A recent review of the benefits and expenses of priest retirement for our diocesan priests recommended a number of changes in benefits for those priests who have not yet retired. Bishop McManus accepted those recommendations after receiving the input and agreement of our diocesan priests. These changes are projected to save up to \$12 million through the year 2050.

Even with these changes, It will require a variety of funding sources including this collection, Celebrate Priesthood, Partners in Charity, and Legacy of Hope.





My dear friends in Christ,

It is always a joy for me to gather with our retired priests as they reminisce about cherished moments in their lives when they were in active ministry. It is equally edifying for me to witness the admiration our parishioners have for the retired priests who served them and their loved ones over the years, particularly at the annual gathering for *Celebrate Priesthood*.

I write today to ask for your support for the **Ash Wednesday Collection** that assists in the care of retired priests of the Diocese of Worcester. Unlike the annual December collection for the Retired Religious priests, sisters and brothers who are members of religious orders throughout the country, the Ash Wednesday collection was inaugurated last year to help in the care of diocesan priests who do not benefit from the December collection.

We currently have 49 retired priests. In the next eight years, we estimate an additional 42 priests will reach our normal retirement age of 75. The annual costs for health insurance, housing and monthly stipends for retired priests have averaged between \$2.2 and \$2.6 million. Recent changes were made for future retirement benefits for priests who have not yet retired. Those measures are expected to save up to \$12 million through 2050. While Partners in Charity, Celebrate Priesthood and the endowments from Forward in Faith and Legacy of Hope are critical sources of support for priests' retirement, it took the addition of this Ash Wednesday collection last year for the Priests Retirement program to experience a more balanced budget.

Our retired priests have cared for us and our families throughout the decades. Please consider beginning the Season of Lent with a sacrificial gift to the Ash Wednesday Collection on March 2 to support our retired priests.

Please be assured of my prayerful gratitude for your support of all our various Diocesan efforts and for your consideration of this request.







Judge It By Its Fruit

Eighth Sunday in Ordinary Time, C February 27, 2022 Ann Naffziger

Reading I: Sirach 27:4-7
Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 92:2-3, 13-14, 15-16
Reading II: 1 Corinthians 15:54-58
Gospel: Luke 6:39-45

As is often the case, the first reading and the Gospel reading are connected in theme. The first encourages us to judge people by their words, not their physical appearance, because their speech reveals their interior life. Just as good fruit grows

from a tree well-cared for, someone who cultivates a good character will speak from that place of goodness. Two centuries later, Jesus echoes the same theme, expanding on it with further examples.


Jesus' teachings today give a very concrete challenge to all his disciples down through the ages that is often hard for us to hear. Rather than point out the faults of another - "the speck in your neighbor's eye"- we are asked to notice the wooden beam in our own eye. Of course, we may want to believe that our neighbor has the beam in his eye, while we either have only a speck or may be even think we are completely clear-sighted!

The paradox is that when we quit focusing on someone else's faults to remedy our own, we will probably no longer feel the need to stand in judgment of anyone else. Just before this passage, Jesus stated, "Stop judging and you will not be judged." That statement might seem almost impossible, but if we concentrate on taking the wooden beam out of our own eye that might naturally lead to more compassion and understanding of others' shortcomings.

The Gospel passage ends with Jesus picking up on a theme in the first reading from the Book of Sirach. Both remind us that we can know a tree by its fruits - good trees will produce good fruit, but rotten trees will not. Though the world may judge people by their "appearance" (their skin color, manner of dress, sexual orientation, language, or religion), Jesus asks us to look deeper to what is in a person's heart. Ultimately, their words and their actions will reveal what is there.

- 1. In what kinds of situations do you find yourself getting caught up in focusing on the specks in other people's eyes?
- 2. What good fruits have you seen produced by someone who is genuinely a "good tree"?
