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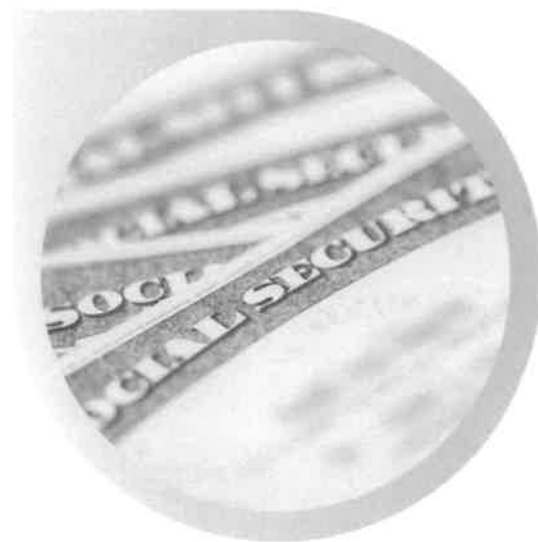
Checklist of Important Documents

Every family should be prepared in case of an emergency. Parents may want to plan for their children's care in the event they are detained, deported, incapacitated, or otherwise unavailable for any period of time.

Delegation of Parental/Guardian Powers

The Delegation designates another person (called the “attorney-in-fact”) to make decisions regarding a minor child/ren in lieu of the child/ren’s parent or legal guardian. **The “attorney-in-fact” can be any reliable person and does not have to be a lawyer.** It is not a court order. It is accepted by many, but not all, people or organizations as proof that the person has the legal right to make decisions for the child/ren.

Relative Caregiver Affidavit

This form permits a family member (“Relative Caregiver”) to consent to medical treatment and educational services for a minor child (that the minor child cannot otherwise legally consent to him/herself) if the consent of the legal parent or guardian cannot be obtained. For this reason, **it cannot be filled out in advance, but can only be completed after the parent becomes unavailable and the child is already living with the family member.** If you have chosen a family member to be the caregiver for your child in the event that you become unavailable, you should give a blank copy of this form to them to use if necessary. Make sure they know that they must fill out the English version of the form.

Delegation of Parental Powers Form

Notice to person receiving this form: ORS 109.056 allows a parent or guardian of a minor child to delegate parental powers to another person for six months (or 12 months if the person is a school administrator) using a delegation of parental authority. If you receive a signed copy of this form, you must allow the person named in this form to make decisions for the minor named in this form. If you have questions about your responsibilities upon receiving this form, please talk to a lawyer.

Birth Certificates

It is a good idea to obtain an original birth certificate for your child. Also give a copy to your chosen caregiver.

Mexican Birth Certificates

Visit the Mexican Consulate at **1305 SW 12th Ave., Portland OR 97201, (503) 274-1442, portland@sre.gob.mx.**

Bring and present an identification document to prove the applicant is the person seeking the birth certificate.

Present the CURP (Clave Única de Registro de Población/population registration code) that can be obtained at the website consultas.curp.gob.mx/CurpSP/



Social Security Cards

Any person that is a US citizen, or is otherwise eligible for a Social Security Number and Social Security card, should have a Social Security Number and Social Security card. If your child does not have a Social Security Number or card and is a US citizen or otherwise eligible, you should apply for one.

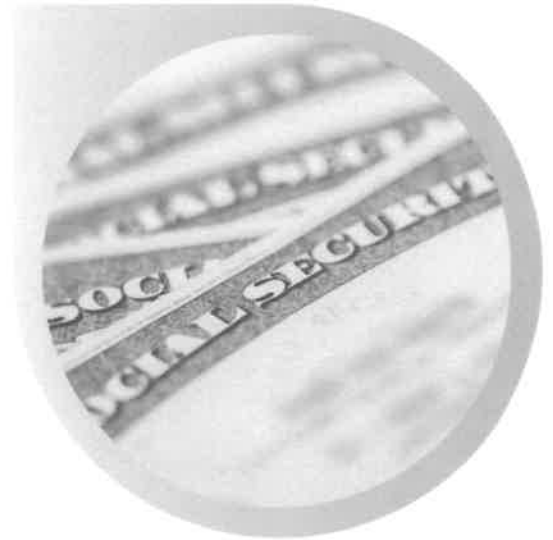
The form is also available at the local Social Security Administration office located at **2504 Oakmont Way, Eugene, OR 97401**. No appointment is required and there is a dropbox if you just need to drop off the application and evidence documents.

