



Did you Know?

1300-Year-Old Byzantine Church DISCOVERED

Archeologists in the Holy Land discovered the foundations of an approximately 1300-year-old Byzantine-era church near Mount Tabor, the site of Jesus' Transfiguration. The Israel Antiquities Authority (IAA) announced the discovery in late July. While excavating an area to build a playground in the Lower Galilee village of Kfar Kama near Mt. Tabor, the IIA and Kinneret Academic College found the walls of the old mosaic Byzantine church. Archaeologist Nurit Feig said the church's aisles are "partially preserved" as mosaics. "The church, measuring 12×36 [meters], includes a large courtyard, a narthex fover and a central hall. Particular to this church is the existence of three apses (prayer niches), while most churches were characterized by a single apse," Feig said. "Their colorful decoration stands out, incorporating geometric patterns, and blue, black and red floral patterns," she added. Feig said they also discovered a small reliquary, or "a stone box used to preserve sacred relics." Archeologists also found separate rooms adjacent to the church, indicating the possibility of a sixth-century monastery. The IAA will continue working in the area for additional discoveries. Akka, Israel Archbishop Youssef Abedallah Matta was also present at the site to visit the excavations. Holy Land priest Fr. Francesco Voltaggio posted the church's photos on his Twitter account along with this message (translated tweet): "Under the Holy "Land" how many treasures to discover! A 1300-year -old mosaic Byzantine church [with beautiful mosaics] was discovered in Kfar Kama, near Mount Tabor, Israel." -Editor, Churchpop.com

Saint Helena - Patron of New Discoveries

St. Helena was the mother of Emperor Constantine the Great and an Empress of the Roman Empire. Very little is known about Helena's early life, but it is believed she is from Drepanum (later known as Helenopolis) in Asia Minor and born into a poor family and lower class in the Roman culture of the day. St. Ambrose described Helena as a "good stable-maid."

Despite her background, Helena married Constantius Chlorus. With him she birthed her only son, Constantine. around the year 274. Nearly two decades later in 292, Constantius, now co-Regent of the West, got swept up in his rising stature and divorced Helena for Theodora, the step-daughter of Emperor Maximinianus Herculius. It is believed he did this to advance his own reputation and advance his standing in the Roman society.

Constantine was forever loyal to his dear mother, whom he loved very much. As he grew and became a member of the inner circle, he never left Helena's side. Following the death of Constantius in 308, Constantine became Emperor and summoned his mother back into inner circle and the imperial court. Helena received the title of Augusta.

Constantine ordered all to honor his mother. He even had coins minted, bearing her image. Through her son's influence, Helena began to embrace Christianity. With her title of Augusta Imperatrix, Helena was given free reign over the imperial treasury. She was tasked with locating relics of Christian tradition.

Between the years 326-328, Helena took a trip to the Holy Places in the Middle East. During her journey, Helena had many churches constructed, including the one at the site of Jesus Christ's birth - the Church of the Nativity, Bethlehem and another at the site of his ascension - Church of Eleona on the Mount of Olives.

During this time Jerusalem was still being rebuilt after Titus' destruction. Around the year 130, Emperor Hadrian had a temple built over the site of Jesus' death. This temple was believed to be dedicated to Venus. Helena had this temple destroyed and chose a site in this location to be excavated. This led to the discovery of three crosses.

Tradition says Helena brought a woman near death to the crosses. There she had the woman place a hand on all three crosses. Nothing happened when she touched the first two crosses, but when she placed her hand on the third cross she suddenly recovered. Helena declared the third cross to be the True Cross. At this site, Constantine ordered the Church of the Holy Sepulchre to be built.

Theodoret of Cyrus, an influential theologian, wrote that that during her search, Helena also discovered the nails of the crucifixion. She had one of the nails placed in Constantine's helmet and one in the bridle of his horse to aid him with their miraculous powers. Churches were built at these sites, as well.

Several of the relics believed to be found by St. Helena are located in Cyprus. Among these are parts of Jesus' tunic, pieces of the holy cross, and pieces of the rope used to tie Jesus to the cross. When Helena returned to Rome from Jerusalem in 327, she brought parts of the True Cross back with her. She stored these in her palace's chapel. They can still be seen to this day, though her palace has been converted to the Basilica of the Holy Cross in Jerusalem. St. Helena died around 330 with her dearly devoted son by her side. She was then buried in the Mausoleum of Helena outside of Rome. Her sarcophagus can be seen in the Pio-Clementine Vatican Museum.

St. Helena was renowned for helping not only individuals, but entire communities through her works of charity. She often sought out to help the poor and destitute. She would visit churches and leave them with rich donations. St. Helena was a very devout servant of God, so much so that one would easily believe her to have been a follower of Jesus Christ from birth. Through her influence and work, Christianity continued to spread throughout the known world.

St. Helena is the patron saint of new discoveries and her feast day is celebrated on August 18.

