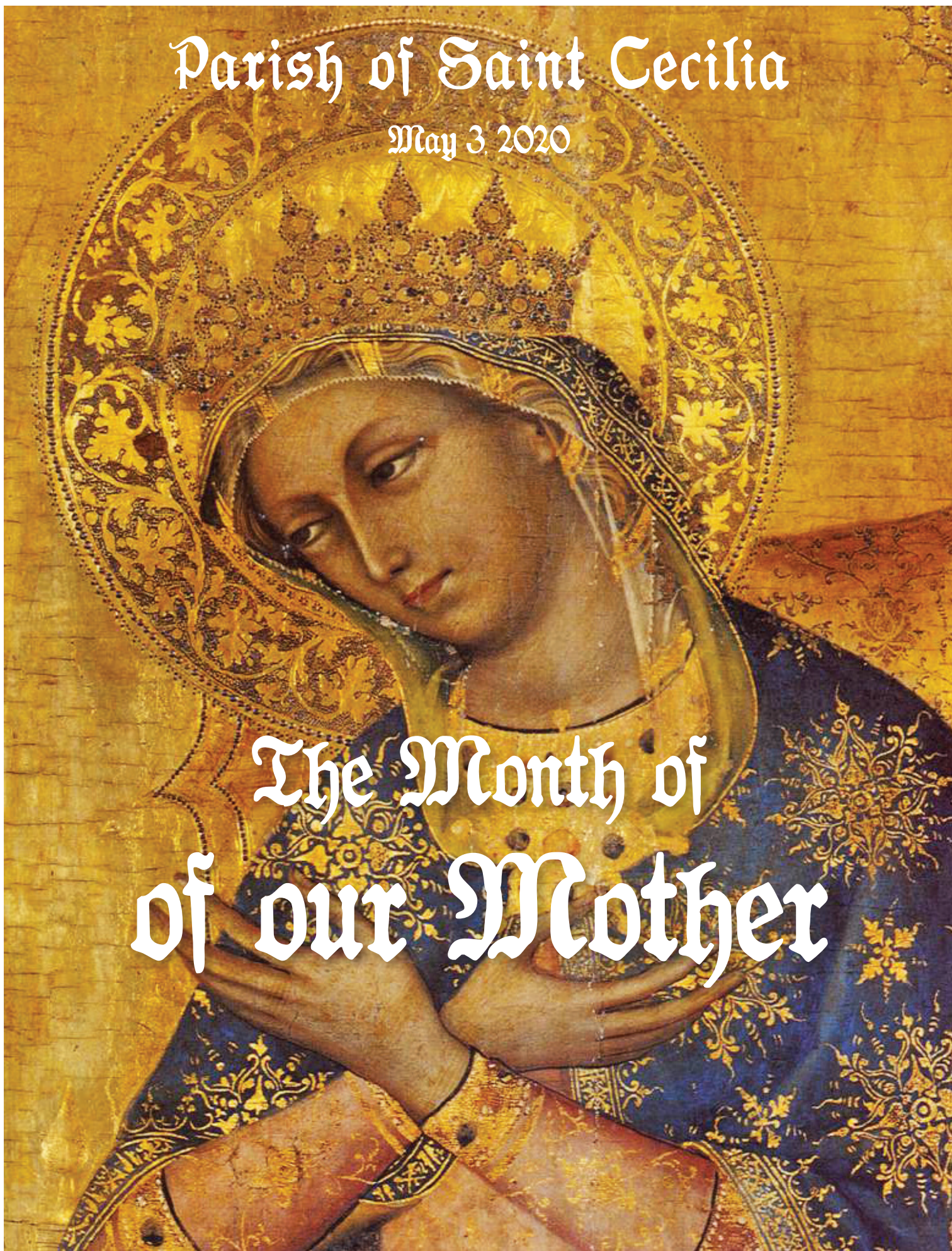

PASTOR'S RAMBLINGS | 4

1 | MASSES RESUME ON PENTECOST. According to the Catholic bishops of Ohio's letter that came out Tuesday, Masses will resume at parishes on Pentecost Sunday. To what extent that everyone will be allowed to come to Mass at the same time is yet to be determined. I am gathering that there will be a "soft opening" at all parishes in the region. I imagine daily Masses will be allowed to resume on Monday, June 1. However, social distancing will be required. In fact, social distancing will be manipulated by roping off pews, which will probably happen the first few months that Sunday Masses resume.