U.S. Passports

If a child is a US citizen or otherwise eligible for a passport, he/she should get a passport. The passport requires signatures from both parents. If there is only one parent available, another form must be filled out. If the child has a passport, he/she can travel outside of the country and return lawfully. If the child is from another country, a passport may still be helpful within that country.

The [UO Ticket Office](#) is an authorized U.S. Government Passport Acceptance Facility.

Services are walk-up only and no appointment is needed. They have all the necessary forms and can take photos. The office is located on the ground floor of the EMU Building at **1395 University St. Eugene. Open M-F 10:30am-5:30pm.**

Mexican Passports

To obtain a passport for minors and people with disabilities, both parents must be present with the minor and present the following documents:

1. Birth certificate
2. Parent consent form
3. Official ID and photo

To apply:

1. Make an appointment by calling 1-877-639-4835 or on the Internet at miconsulado.sre.gob.mx.
2. Go to the consulate the day of your appointment and fill out the passport application. The document will be ready the same day.



US-Mexico Dual Citizenship

For dual citizenship of US citizen minor, either or both parents can present any of the following to the Mexican Consulate to prove their Mexican nationality:

1. Original long copy format of minor's birth certificate (plus one photocopy)
2. Parents' original birth certificates and 2 photocopies of each
3. Parents' valid photo IDs and 2 photocopies of each
4. Photocopies of two witnesses' IDs

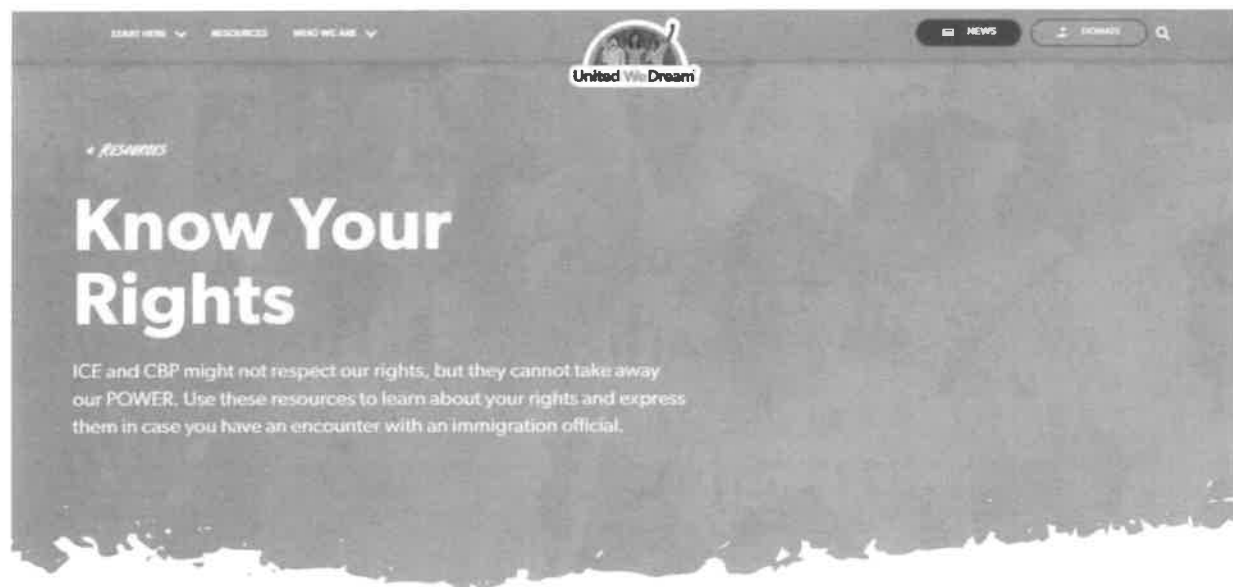

IMMIGRATION AGENTS COME TO YOUR HOME

Prepare Yourself

- Fill out your preparedness plan and put it in a folder labeled "Privilege & Confidential" and give it to a person you trust.
- Create a plan in advance with your family and friends. Assign who will be in charge of your case and who will support at different capacities.
- Make sure your photos and videos are being synced to the cloud (e.g. iCloud or Google photos) in case you record an interaction with ICE so that other people can access it.
- Make sure the fences you have in your home are closed. This means that the gate has to be closed with a lock at all times.
- Paste a 'Know Your Rights' flyer and a reminder to record any interaction with ICE inside your door.