MARIAN SYMBOLS

hat is perhaps the simplest Marian insignia is her most profound symbol: the letter "M" beneath a simple cross, signifying what is recorded in the Bible: "Standing by the cross of Jesus were his mother and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple there whom he loved, he said to his mother, 'Woman, behold, your son.' Then he said to the disciple, 'Behold, your mother.' And from that hour the disciple took her into his home." [John 19:2 Sa,26-27] The late Pope John Paul II put this symbol, which had been on his Episcopal seal, on his papal coat-of-arms. Other bishops with a strong devotion to Mary often do the same to honor our Blessed Mother. There is much debate over the root of her name, rendered in English as Mary. The Hebrew form of her name, Miryam, is also the name of the sister of Moses. Some suggest it is of Egyptian origin since Moses and his sister were born in Egypt as Hebrew slaves, and no other Old Testament woman is named Mary. In Egypt, the name "Mary" suitably means "Cherished" or "Beloved". Some say the Gospel writers used Mariam to differentiate her from other biblical Mary's: Ancient translations of Scripture use Maria or Mariamme from which arose many interesting Marian symbols! One translation of her Jewish name means "Star" - so it became customary to embroider a star atop her veil and/or on the right shoulder of her mantle. This led to such Marian titles as "Star of Jacob" based on this Old Testament prophecy of the promised Messiah: "I see him, though not close at hand: A star shall advance from Jacob." [Number24:17a] For just as the stars once guided travels before the dawn. Mary was the last and greatest "star" to guide us before the birth of the true Light of the World: Jesus Christ our lord ... and Mary's Son. She is also called "Stella Maris" or the "Star of the Sea" that guides sailors through the dark night, and the "Morning Star" that heralds the dawn of the new day. The last biblical book says: "A great sign appeared in the sky, a woman clothed with the sun with the moon under her feet, and on her head a crown of twelve stars." [Revelation 12:1] The dozen "stars" symbolize the Apostles, which gained her the title "Queen of Apostles." (from this some anti-Catholics opposed the European Union's flag which has a ring of twelve stars on a solid blue field, because it's a symbol of the Blessed Virgin Mary! The custom of dressing Mary in radiant, dazzling garments befits one "clothed with the sun." Based on this prophecy, Mary is also shown standing on a crescent moon though one rodeo-loving little guy once asked, "Why is Mary standing on bull horns?" [Can't make this up either for Pete's sake!]. Perhaps Mary's most common image after Madonna and Child is from the "Protoevangelium" or "First Gospel"- the Lord God's warning to the serpent after the Fall of Adam and Eve: I will put enmity between you and the woman and between your offspring and hers; He will strike at your head, while you strike at his heel" [Genesis 3:15] From this Mary earned the title, "The New Eve" - who stands atop a snake, often with an apple in its mouth. Sometimes [and more biblically accurate] the Child Jesus stands before Mary and He crushes the serpent's head. Mary is also seen as "the Closed Gate" since: "Then he brought me back to the outer gate of the sanctuary, facing the east but it was closed. He said to me: 'This gate is to remain closed.' it is not to be opened for anyone to enter by it since the Lord, the God of Israel, has entered by it, it shall remain closed." [Ezekiel 44: 1-2] Since antiquity this has been to defend her perpetual virginity, for once her womb housed God, it was closed to all others as the prophet foretold! Believe in miracles.

St. Bernard

St. Bernard, Abbot and Doctor of the Church. St. Bernard was born of noble parentage in Burgundy, France, in the castle of Fontaines near Dijon. Under the care of his pious parents he was sent at an early age to a college at Chatillon, where he was conspicuous for his remarkable piety and spirit of recollection. At the same place he entered upon the studies of theology and Holy Scripture. After the death of his mother, fearing the snares and temptations of the world, he resolved to embrace the newly established and very austere institute of the Cistercian Order, of which he was destined to become the greatest ornament. He also persuaded his brothers and several of his friends to follow his example. In 1113, St. Bernard, with thirty young noblemen, presented himself to the holy Abbot, St. Stephen, at Citeaux. After a novitiate spent in great fervor, he made his profession in the following year. His superior soon after, seeing the great progress he had made in the spiritual life, sent him with twelve monks to found a new monastery, which afterward became known as the celebrated Abbev of Clairvaux. St. Bernard was at once appointed Abbot and began that active life which has rendered him the most conspicuous figure in the history of the 12th century. He founded numerous other monasteries, composed a number of works and undertook many journeys for the honor of God. Several Bishoprics were offered him, but he refused them all. The reputation of St. Bernard spread far and wide; even the Popes were governed by his advice. He was commissioned by Pope Eugene III to preach the second Crusade. In obedience to the Sovereign Pontiff he traveled through France and Germany, and aroused the greatest enthusiasm for the holy war among the masses of the population. The failure of the expedition raised a great storm against the saint, but he attributed it to the sins of the Crusaders. St. Bernard was eminently endowed with the gift of miracles. He died on August 20, 1153. His feast day is August 20.