2 | DEACON LOUIE. Deacon Louie Jacquemin was ordained a transitional deacon on Saturday, April 25, at 11AM at St. Peter in Chains Cathedral. Unfortunately, only his parents were able to be present for his ordination. He did get to celebrate his first Mass as a deacon this past weekend and we invited his family to attend. 3 | WELCOME, CHILD OF GOD. On Sunday, April 26, we baptized two young children at St. Cecilia. Please welcome Daniel Jack and Selena Evelyn (age 4), son and daughter of Daniel and Nayeli Ortega.

4 | REST IN PEACE. Long-time parishioner of St. Anthony Parish, Jean Tierney, passed from this life. Jean's funeral was held at St. Anthony last Wednesday. May eternal rest be granted, O Lord.

5 | CAPITAL PROJECTS. With the church buildings vacant on our campuses, we were able to do some capital projects without much inconvenience. At St. Anthony, we are replacing the heating and air-conditioning unit (photo 5). At SM-SJ, we are finishing up a back altar enhancement project. The second phase of the project has been going on since early April. The project should be fully completed within a month. At St. Cecilia, the renovation of St. Cecilia school continues. Most recently we've been working toward installing air conditioning for the entire school building (hopefully to be completed in the next few years). In the last month, air conditioning has been installed in the gym and the first phase of the primary school hallway has been completed.

QUARANTINED. Because I was in the presence of someone who tested positive for COVID, I was asked by the Health Department to go on a 12-day quarantine. While I tested negative and the person I was in contact with also tested negative twice--after having tested positive—I was still required to be quarantined until this past Thursday. I was called every day by the health department to make sure I did not have any symptoms. I am happy to be back and to be celebrating the sacraments.

CATHOLIC FAQs

FEAST DAYS

Feast days are days set aside each year to honor Mary, the Saints, and mysteries of the faith. There are three types of feast days. In the hierarchy of feast days, Memorials hold the lowest status. Memorials can be obligatory and optional. Obligatory memorials recognize a saint or an attribute of Jesus or Mary, such as the Immaculate Heart of Mary. Optional memorials can honor saints.

Of mid-level importance in the liturgical calendar are Feasts — days on which Catholics remember saints as well as titles and mysteries of Jesus and Mary.

Solemnities are the highest designation of feast days, and some, such as the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary on August 15 and All Saints' Day on November 1, are holy days of obligation, on which Catholics are required to attend Mass. Only the most significant mysteries of the Faith, such as the Resurrection, or the feast days of saints who influenced salvation history, such as St. John the Baptist, are considered solemnities.

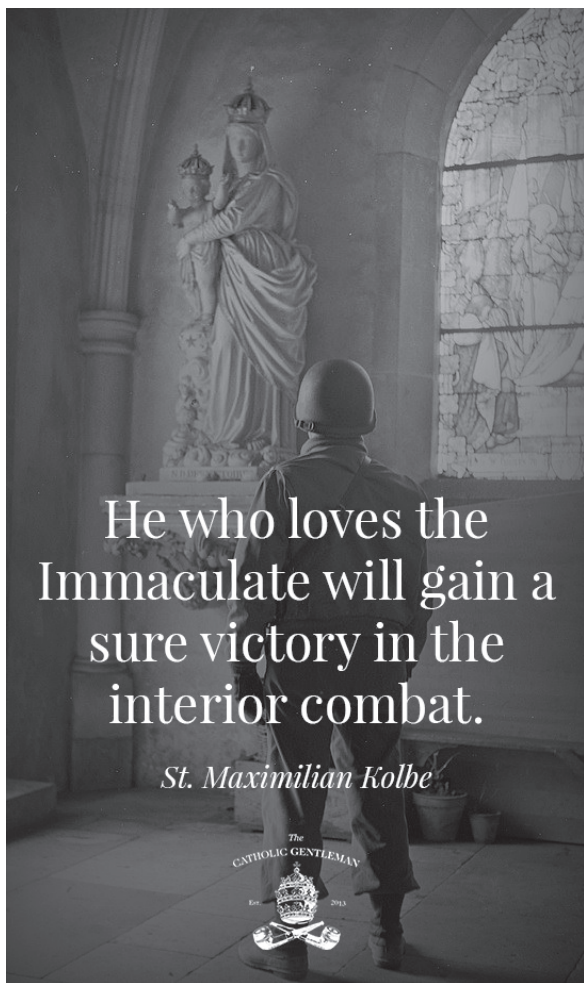
HOLY DAYS OF OBLIGATION

Catholics must attend Mass on Sundays or on Saturday evenings (the Sunday vigil) and on designated holy days of obligation. These holy days are not the same throughout the world but are set by local governing bodies. For example, the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops declared the following dates to be holy days of obligation in the United States:

- January 1: Solemnity of Mary, the Mother of God
- Thursday of the Sixth Week of the Easter Season: Ascension Thursday
- August 15: Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary
- November 1: Solemnity of All Saints
- December 8: Solemnity of the Immaculate Conception
- December 25: Solemnity of the Birth of Jesus Christ

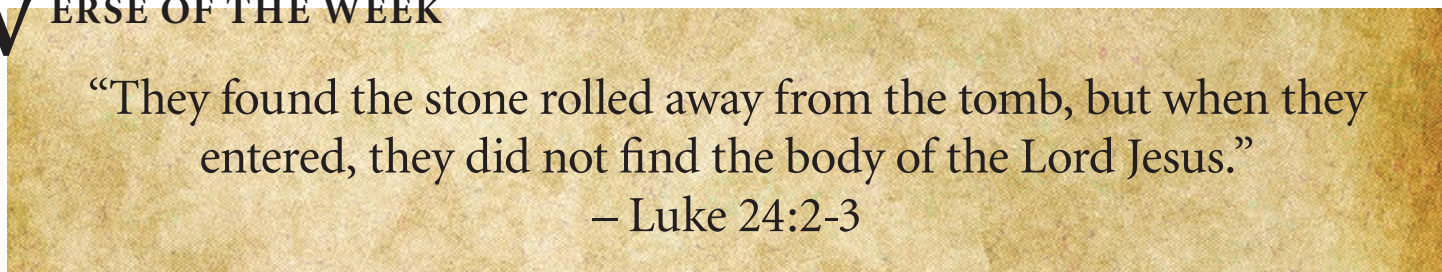

Letter from the Ohio Bishops

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On April 27, Governor Mike DeWine presented a strategy to begin a multi-phased plan, even while the executive "Stay at Home Order" remains in place. His plan begins a process for Ohioans gradually to return to work and daily activity and provides hope and evidence that our cooperation with the governor's orders has significantly curbed the spread of the virus. We thank you for and admire the patience, cooperation and understanding you have already shown during this COVID-19 pandemic. We realize the frustration, sadness, and loss the faithful felt not to be able to gather personally to celebrate the Paschal Mysteries during the Sacred Triduum and each Sunday. During this time of sacrifice and longing, we have joined our prayers and hearts to yours, trusting that God will see us through this pandemic and reunite us at the Eucharistic Feast. Out of deep concern for the common good as well as the physical and spiritual well-being of all the people of Ohio, the Catholic Bishops of Ohio have agreed once again to cooperate with the governor, and to support and abide by the multi-phased approach to returning to work and eventual public gathering in large groups.

To that end, the Catholic Bishops of Ohio extend the temporary suspension of all publicly celebrated Masses/liturgies ending on May 29, with the hope of publicly celebrating together the Solemnity of Pentecost on the weekend of May 30/31. Each of the bishops of Ohio, once again, dispense the Catholic faithful who reside in their respective dioceses and all other Catholics currently in their territories from the obligation of attending Sunday Mass during this time. We ask for the cooperation and adherence of all the faithful to the governor's directives during this period.

We will be working diligently with our pastoral teams to consider reasonable, gradual and responsible initiatives for welcoming back the faithful in time to Sunday Mass, initiatives which will renew our love for the Holy Eucharist and the Sacrament of Reconciliation, and which will help us to restore Catholic life and invite others to share that life after the pandemic. We encourage individual dioceses and their respective pastors and parishioners to begin to work to establish plans which respect social distancing and other requirements for the safety of our people.

This decision has not been taken lightly and, as your bishops, together with you, we recognize the sacrifice we are called to make being physically distanced from the Holy Eucharist and from one another. We remain grateful for your understanding and prayerful support. As your bishops we continue to encourage you to keep holy the Lord's Day by participating in Sunday Mass by way of radio broadcast or televised or livestreamed options and making a spiritual communion. Keeping in mind of the gift of plenary indulgences offered to us by the Church, we encourage all the faithful to turn to the Church's treasury of prayer, praying as a family or individually the Liturgy of the Hours, rosary, divine mercy chaplet, and Stations of the Cross, etc.

Together we continue to pray for all who are suffering from Covid19, for all health care workers and first responders, for all the deceased and their families, and for an easing of the anxiety and tension caused by this pandemic. Relying on the Motherly care of Our Lady, Health of the Sick, we unite our sufferings to those of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and we trust in the glorious hope of His Resurrection.
