Saint of the Week: St. Turibius of Mongrovejo



St. Turibius of Mongrovejo grew up in Spain and became a lawyer, then judge, priest, then bishop. Once a bishop, St. Turibius was sent to Peru to reform the whole area of the archdiocese, which had been exploited and oppressed by

conquerors. He devoted all his time and energy to helping the poor and abused, while still making time each day to celebrate Mass and Confession. The Holy Spirit was an active force in the many good works done by St. Turibius in Peru. He also founded schools, hospitals, and churches. May we look to St. Turibius for inspiration: that we too may have a heart of compassion for those less fortunate, to speak out against injustice, and actively spread love and kindness to others who are suffering.

2023 Lenten Obligations

1. The days of fast and abstinence are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.

2. All other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence (see note below with regards to March 17).

3. The obligation of fast applies only to Catholics between the ages of 18 and 59. Fasting in the Catholic tradition means to limit oneself to one full meal and two smaller meals which together are not equal to a full meal, so as to experience hunger.

4. The obligation of abstinence applies to all Catholics who have reached the age of 14. Abstinence in the Catholic tradition means to abstain from meat.

Pontifical Good Friday Collection

Pope Francis has asked our parish to support the Pontifical Good Friday Collection, which helps Christians in the Holy Land, where they are now less than 2% of the population. Your support is essential to help the Church minister in parishes, provide Catholic Schools, and offer religious education. The Pontifical Good Friday Collection also helps to preserve the sacred shrines of Christianity, including Jerusalem, Nazareth, and Bethlehem. Pastors Column : March 18 – 19, 2023

Today, the Fourth Sunday of Lent, is often called Laetare Sunday. Laetare comes from the Latin words that mean rejoice. The priest often wears rose colored vestments on this Sunday, rather the usual Lenten violet, reminding us to 'rejoice in the Lord.'

Lent is a penitential season and there is so much sorrow in the world that can make it hard to be joyful. But Laetare Sunday reminds us that Christians always have reason for a certain holy joy. We can be joyful that God loves us and sent Jesus to save us. We can rejoice that He hears our prayers and allows us to offer our sufferings to Him – as our share in the Cross of Christ – to help us on our way to Heaven.

Another reason for our joy is the Truth that God is willing to forgive our sins. It is good to see people coming to Confession during our Lenten Holy Hours on Tuesday evenings. Remember that this week and next, we will have Fr. Joseph Kubiak, OFM Cap., as an extra Confessor on Tuesday evenings from 7 - 8 PM – along with our parish priests. In addition to providing another confessor, Fr. Joe is able to hear Confessions in Polish for those who need that.

God's willingness to forgive our sins and repair the damage they caused has been revealed through many approved apparitions granted to saints over the years. One of the most recent is the appearance of Our Lord to St. Faustina Kowalska in 1931. Calling Himself the 'King of Divine Mercy,' Our Lord asked St. Faustina to have painted the now famous image of Him in a white garment with white and red rays of light emanating from Him. He also asked that this image of Him be venerated – especially on the Sunday after Easter (Divine Mercy Sunday) – and promised that the 'faithful who venerate this image will not be lost.'

Accordingly, we will have Divine Mercy Devotions on Sunday, April 16, at 3 PM in our Church. The Divine Mercy Image – currently hanging outside the Confessionals – will be displayed near the altar for veneration. We will have Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, pray the Litany of Divine Mercy, and have Benediction as well.

One may gain an indulgence – partial or plenary – by participating in these devotions. For those who may not know, an indulgence is the 'remission in the eyes of God of the temporal punishment due to sins' that have been forgiven. In simple terms, an indulgence can reduce the time a soul spends in purgatory being purified and made ready for Heaven.

A partial indulgence frees a soul from some temporal punishment, while a plenary frees it from all that is due at that time. One may gain a partial indulgence by performing the indulged act – in this case praying the Litany of Divine Mercy with faith and devotion. To gain a plenary indulgence, one must also say a prayer for the pope, go to Confession and Communion within 20 days (before or after Divine Mercy Sunday), and be free from all attachment to sin.


Speaking of gaining an indulgence, one may also be gained by praying the Stations of the Cross – which are prayed in Church every Friday during Lent at 3 and 7 PM. Spending at least half an hour in prayer before the Blessed Sacrament is yet another way – as many of you have been doing at the Lenten Holy Hours on Tuesday evenings. Indeed, there are so many ways to receive the wonderful graces that our good and merciful God pours out to us – and I hope many of you will make good use of them.

I am happy to ask you to save the date for yet another grace filled event in our Church. We will have Forty Hours Devotions on June 11, 12, and 13. As the name implies, Forty Hours consists of having the Blessed Sacrament exposed and adored in Church for forty hours – day and night. There will be Evening Prayers and Benediction each of those days, with adoration in between.

Members of our Parish Life Committee are working with me to plan this Forty Hours. Among the things we will need are people – lots of people – to sign up to be present in the Church for an hour at a time during the Forty Hours. We cannot leave Jesus alone – we want to make sure that at least a small group is with Him throughout the time He is exposed on the Altar during Forty Hours. Take my word then I tell you that those who give Jesus the gift of an hour spent in quiet prayer and adoration will not regret it!

Please say a Hail Mary for me today and every day. Let's also pray for the sick of our parish, and for peace.


