Clergy abuse discussion Feb. 8:

Come Saturday, February 8, to Our Lady of the Rosary Hall at 3:00 p.m. for a conversation on "**The Future of the Church in the Light of the Clergy Abuse Scandals,**" with Dr. Rosemary Ellmer.

At the request of Bishop P.J. McGrath, in the fall of 2018 clinical psychologist Rosemary Ellmer moderated the four diocese-wide listening sessions held to seek in-

put from people in the pews on the pathway to reform and to listen to those victimized by clerical sexual abuse. She has written and spoken about her personal reaction to what she heard and challenges all Catholics to be a community of hope and healing if the Church is to survive.

A quick Google search turned up multiple stories about the parrots of Palo Alto, back at least to 2007. This variety of mitred conure is native to Peru and Ecuador; our visitors are likely descendants of escapees from Monette's Pet Shop on California Ave. (closed long ago).

Bright green and quite raucous, the par-



rots garner attention wherever they go.

Church exterior painting:

The parish Building and Equipment Maintenance Committee has contracted with Teevan Painting for consultation on the status of the exterior siding of STA church. Teevan has been in business since 1963 and has expertise in painting and restoration of historic buildings.

Teevan's representative has been at the church this past week, and his investigation showed that our beautiful church is in excellent condition on the inside (meaning no water damage from leaky roof or siding). Now we just need to get the exterior brought up to the same standard of care."

We are expecting a comprehensive analysis of the state of the exterior and a proposal for the repairs from Teevan in the next 30 days.
