



Apostles" narrates a version of the "spread and

Acts has certain verses that – at least in my lifetime

Our United Methodist friends in the United States, since 2001, have utilized the slogan or motto of, "Open Hearts, Open Minds, Open Doors." Not wanting to speak for United Methodists – as if they would have any desire for me to do that as a Presbyterian - I suspect this phrase describes "open hearts" for compassion and respect in relationships, "open minds" for the importance of lifelong discerning and learning as disciples of Jesus, and "open doors" for the practice of welcoming all of God's people. Since 2001 when I first saw this slogan in front of Faith United Methodist Church on 91st Street in southeast Tulsa, I have wished Presbyterians had thought of this description first. I have a few Methodist friends who might say, "I wish I thought we've lived up to the slogan better than we do." To which I would reply, "If that was the slogan of the Presbyterian Church (USA), I'm certain I would wish we lived up to it better than we do – even without it specifically being our slogan."

- have been the texts for many sermons. I've been pondering lately how three of these Scripture passages might be related, similarly to the relationship of the words in the slogan, "Open hearts, open minds, and open doors." So here's a fairly brief grouping of the three: (1) Acts 11:25-26 tells of the faith community of disciples who were followers of the teachings of Jesus in and around the town of Antioch being called Christians. They were known by this name due to their association with and selfidentification as disciples of Jesus Christ. (2) Acts 26:24-29 tells of Paul's conversation with the Roman government official named Festus and the King known as Agrippa. King Agrippa said to Paul the prisoner, "You are absolutely focused, aren't you, on my becoming a follower of this Jesus as you are?" Being a Christian was the name. Now we are told that a leader outside the community of faith notices that Paul, within the community of Jesus' followers, senses his (Paul's) purpose as living a faith focused toward "teleological wholeness," which is a three dollar word meaning that we serve God in life along the journey of being healed and made whole in the fullness of God's time. Today, yes. Tomorrow, yes; and yes on God's purposes further out than we can see or know. Similarly to King Agrippa's observation about Paul, Nigerian-American author Luvvie Ajayi writes: "Fear has a very concrete power of keeping us from doing and saying the things that are our purpose." Known by a name due to their association with Jesus, and sensing a purpose to serve God in life along the journey ever shaped by God's healing and God's making life whole with others. (3) Acts, chapter 2: verses 32-35, tells of these followers of Jesus being characterized as sharers of material goods which came their way in life, doing so in a spirit of respect and caring. They had a name, a purpose, and a characterization, all related to God's love and outreach in and through

The church I began serving in Tulsa during July of 1994 was located on East 31st Street, six miles north of Faith United Methodist. Our sign on 31st Street had a marquee. I had been called as pastor and had been moved into my office only a short time, when someone said to me, "You are partly in charge of the words and announcements on the marquee out front. Would you like to put the phrase out there, "All are welcome"? I replied, "Let me think about that. I don't yet know the church that well. If we put that on the marquee, would it be accurate? I've been here too short a time to know if 'all are welcome." The person visiting with me then said, "I think I understand. Whenever you say, we'll put it out there." About six months later, in January or February of 1995, we put those words on the marquee. Truthfully, I think, as a congregation, we had to grow into that phrase, practicing "all are welcome." Saying we were a "work in progress" of people growing into "all being welcome," means we do not always do that successfully. "All are welcome," or "Open hearts, open minds, open doors" - either or both of those - how do you think you or this church as a faith community generally practices this consistently and faithfully? Undoubtedly some do better at this than others. Undoubtedly none of us do it perfectly. But might we aspire to this

Jesus Christ for all the world. Not for your or my limited version of God's favor. For all the world.

One day in 1983, when Tom Schmid was pastor of San Pedro Presbyterian Church in San Antonio and I was associate pastor, we both saw an advertisement in a church publication which was posted by a Presbyterian congregation. It read, "Almost perfect church seeks almost perfect pastor for a future richly blessed in ministry together." Tom and I wondered what the almost perfect church and the almost perfect pastor would be. In a few weeks, he wrote an article for another publication which gave his different sense of the way Jesus' disciples ought to represent themselves as "church." Tom's version read, "Imperfect pastor seeks imperfect church for ministry together, in order to experience how God's grace abounds."

The primitive church during the early decades after Jesus' life, death, and resurrection was not perfect. They were on a journey evolving. Neither is the church today "perfect." Anywhere. Yet, how well do we measure up to the name, the purpose, and the characterization to which the early church sensed was their calling from God as followers of Jesus? I need infinite help in measuring up to the name, the purpose, and the characterization of being a disciple of Jesus with others who sense a call to serve together with folks often different from ourselves in God's world. A Methodist friend, knowing I need all the help others can give, recently sent me an opinion page article from the New York Times by Anne Lamott. Ms. Lamott became a church member twenty-five or so years ago when she - in her struggling life - felt led one Sunday into the small St. Andrew Presbyterian Church in the San Francisco Bay area. She tells us today how life, for her, often is still as chaotic and full of brokenness as it was then, but how she is strengthened for chaos and brokenness by grace from God which mysteriously abounds and which beckons her still today. In that New York Times op-ed from July 8 of this year she wrote:

"I wake up praying. I say a prayer some sober people told me to pray 36 years ago, because when all else fails, follow instructions. It helps me to not fixate on who I am, but on whose I am. I am God's adorable, aging, self-centered, spaced-out beloved. One man in early sobriety told me that he had come into recovery as a hotshot, but that other sober men helped him work his way up to servant. I pray to be a good servant because I've learned that this is the

path of happiness. I pray for my family and all my sick friends that they have days of grace and healing, and I end my prayers, 'Make me, God, ever mindful of the needs of the poor.' Then I put on my glasses, let the dog out for early morning relief and start my day. I will have horrible thoughts about others, typically the Christian right or the majority of the Supreme Court, or someone who has seriously crossed me, whose hair I pray falls out ... I say to God, as I do every Sunday in confession: 'Look — I think we can both see what we have on our hands here. Help me not be such a pill.' It is miserable to be a hater. I pray to be more like Jesus with his crazy compassion and reckless love. Some days go better than others. I pray to remember that God loves Marjorie Taylor Greene exactly the same as God loves my grandson, because God loves, period. God does not have an app for 'Not Love.' God sees beyond each person's awfulness to each person's needs. God loves them, as is. God is better at this than I am. I lift up one of my grown Sunday school kids who is in the I.C.U. with anorexia. I beseech God to intervene, and (God) does, through finding my girl a great nurse later that day. (Nurses are God's answer 35 percent of the time.)"

If your life is anything like Ann Lamott confesses hers is, then you sense how misleading the usual cultural standard of "perfect" can be, possibly for the church in Acts over 1900 years ago and certainly for the church today. Yet no less today than then -or anytime - are we called, and beckoned, and transformed by God's grace: (1) for the name of those who follow Jesus, (2) for the purpose of living toward God's ultimate goal of salvation as healing, and (3) for the characterization of being people who share God's love of grace-filled and honoraccording generosity with those who are both similar to us and rather different from us. Yes, since at least 2001, United Methodists have had a good idea: "Open hearts, open minds, open doors." When you add those together, you have "open lives." That's God's desire for us with others all the way to the end of time. If our being opened by grace is God's desire today and always, we can leave to God God's mysterious completed healing of us. Some call this our "perfecting." We can leave this to God's capability, realizing how this completed healing is possible for God, even though we individually and together fall short of "perfect" here and now all the time. By grace, may our lives be opened. - All honor and praise be to God.