Defend Yourself

- Keep Calm
- Do not open the door
- If immigration agents enter your home without your permission, verbally express that you do not give them permission to enter your home or search your belongings. Ask for a search and arrest warrant.
- Do not answer any questions. Exercise your right to remain silent. If you do choose to answer questions, remember not to lie.
- Do not sign any documents
- Ask to speak with your lawyer or a loved one.
- If you feel safe, record the event with your cell phone either through video or audio only.
- ICE Lies: Do not agree to what ICE asks. For example, do not follow them to their office, to immigration offices like USCIS, or to meet them for coffee.

While asserting your rights does not guarantee the stop of an arrest at the moment, it is important to exercise our rights to facilitate our defense. You are not alone. Our movement is ready to support you, fight for your freedom, and reclaim the humanity of our community.

Immigration Agents at Your Home – Prepare



1. Create a preparedness plan and store it in a "**Privilege & Confidential**" folder. Share it with someone you trust.
2. Plan with family/friends. Assign roles for support and handling your case.
3. Sync photos and videos to the cloud (e.g., iCloud or Google Photos).
4. Keep your fences locked.
5. Tape a 'Know Your Rights' flyer inside your door.

Immigration Agents at Your Home – Defend



1. Stay calm. **Do not open the door.**
2. If agents enter without permission, say, "I do not consent to this search." **Ask for a warrant.**
3. Do not answer questions or lie. Exercise your right to remain silent.
4. **Do not** sign anything.
5. Ask to speak to your lawyer or a trusted person.
6. Record the event safely if possible.
7. **Remember:** ICE may lie—do not agree to follow them anywhere.

IMMIGRATION AGENTS APPROACH YOU IN PUBLIC

Prepare Yourself

- Fill out your preparedness plan and put it in a folder labeled "Privilege & Confidential" and give it to a person you trust.
- Create a plan in advance with your family and friends. Assign who will be in charge of your case and who will support at different capacities.
- Make sure your photos and videos are being synced to the cloud (e.g. iCloud or Google photos) in case you record an interaction with ICE so that other people can access it.
- Join a local pro immigrant rights group.
- Don't carry a passport. A passport is a travel document and if you have it on you while detained, it can help ICE deport you faster.
- Don't provide a foreign ID, this includes your consulate card, foreign driver's license, foreign voting card, etc. A foreign ID reveals to the ICE agent that you were born in another country that is not the U.S.

Defend Yourself

- Ask them to identify themselves.
- Provide your name only.
- Remain silent – if you choose to speak, remember to not lie.
- Ask for a warrant and check to see if your name is on it and spelled correctly.
- Record and report the incident.
- Stay calm and don't run.
- Don't share your personal or loved one's information (name, address, etc).
- Don't take ICE to your house to pick up your ID.
- Do not sign anything. Do not consent to being searched.

1. Create a preparedness plan and store it in a **"Privilege & Confidential"** folder. Share it with someone you trust. Assign who will be in charge of your case and who will support at different capacities.
2. Sync photos & videos to the cloud in case you record an interaction with ICE, other people can access it.
3. Avoid carrying a passport or foreign ID.
4. Join a pro-immigrant rights group.

Immigration Agents in Public – Defend



1. Ask them to identify themselves.
2. Provide your name only.
3. Stay silent or avoid lying if you speak.
4. Request a warrant and verify it.
5. Record the incident and stay calm.
6. Do not share personal details or take ICE to your home.
7. Do not sign anything or consent to searches.

IF IMMIGRATION AGENTS COME TO YOUR JOB

Prepare Yourself

- Prepare a plan with your co-workers / employer in case immigration comes to your place of work.
- Fill out your preparedness plan and put it in a folder labeled "Privilege & Confidential" and give it to a person you trust.
- Create a plan in advance with your family and friends. Assign who will be in charge of your case and who will support at different capacities.
- Make sure your photos and videos are being synced to the cloud (e.g. iCloud or Google photos) in case you record an interaction with ICE so that other people can access it.
- Join a local pro immigrant rights group.
- Carry valid documentation at all times or a copy of your pending process.
- Don't provide a foreign ID, this includes your consulate card, foreign driver's license, foreign voting card, etc. A foreign ID reveals to the ICE agent that you were born in another country that is not the U.S.
- Download the Notifica App and add your emergency contacts with an emergency message. We suggest that this message includes the contact of a trusted person that has and knows your preparedness plan.

Defend Yourself

- Remain silent – if you choose to speak, remember to not lie.
- Show your valid documentation or copy of your pending process.
- Ask for a warrant and check to see if your name is on it and spelled correctly.
- Do not sign anything.
- Do not consent to being searched – verbally say, "I do not consent to being searched".

