PASTOR'S 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

REV. MATTHEW B. MORSE, INTERIM PASTOR AND MODERATOR OF SESSION

To the First Presbyterian faithful,

Without diminishing the annual tradition of celebrating Volunteer of the Year, I would suggest that this really was the Year of the Volunteer. It was a year of transition as we saw long time members and friends move away or welcomed into God's eternal kingdom and also welcomed new faces into our worshiping community who are already contributing to our life together. With changes in our staffing structure, church members have stepped up to continue in leading worship, teaching our youth and children, and assisting the office on a weekly basis. Kudos to the newly formed stewardship team in encouraging many to step into big shoes to continue the work of FPC, even as some have cobbled new soles to further the ministry of Christ's church here in Bryan/College Station and beyond.

As a congregation, we continue to make an impact in our community both in our financial giving, and the giving of time and energy. This year saw the continuation of Concerts on Carter Creek, hosting National Night Out, the renewal of Blessing of the Animals, hosting Rise Against Hunger, and a Fall Festival joint effort with the Children's Center which was an incredible success and a wonderful witness to our neighborhood.

Speaking of the Children's Center, can we get an applause for the work Ashton is doing as our new director? The introduction of Bright Wheel and entry into becoming officially a Texas Rising Star are among the highlights of her first year in leadership. The relationship between the church and the Children's Center has perhaps never been stronger. This past year we witnessed the baptism of three young children- all who attend school here. We are jointly working on a new playground, and we continue to facilitate regular chapel with the kids. Among other continued activities on-site are the Men's Breakfast, Prime Time, Presbyterian Women, our shared grief group, three, separate AA groups, and hosting the Korean Church, - so we are making good use of our space!

Even though I am proclaiming 2024 as the Year of the Volunteer, I would be remiss to not lift up our amazing staff. David and Lisa continue to lead our worshiping community in music. I am not only grateful for their directing roles, but also for their nurturing of scholarship singers which has brought a new depth to our worship together. Angela and Valerie worked consistently to ensure that people in need were met with the best opportunity for assistance either from direct benevolent funding or direction to providing long-term assistance. Jerry Norris and his AV crew continue to expand our witness and reach to those place-bound and some who just happen to come across our live-streamed services; another way of extending the church's reach and impact. Rusty and Rosie continue to staff and oversee an amazing crew that ensure our building and grounds are top-notch for both worshipers and visitors. And to Donna, who alongside our treasurers, has helped us transition into a new means of church and finance reporting that will ensure a secure future for FPC.

As FPC journeys forward in search of a new pastor, we spent time last year in listening sessions to not only discern what qualities we are looking for in a pastor but also exploring the strengths and areas for growth in our congregation. We elected a Pastor Nominating Committee, and we continue to pray over their work. I want to applaud our session and their excellent work and leadership during this time of transition. I am grateful to serve as your Interim Pastor and thankful for the good work we accomplished in 2024 – both internally and externally – and have no reason to believe that the work we do together in 2025 will not be equally, if not exceedingly, an incredible witness to Christ and His Church.

Major responsibilities of the Foundation include managing the congregation's bequest funds effectively and in a safe and prudent manner while also encouraging additional bequests. In 1978, two families, Don Lee and Misses Edith and Ethel Cavitt, gifted monies to the church funds which eventually totaled over a million dollars. The purpose of those funds was to support and expand the ministry of the church.

