





#### **Fasting and Abstinence Guidelines**



- Fasting is to be observed by all Catholics who are 18 years of age but not yet 59 years of age on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
- Those who fast may take only one full meal. Two smaller meals are permitted if necessary to maintain strength, but eating solid foods between meals is not permitted.

Soup and Stations: Soup and Stations will be held every Wednesday during Lent. Stations of the Cross will be prayed in the church at noon followed by soup in the Parish Hall. All are welcome. If able, please sign up to contribute a soup or a dessert on signup sheets located in the Parish Hall foyer. (Stations of the Cross (without shared meal) will also be prayed at 7:00 p.m. on Wednesday evenings.



My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

In these days of continuing turmoil in the Ukraine, natural disasters in Turkey and Syria, and conflicts and starvation in parts of Africa, to name a few, we are being challenged to be "Jesus in disguise" by supporting the national **Catholic Relief Services (CRS) Collection on the weekend of March 26.** Through your generosity, you can help ease the burdens of our brothers and sisters in some of the most marginalized communities in the world.

Persecution of Christians and other religious minorities by extremist groups such as ISIS in the Middle East has forced families to flee their homes with few possessions or resources. Through generous contributions to CRS, as well as the efforts of bishops to engage policy makers to protect vulnerable families, we are providing badly-needed material and spiritual support to refugees here and abroad. For example, a family from Iraq fled this persecution, and after living in a refugee camp in Indonesia they eventually were resettled in Massachusetts. Through support of the collection, volunteers welcomed the family, donated household items and furniture, and arranged reduced-rent housing during their transition. With ongoing support, refugees like this family find employment, learn English, and build new homes, far from the religious and political violence they faced overseas.

Through the various Catholic agencies assisted by CRS, you are promoting the dignity of the human person in so many ways.

- Food assistance is provided in emergency field kitchens that provide hot meals and snacks.
- Reception services are offered at Caritas offices, train stations and other locations for displaced people with clothing, information, referrals, food, water, hygiene items, and counseling.
- Transportation is arranged for displaced families to friends, families, and local social services.

For more than 75 years, CRS has been providing expertise and compassion to the very poorest of our brothers and sisters in more than 100 countries. But we can't do this lifesaving work without your help.

## READINGS FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF LENT, YEAR A

#### **READING I 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a** A reading from the First Book of Samuel

The LORD said to Samuel:

"Fill your horn with oil, and be on your way.

I am sending you to Jesse of Bethlehem,

for I have chosen my king from among his sons."

As Jesse and his sons came to the sacrifice, Samuel looked at Eliab and thought,

"Surely the LORD's anointed is here before him."

But the LORD said to Samuel:

"Do not judge from his appearance or from his lofty stature,

because I have rejected him.

Not as man sees does God see,

because man sees the appearance

but the LORD looks into the heart."

In the same way Jesse presented seven sons before Samuel.

but Samuel said to Jesse,

"The LORD has not chosen any one of these."

Then Samuel asked Jesse,

"Are these all the sons you have?"

Jesse replied,

"There is still the youngest, who is tending the sheep." Samuel said to Jesse,

"Send for him:

we will not begin the sacrificial banquet until he arrives here."

#### GOSPEL John 9:1-41

#### A reading from the Gospel according to John

As Jesus passed by he saw a man blind from birth.

His disciples asked him,

"Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents,

that he was born blind?"

Jesus answered,

"Neither he nor his parents sinned;

it is so that the works of God might be made visible through him.

We have to do the works of the one who sent me while it is day. Night is coming when no one can work.

When he had said this, he spat on the ground

and made clay with the saliva,

and smeared the clay on his eyes,

and said to him,

"Go wash in the Pool of Siloam" —which means Sent—.

His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said,

"Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?"

Some said, "It is, "

but others said, "No, he just looks like him."

that you do not know where he is from, yet he opened my eyes.

#### Live in the Light

The Fourth Sunday in Lent, A March 19, 2023

Reading I: 1 Samuel 16:1b, 6-7, 10-13a Responsorial Psalm: Psalm 23:1-3a, 3b-4, 5, 6 Reading II: Ephesians 5:8-14 Gospel: John 9:1-41

"Live as children of light, for light produces every kind of goodness and righteousness and truth...Take no part in the fruitless works of darkness, rather expose them ... for everything exposed by the light becomes visible" (Eph 5:8-9, 11, 13).

Jesus (and later, St. Paul) had a lot to say about living in the light, doing things in the light, and being honest and transparent about one's words and actions. In his conversations and interactions, Jesus repeatedly exposed hypocrisy, injustice, and greed. He wasn't afraid to point out posturing—people jockeying to sit in the positions of honor at the table or making a show of giving alms. He observed community leaders privately and publicly judging other people's sinfulness—the woman who washed Jesus' feet with her tears and the woman caught in adultery. He called out abusive practices—Roman soldiers conscripting citizens to carry their loads for a mile or using physical force to demean or subdue others (striking on the cheek). Jesus' eyes were wide open to the injustice and oppression around him, and he wasn't afraid to expose it, speak out against it, or call the offenders on it.

Contrast Jesus' habit of speaking and doing things openly (healing the man born blind outright on the Sabbath!) to that of people with power who met secretly to plot his death or Judas who went covertly to the officials to betray Jesus. Jesus knew that much injustice and sin in the world are born in secret meetings of people with wealth or power or individuals making decisions alone without the accountability of others asking questions or raising concerns.

Today's Gospel story offers a perfect metaphor for the contrast between light and dark, seeing and blindness, openness, and secrecy. If we are tempted to keep something secret (which is not the same as respecting confidentiality), that's usually a red flag. If we are afraid of something we say or do being made public, should we be saying or doing it in the first place? On the other hand, if we are "living it the light" we will have nothing to be ashamed of.
