2017 LENTEN REGULATIONS

The days of both Fast and Abstinence during Lent are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. The other Fridays of Lent are days of Abstinence.

On a day of Fast, only one (1) full meal is permitted. Those between the ages of 18 and 59 are obliged to fast.

On a day of Abstinence, no meat may be eaten. Those who have reached the age of 14 are obliged by the law of abstinence.

The obligation to observe the laws of Fast and abstinence "substantially", or as a whole, is a serious obligation.

The Fridays of the year, outside of Lent, are designated as days of penance, but each individual may substitute for the traditional abstinence from meat some other practice of voluntary self-denial as penance.

The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty*) extends from the First Sunday of Lent, <u>March 5, 2017</u> to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, June 11, 2017.

SPIRITUAL WARFARE

We are constantly under attack and tempted by the forces of EVIL. Every Tuesday afternoon from 2:00-3:00PM members of OLV parish meet and pray the Mary Mother of All Nations Novena which focuses on this daily battle. All are welcome. Join us.

EASTER DUTY

The time for fulfilling the Paschal Precept (Easter Duty), that is the obligation of receiving the Eucharist for Easter extends to the Solemnity of the Holy Trinity, June 11. No one conscious of committing a serious or mortal sin should receive Holy Communion until they have first gone to the Sacrament of Reconciliation a.k.a. Confession. Confessions are heard EVERY Saturday from 11:00AM to Noon and 3:00-3:30PM, every weekday morning at 7:30AM, and Fridays from 6:30-6:50PM. A Priest is also available to hear Confessions daily by appointment.

WHY STATIONS OF THE CROSS?

The 14 Stations of the Cross adorn the walls of almost every Catholic Church and chapel. Many parishioners commemorate the Fridays of Lent with a prayerful remembrance of the Passion of Christ by walking the stations with Him. Throughout our history, Christians have longed to literally walk in the footsteps of Christ. The shrines of the holy places in and around Jerusalem have drawn pilgrims inspired by the life and death of their Master.

However, not everyone is able to travel to the Holy Land. So, ever since the Middle Ages, churches and chapels began erecting images devoted to an aspect of the Passion. By the 15th century, the Franciscans had developed a devotion they called "stations." The word means a place where people stand still or gather together. So even though it implies something "stationary" the service obviously must include the movement of pilgrims following the footsteps of Christ. It took a while to fix the number and the names of the stations, but in 1731 Pope Clement XII established the 14 we know today.

We still find some variations on the number. Many places add a $15^{\rm th}$ station, for example, the resurrection of Jesus. Discontent with leaving Christ in the tomb when our faith expresses so much more, worshipers have found consolation in completing the story of the cross.

LENT

Lent is usually the Liturgical Season when most of us begin to rethink our lives with an eye toward reconciliation with God. It is the time of the year when the Church asks us to repent and to reform our behavior. Some, of course, reject such an idea. Think how many people in today's world deny sin in general and their own sins in particular. Consider, for example, how people manipulate language in order to justify their behavior: Many politicians, for example, think we are stupid. When they wish to indicate to the voting public that they are for abortion, a strong word which they prefer to avoid, they say they are for a "woman's right to choose". A woman's right to choose what? +No one steals anymore; they simply lift something, or in the case of some large corporations, someone simply made an error in judgment. +No one lies anymore; they simply misrepresent the facts. +No one kills an unborn child; they simply terminate a pregnancy. Who is kidding whom here? All this represents a clever way of candy-coating the reality of sin because we don't like to admit that we sin. Well of course we don't! It's hard to admit our sins; it hurts our pride. If we close our eyes to sin in our lives, we don't see ourselves as sinners; we don't feel a personal need for Jesus. And if we don't see a personal need for Jesus, then we are surely lost! In one of his first letters, St. John said: "If we say that we have not sinned, we make a liar out of God..." And that's because God sent His Son for our sins. If we have not sinned, then something is wrong with God for sending His Son to be sacrificed. And that simply is not so!

The Sacrament of Reconciliation Penance or Confession

Become a **better Catholic Christian** by confessing your sins in the Sacrament of **Penance** or **Reconciliation** – aka '**Confession**.' While only all **mortal** sins **must** be confessed, this Rite's sacramental grace also purges us of our lesser or venial sins. It serves as a "check-up", helps nip sinful habits in the bud before they bloom into full-blown sins, and strengthens us against temptation and other distractions. Those guilty of mortal sin may **NOT** receive Holy Communion until they confess them to a Priest. Confession is also encouraged in **Lent** and **Advent**, before a Baptism, First Communion, or Wedding, or serving as a Sponsor or Godparent. The 4 parts are:

CONTRITION.