In 1984, the Session, with congregational approval, created the First Presbyterian Church, Bryan 244 Foundation to manage these gifts. The FPC Foundation is a separate, legal entity incorporated under the 245 laws of the State of Texas. Nine members of the congregation serve six-year terms as Trustees. 246 Trustees are nominated by the church nominating committee and elected by the congregation. It is 247 important to note that the Trustees do not determine how the earnings are spent but rather to make 248 249 available an amount annually to the Session for use in the ministry and support of the church. Trustees use a rolling 36 month average of the earnings of the assets when providing the dollar amount available 250 to the Session for the following year. A number of years ago, the Foundation made the decision to 251 employ the Texas Presbyterian Foundation as the professional funds' manager. Trustees regularly 252 253 review the performance of the TPF Foundation and make adjustments, if needed, as to the various categories of funds utilized. At all times, the primary mission of the FPC Bryan Foundation is to ensure 254 that these funds are invested in a safe and prudent manner. This mission aligns directly with the mission 255 of the TPF Foundation. 256

- 257 Church members currently serving as Trustees (as of 12/31/2024) are: Janice Bradshaw, John Halsell,
 258 Adelle Hedleston, Glenn Mathews, Susan McGrail, Jim Nachlinger, Ken Telg (term expiring 12/31/2024),
 259 Julie Wattenbarger and Marilyn Wright. David Holdredge has been elected by the Congregation as a
 260 Trustee. His six year term begins 1/1/2025.
- There are four individual accounts included under the umbrella of assets managed by the FPC Bryan Foundation. Those accounts, with 1/9/2025 market balances, are as follows:
 - The main account, which includes the funds originally donated by Don Lee and the Cavitt sisters, had a balance of \$5,606,874. This is the account that provides the major source of Foundation earnings to the Session. For 2025, that account will provide \$188,000 to the Session to be used in the church budget as the Session deems appropriate.
 - Concerts on Carter Creek, a gift provided by John Otts, had a balance of \$98,023. For 2025, \$3,600 is being provided to the Session to help these concerts.
 - The Aline Brogdon Fund had a balance of \$116,121. These funds may be used as deemed appropriate by the Session.
 - The Erin Buenger Fund had a balance of \$198,996. Income from this fund is to be used to support children's/youth programs at FPC. The Foundation makes distributions from this account when requested by the Session. The last distribution of \$4,344 was made in 2018.

The total of the above funds under management by the Foundation is \$6,020,014. By the end of 2025, the Foundation will have provided more than \$5,627,363 in earnings to the Session since the Foundation's inception in 1984. Clearly these dollars have made a significant impact on the life and ministry of this church. It should also be noted that since the original very generous donation by two long-time families of to this congregation, other donations have been made by church members. Members of FPC are encouraged to consider contributing to the Foundation and to including the

Foundation in their estate planning. As evidenced by the above numbers, gifts of any size to the FPC, Bryan Foundation are truly gifts that keep on giving. The list that follows identifies some of the organizations and entities that have received support from this church, in large part because of the earnings of the Foundation. This is not a complete list, nor was it intended to be. But it does highlight the significant impact that these dollars have made.

We believe that you will be truly impressed with the various forms of outreach these dollars have made possible, keeping in mind that if an actual compilation could be made over the last 40 years, the list and impact would be even far greater. Please take the time at your leisure to review this list.

Cheryl Page worked with Debe Shafer to identify Center needs that fit the parameters of the Astin Grant. The Center was awarded grant funds totaling \$10,000.00 for tuition subsidies and playground equipment.

ACTIVITIES AND EVENTS The Committee focused on outreach to all members of the congregation through cards, notes, texts and emails. We also organized an Easter brunch and participated in the National Night Out.

FINANCE COMMITTEE 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

In 2024, the Stewardship and Finance Committee separated into two committees with the goal of allowing each to focus more deeply on its respective mission. The responsibilities of the Finance Committee include overseeing the administering of the budget throughout the year and preparing the annual church budget for presentation to the Session.

Each month: The Finance Committee reviewed the previous month's financials. The Treasurer provided monthly highlights and addressed any questions or concerns.

January 2024: A Microsoft account was obtained for the Finance Committee. This account allows for seamless file sharing and continuity for future committee moderators and members.

January 2024: The 2024 church budget was updated to consider end-of-year financial information for 2023 and expectations for 2024.