Immigration Agents at Work – Prepare



1. Plan with co-workers/employers for possible raids.
2. Share your preparedness plan with someone you trust.
3. Join a local pro-immigrant rights group.
4. Sync your photos/videos to the cloud.
5. Carry valid documentation or proof of a pending case.
6. Avoid carrying a passport or foreign ID.

Immigration Agents at Work – Defend



1. **Remain silent** – if you choose to speak, remember to not lie.
2. Show your **valid** documentation or copy of your pending process.
3. Ask for a warrant and check to see if your name is on it and spelled correctly.
4. **Do not sign** anything.
5. Do not consent to being searched – verbally say, “**I do not consent to being searched**”.

TEXT KNOW YOUR POWER TO 787-57

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RECORD & REPORT

- **Step 1:** Ensure that audio and video is on and ready to be used and shared to a cloud.
- **Step 2:** Get information of officer's name, badge number, and agency.
- **Step 3:** Narrate the date, time, and location where the incident occurred.
- **Step 4:** Do not disclose the information of your loved ones or yourself to the agents.

CHILD TRAVEL CONSENT FORM

Video-Child Travel Consent Form

A **Child Travel Consent Form** provides official parental or guardian authorization for a child to travel when unaccompanied by both parents or legal guardians. It is often required for domestic and international travel to prevent legal and administrative complications.

PURPOSE OF A CHILD TRAVEL CONSENT FORM

This form ensures a child's safety and confirms that all guardians approve of the travel arrangements. In cases of custody orders restricting travel, this document provides legal clarity and prevents unauthorized trips.

A consent form is necessary when a minor travels:

- Alone
- With a school, sports, religious, or musical group
- With one legal guardian or parent
- With a family friend or relative
- With a daycare provider

DO I NEED A MINOR TRAVEL CONSENT FORM?

Most airlines classify anyone under 18 as a minor. If your child is under 18, a consent form is typically required for international travel, or when traveling with someone who isn't their legal guardian.

For certain age groups (e.g., 5-12 or 5-14), airlines may have additional unaccompanied minor procedures that must be followed alongside this form.

CHECKLIST FOR COMPLETING A MINOR TRAVEL CONSENT FORM

To ensure a smooth travel experience, follow these steps:

1. **Collect the child's and accompanying adult's personal information.**
2. **Confirm trip details** (destination, travel dates, purpose).
3. **Check airline requirements** for travel consent and notarization.
4. **Verify U.S. embassy requirements** for the destination country.
5. **Ensure all legal guardians provide consent.**
6. **Provide emergency contact details.**
7. **Schedule notarization, if necessary.**

REQUIREMENTS FOR U.S. CITIZEN CHILDREN TRAVELING INTERNATIONALLY

- **Outside the U.S.:** A U.S. passport, notarized consent letter, and any airline-required unaccompanied minor forms.
- **To Canada or Mexico:** A U.S. passport, Trusted Traveler Program card, notarized consent letter, and any required airline forms.

HOW TO WRITE A CHILD TRAVEL CONSENT FORM

1. **Child's Information:** Full name, birthdate, birthplace, passport details.
2. **Parent/Guardian Information:** Name(s), phone number, address.
3. **Accompanying Adult's Information:** Name, relationship to child, passport details.
4. **Trip Details:** Destination, travel dates, purpose, accommodation details.
5. **Medical Authorization:** State whether the escort has permission for medical decisions.
6. **Emergency Contact Information:** Include at least one reliable emergency contact.
7. **Child's Medical Insurance Information:** Provide necessary medical details.

TRAVEL SCENARIOS AND REQUIREMENTS

1. What if a Child Travels Alone?

- Children **15+** may fly domestically without unaccompanied minor procedures.
- Children **5-14** typically require airline-specific unaccompanied minor procedures, including consent forms.
- International travelers must carry a **passport, visa (if required), and a parental consent form.**

2. What if a Child Travels With One Parent?

- If separated/divorced, the traveling parent should **obtain written consent from the other parent.**
- Even if parents are together, a **consent form is advisable** to avoid complications.
- If sole custody applies, carry a **court custody document.**

3. What if a Child Travels With a Legal Guardian?

- Legal guardians usually have travel authority but may need a consent form if:
 - The child's other legal guardian isn't traveling.
 - They have a different last name than the child.
 - A court order restricts travel.
 - The airline has specific requirements.