To be contrite or remorseful we must know our sins, so we examine our conscience by shining God's divine Light, found in Gospel values, the Ten Commandments, Precepts of the Church, Beatitudes and Seven Deadly Sins, into every aspect of our life. If you can't come up with any sins, ask your family or friends to help ... they know your sins!

CONFESSION.

Priests not only speak for God and the Church; as 'doctor of the soul' they help cure sick souls, as medical doctors help heal bodies – but only if we are totally open and honest. Begin with "Bless me, Father, for I have sinned" or simply say, "Please help me" from behind the screen or face-to-face. We may remain anonymous, but should tell our state in life (married, single, ordained, a parent, etc.), and approximate date of our last confession. List all grave, serious mortal sins by number and kind: abortion, adultery, etc.; a general admission (I'm impatient, rude, insensitive, etc.) covers all lesser sins. An Act of Contrition card is available in the confessional; at Penance Services we recite it from a printed program; don't let not knowing the Act of Contrition keep you from this Sacrament of Healing!

ABSOLUTION.

Listen as the Priest prays; make the Sign of the Cross on yourself as he imparts it on you at the end of the beautiful **Prayer of Absolution**.

PENANCE.

To express our gratitude and offer a token of our willingness to try to avoid future sins, we perform a penance: a prayer, good deed or other sign.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

Lucy had been teaching her three-year old daughter, Caitlin, the Lord's Prayer for several evenings at bedtime. She would repeat after Lucy the lines from the prayer. Finally, Caitlin decided to go solo. Lucy listened with pride as Caitlin carefully enunciated each word, right up to the end of the prayer: "Lead us not into temptation," she prayed, "but deliver us from E-mail.

Pro-Life Issues: Abortion & Death Penalty

Since Jesus' tunic was seamless or woven in one piece, His executioners did not divide it, as was the custom; instead they drew lots for it [C.f. John 19:23-24.] Some say His 'seamless garment' shows that all life is sacred ... which is true ... and that only God can give and take or control life and death. However, Catholic teaching, citing society's right to defend itself and the vulnerable, only forbids taking totally innocent life. While 'good Catholics' cannot support abortion, which kills the most defenseless, or the intentional targeting of non-combatants, euthanasia, etc., 'good Catholics' can support a just war, the death penalty, and other admittedly less than ideal means to protect and defend imperiled human life.

God's Plan for Marriage

The Catholic Church is increasingly the only true 'Bible' Church, confessing only the biblical basis for Matrimony, divorce, human sexuality, life, etc. Contrary to what many say about us, we are not discriminatory or 'anti'-anything; we uphold and strive to live by God's revealed Truth. Catholicism also vehemently opposes any mockery, harm or hate directed toward anyone for any reason. In her pastoral outreach she strives to assist all who strive to live by God's ideal, regardless of their sexual orientation or situation. All 'good Catholics' must do the same!

'Separation of Church and State' Issues

The Catholic Church does not want to 'rule the world' politically and certainly not militarily - though she once meddled in these spheres. She does want the right to express her views and convictions - and share her thousands of years' worth of the Judeo-Christian experience. All 'good Catholics' must prayerfully consider her divinely inspired teachings to form an 'informed conscience' - so as to avoid our often selfish, self-centered, biased viewpoint ... the sad fallout of the Original Sin.

The Rosary of Hiroshima

At 2:45am on August 6, 1945, a B-29 took off from the island of Tinian to drop the first atom bomb on Japan. At 8:15am, the bomb exploded eight city blocks from the Jesuit Church of Our Lady's Assumption in Hiroshima. Half a million people were wiped out. All that was left was darkness, blood, burns, moans, fire and spreading terror. However, the church and the four Jesuit fathers stationed there survived: Fathers Hugo Lassalle. Kleinsorge, Cleslik and Schiffer. According to the experts they "ought to be dead," being as they were within the most deadly one-mile radius of the explosion. Nine days later on August 15, feast of Our Lady's Assumption, peace came. The miracle of their survival, their devotion to Our Lady, their church dedicated to her Assumption, made it clear to these survivors that this was more than coincidence. It taught them the power of Mary and her prayer, the rosary. So their response to the atom bomb was to launch a Rosary Crusade for peace in Japan. Think of the power of a river. It is made up of tiny drops of water, numberless tiny drops of rain. Together these tiny drops make the mighty river, which can carry heavy ships and change arid deserts into fruitful farms and gardens. So, too, the Rosary Crusade, the rosaries of countless persons all over the world become an immense and irresistible spiritual force for peace.