February 2024: The 2024 church budget was presented to the congregation by the Finance Committee moderator on February 11th. Feedback from the congregation, including tracking trends in giving and pledges and focusing on mission outreach, was discussed and noted for consideration in the 2025 church budget.

March 2024: A condensed financial summary was created to be presented monthly at Session meetings in addition to the full financial report. This was done with the purpose of conveying information more concisely during Session meetings so that committees could more easily keep track of the status of the year-to-date financials.

April 2024: In response to congregation feedback at the February 2024 meeting, a spreadsheet was created to track trends in giving and pledges over the last five years while keeping donor information anonymous. This spreadsheet calculates the number of donors, amounts of pledges over time, and average giving per capita in our congregation. This information is helpful in informing future budgeting.

April 2024: Annual disbursements for United Campus Ministries and the First Presbyterian Children's Center were authorized.

May 2024: The Treasurer contacted the CPA firm, Thompson, Derrig, and Craig, to initiate the church audit.

May 2024: In anticipation of the pastoral search, a salary range was developed and suggested to the Session for consideration. The range was calculated by taking FPC Bryan's previous senior pastor's effective salary, considering typical year-over-year increases, and developing an interval around that estimate to allow for a range of salary options.

July 2024: In conjunction with the Administration Committee, the Finance Committee helped to identify candidates for Treasurer in 2025.

July 2024: In conjunction with the Treasurer, the Finance Committee helped to identify which accounts fall under the purview of which committees. Once identified, this allows for monthly financial reports to

be generated and sent directly to committee moderators each month for consideration at their meetings and at the monthly Session meeting.

July 2024: The Finance Committee reviewed the Astin grant budget proposal for 2025.

August 2024: The Finance Committee considered upcoming increases in Board of Pension expenses to begin in 2025 and to be accounted for in the 2025 budget planning process.

September 2024: In conjunction with Treasurer, committee moderators were contacted and asked to begin consideration of financial needs in advance of 2025 budget planning.

October 2024: The Finance Committee received notice that the Astin grant funding was approved for \$75,000 in 2025.

October 2024: The Finance Committee received a draft budget from the Administration Committee for consideration, which included funding for the newly created Director of Faith Formation.

October 2024: The Finance Committee received notice from the Foundation that \$188,000 had been allocated for use in 2025. In accordance with previous years, the Committee agreed to allocate money into the following categories in equal shares: property, mission, and operations.

November 2024: The conversion to the financial software QuickBooks was completed. Using this software, tailored financial reports can be generated and sent to Committee moderators automatically each month.

December 2024: A preliminary version of the 2025 budget was created. This draft will be updated in early 2025 as end-of-year financials are available and will be presented to the congregation at the annual meeting in February 2025.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT - 2024

The Property Committee is responsible for the stewardship, maintenance, and enhancement of the Church's physical assets. This includes buildings, grounds, and equipment; ensuring they are safe, functional, and welcoming for all members and visitors. Notable improvements to the church in 2024 included installing new playground equipment, replacing the fencing and gates and remulching around one of the playgrounds (as part of an Eagle Scout project), installing and painting new exterior and fire escape doors for the FPCC, installing security cameras throughout the building, and installing new cameras in the sanctuary for live-streaming the service. Other notable repairs include fixing the AC chiller for the front hallway and church offices, repairing leaks in the steeple, installing a new railing for the choir loft, repainting the portico on the Gordon St. side of the building, and replacing the ice maker in the kitchen.

Throughout the year, the property committee also approved numerous requests to use the facility by groups outside of the church. This year, weekly meetings were held on church property for Boy Scout Troop 976, 3 AA groups, the A&M Korean Student church (2x a week), and the Bryan Community Church while they were finding their own building. In addition, over 20 special events were approved by the property committee including Concerts on Carter Creek, a BCS Marathon refreshment station, a Boy Scout Court of Honor, and concerts hosted by the Brazos County Music Teacher's Association, BCS Friends of Chamber Music, a new local acapella group and more. The property committee also approved requests to use the church van by groups outside the church, which occurred 6 times by Boy Scout Troop 976.

The property committee has several projects continuing into 2025. A safety/security ad hoc committee was created to review, update, and document policies pertaining to the safety and security of the building. Policies include managing building access, CPR/AED training of certain church members and staff, and storing and viewing security camera footage. The property committee also continues to address issues with the sound in the sanctuary. Finally, the property committee has identified major repair projects that should occur within the next few years, namely replacement of the AC unit in the sanctuary and repairing water damage to the stained glass windows.

STEWARDSHIP 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

In 2024, the Stewardship Committee was separated from the Stewardship and Finance Committee to allow greater focus on stewardship-related issues within the church. This change was prompted by the significant volume of business typically discussed at the combined committee meetings, which left insufficient time to adequately address both stewardship and financial matters. The church operations manual was updated to reflect the creation of this separate committee, and the committee's duties and membership distribution were realigned to better serve the needs of stewardship.

Stewardship Campaign and Key Activities

The primary work of the Stewardship Committee in 2024 was organizing a stewardship campaign. This included developing a campaign theme, planning special events, and engaging the congregation in the spirit of giving. A kickoff lunch was held on October 13, 2024, to outline the church's anticipated expenses for 2025, focusing on unique needs for the coming year.

A series of six short "stewardship moments" were delivered by various speakers during Sunday worship services on October 13, October 20, October 27, November 3, November 10, and November 17. These moments helped connect the congregation to the stewardship message and its importance.

The committee also designed estimate-of-giving cards that incorporated the stewardship theme and logo: "Time, Talent, Treasure." These cards were tied to the supporting Bible story of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-37), emphasizing verse 37: "Go and do likewise." Volunteer cards were distributed during the Stewardship potluck and highlighted during worship services, with cards made available in the pews.

Volunteer Support

A key effort during 2024 was the committee's support of Volunteer Coordinator Valerie O'Brien. Committee members assisted her by making appeals during Church School classes and recruiting volunteers primarily to help man the church phones during staff meetings and other special times, but there were other specific requests made as well. This partnership ensured adequate volunteer coverage for critical tasks and reinforced the committee's commitment to service.

Suggestion Boxes

Another notable initiative was the creation of both virtual and physical suggestion boxes. While the number of suggestions submitted in the first year was modest, they yielded meaningful feedback and questions, which were directed to the appropriate individuals or committees for follow-up. Additionally, the physical suggestion boxes were used to collect pledge cards in a way that preserved privacy for each giver. These cards were securely passed along in envelopes to the church treasurer for processing.

Rise Against Hunger Event

One of the committee's major accomplishments was bringing back the Rise Against Hunger meal-packing event on November 2, 2024. This event had been skipped in 2023 due to significant transitions but returned stronger than ever. Volunteer participation was exceptional, with over 120 individuals contributing their time, surpassing the initial requirement of 100 volunteers. Participants included members from various local congregations and organizations, such as:

The volunteers completed packing 15,000 meals ahead of schedule. Rise Against Hunger staff encouraged the church to consider sponsoring a larger number of meals in the future, suggesting potential collaboration with other congregations to share funding and volunteer efforts. Since 2013, First Presbyterian Church Bryan has collectively prepared 100,000 meals through this initiative.

Conclusion

The work of the Stewardship Committee in 2024 has laid a strong foundation for future efforts. From organizing impactful stewardship campaigns to supporting volunteer initiatives and reviving beloved community events, the committee has demonstrated its dedication to fostering a culture of stewardship within the church. Looking ahead, the committee remains committed to addressing the evolving needs of the congregation and building on this year's successes.

WORSHIP COMMITTEE 2024 ANNUAL REPORT

The Worship Committee has engaged with a wide-ranging slate of activities, issues and oversight responsibilities during 2024, marked particularly by endorsement of the emerging Choral Scholars' Program and the ongoing need to secure communion supplies, ushers, weekly chancel flowers and special flowers for holiday memorials such as Christmas poinsettias and Easter lilies.

The Choral Scholars program provides stipends to Texas A&M students who have been chosen to participate in musical performances throughout the year. They are paid to rehearse with the church choir and to perform during Sunday services. Begun in 2023 by Director of Music Ministries David Kipp, the program has grown steadily; and FPC members are delighted to be the beneficiaries of the musical talent of these young people and to have regular opportunities to interact with them during worship and fellowship events.

The program is funded by the Astin Charitable Foundation. In 2024, the Worship Committee applied for and received renewal of the original grant. The committee's budget now serves as a pass through for the funds on a regular basis, thus establishing ongoing oversight as a portion of the committee's oversight of the entire music program.

The committee sees to it that communion supplies are replenished each month, specifically by supplying home-baked bread morsels, grape juice and an unscored display loaf of bread. The committee collaborates regularly with member Vicki Gergeni, who kindly labors to prepare by hand the bread morsels each month and delivers them to the parlor kitchen. Committee members provide grape juice and unscored bread loaves for the ritual on a rotating basis.

In a similar coordination/oversight activity, the Worship Committee communicates regularly with the church administrative assistant, Angela Robinson, to monitor the quality and placement of chancel flowers and special event flowers and to negotiate with vendors when indicated.

Recruitment of ushers for Sunday worship service unquestionably is the most conspicuous and demanding ongoing activity handled by the Worship Committee. A small number of members rotate the task of securing about eight to sixteen ushers each month, 12 months a year. Since the current committee has only three to four members, they would love to welcome new volunteers.

 The following items represent some of the additional accomplishments of the Worship Committee this past year:

- Prepared a bread loaf display for the chancel for World Communion Sunday, Oct. 6
- Received and accepted administrative revisions to the church's wedding policy, as requested by the Administrative Committee and carried out by Wedding Coordinator, Rachel Cochrane
- Arranged periodic advertisements in The Bryan Eagle publicizing holiday services
- Revised description of activities/responsibilities of The Worship Committee to be placed in online collection of church documents
- Exercise oversight of improvements to the audio-visual booth (member representative will collaborate with streaming committee)
- Arranged for additional flowers, greenery and supplies for Holy Week services (Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday and Easter)
- Sponsored assembly of kits designed for administering off-site or homebound communion
- Sponsored purchase of new hearing devices for use during Sunday Worship
- Collaborated in purchase of PTZ camera mics to update audio capability
- Met monthly as a committee; wrote formal typed agendas and formal typed minutes for each meeting; wrote action tems and took votes when appropriate
- Recently appointed by Session to convey payment by check to guest preachers sourced from a line item (pulpit supply) in the Worship Committee budget
- Recommended dates for the Lord's Supper to the Session (for 2024)

PASTOR NOMINATING COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT

MEMBERS: Kaitlyn Battles, Karen Berg (Vice Mod.), Janice Bradshaw, Walter Buenger (Mod.), Rachel Cochrane, Bailey Cravatt, Jasen Petersen, and Rev. Amy Klinkovsky (Presbytery Liaison).

The Pastor Nominating Committee (PNC) of First Presbyterian Church, Bryan (FPC) first met on June 20, 2024. The committee has accomplished the following:

- Completed and edited the Ministry Discernment Profile (MDP) begun by the FPC Session writing team.
- With endorsement by the FPC Session, received approval of the MDP by the FPC Clerk of Session and Presbytery.
- Posted the MDP on the PC(USA)'s Church Leadership Connection (CLC) website.
- Advertised and reached out to those familiar with potential high-quality applicants and FPC for assistance in identifying the best candidates for our open position.
- Provided an update of progress to date to the congregation at Rally Day, September 8, 2024.
- Carefully considered 24 candidates that came to us either through matches and accepted invitations
 to apply on the CLC or through self-referrals that were received through our advertising and outreach
 efforts.
- Used a quantitative evaluation of each candidate's Personal Discernment Profile (PDP) by a PNC team
 and assessments of sermons and supporting material provided on that PDP by the entire PNC to decide
 on superior candidates.
- A PNC team then conducted video conferences with those superior candidates and reported back to the entire PNC
- After the video conferences, the best candidates as determined by the entire PNC have met face-to-face with another PNC team
- After hearing the reports on the face-to-face interviews, if the entire PNC decided to further consider a candidate, various members of the PNC have thoroughly checked references. During this time, all members of the PNC again evaluated each remaining candidate by carefully listening to their sermons, reviewing other available supporting material, and rereading their PDP.
- We have then thoughtfully and prayerfully discussed the remaining candidates at a PNC meeting. We currently have six candidates worthy of further consideration.
- Our goal is to use this ongoing discernment process to invite to Bryan the top three to four candidates for a half day meeting with the entire PNC.

To be consistent and fair, the same PNC team conducted all quantitative evaluations. Another team comprised of different members of the PNC has been conducting all the video conferences, and a third team has been conducting the face-to-face interviews. During our twelve committee meetings (June-December), committee members of each team have been exchanging reports on the activities of each team and sharing information about each possible candidate. Guided by the Holy Spirit through this collaborative and systematic process, we hope to find the best possible pastor for our Church.

Committee members have all worked hard to fulfill the trust placed in them by the Congregation. They deserve our thanks. Thanks as well to the Congregation for their prayers and support. You have lifted us up.

As Presbyterian Women (PW) we commit ourselves to nurture our faith through prayer and Bible study; support the mission of the church worldwide; work for justice and peace; and build an inclusive, caring community of women that strengthens the Presbyterian Church, (U.S.A.) and witnesses to the promise of God's kingdom.

At present, approximately 69 women are participating in the Horizons Bible Study, "Let Justice Roll Down" by Patricia K. Tull.

Presbyterian Women have the opportunity to annually pledge financial support for (a) our local operational expenses, (b) donations to local (non-profit) organizations, and (c) FPC-Bryan hospitality (e.g., funeral receptions). Local organizations supported include Anson Jones and Henderson Elementary Schools; Aggieland Humane Society; BVCIL; the BEE Community; BCS Together; Mobility Worldwide Brazos Valley; Ronald McDonald House; The Salvation Army; Unbound Now BCS; Unlimited Potential; and Voices for Children.

In addition, three offerings are collected each year for various mission projects in the United States and around the world: (1) Birthday Offering, (2) Thank Offering, and (3) Least Coin Offering.

The PW Birthday Celebration Tea and Officer Installation was held on Sunday, April 28, 2024. The 2024-2025 officers were introduced and installed. The Birthday Offering was received and dedicated.

The Annual Fall Gathering kicked off the new PW year on August 26, 2024, with a Salad and Dessert Supper. Circles furnished all the food and Boy Scouts assisted. The 2024-2025 PW Coordinating Team was introduced, and the Least Coin Offering was received and dedicated. Approximately 35 people attended. PW donated almost \$350 in gift cards to help two local schools: Anson Jones and Henderson Elementary. These gift cards will help support the needs of faculty and staff at each school.

The Thank Offering Dedication and a Soup/Salad/Dessert Supper was held on November 4, 2024. There were approximately 55 in attendance. Each Circle contributed to the meal and the Boy Scouts of Troop 977 helped serve and clean up. We were entertained by the Brazos Valley Youth String Chamber Orchestra, a parent and child music program which focuses on teaching, guiding and supporting youth who are economically disadvantaged. We were inspired by this unique group for parents and children who connect and bond through the shared experience of playing instruments together. An honorarium check was presented to the group at the conclusion of their presentation.

The women of FPC-Bryan take an active role in the **everyday activities of this church**. We serve in roles from church officers to Sunday school teachers, members of various committees and in the choir. We are an integral part of this church and take great comfort in our strong association with it.
