Ad Te Beáte Ioseph (To thee, O Blessed Joseph)

Composed by Pope Leo XIII, this powerful prayer asks the Guardian of the Holy Family to defend the Church from the snares laid for us by the Enemy of our souls. What a wonderful time to offer this beautiful prayer as the Church prays for the repose of the soul of the late Holy Father, Pope Francis, and anticipates the election of a new pope.

To thee, O blessed Joseph, do we have recourse in our tribulation, and, having implored the help of thy thrice-holy Spouse, we confidently invoke thy patronage also. By that charity wherewith thou wast united to the Immaculate Virgin Mother of God, and by that fatherly affection with which thou didst embrace the Child Jesus, we beseech thee and we humbly pray, that thou wouldst look graciously upon the inheritance which Jesus Christ hath purchased by His Blood, and assist us in our needs by thy power and strength.

Most watchful guardian of the Holy Family, protect the chosen people of Jesus Christ; keep far from us, most loving father, all blight of error and corruption: mercifully assist us from Heaven, most mighty defender, in this our conflict with the powers of darkness; and, even as of old thou didst rescue the Child Jesus from the supreme peril of His life, so now defend God's Holy Church from the snares of the enemy and from all adversity; keep us one and all under thy continual protection, that we may be supported by thine example and thine assistance, may be enabled to lead a holy life, die a happy death and come at last to the possession of everlasting blessedness in Heaven. Amen.

Why is May MARY'S Month?

Though May is a contraction of the name Mary, the month was probably named for Maia Maiesta, the Roman goddess of grain. Each year, on the first day of May, the ancient Romans likewise honored Flora, the Roman goddess of flowers, who was represented by a small statue wreathed in garlands; processions of singers and dancers would carry Flora's statue past a sacred blossom-decked tree. Later, festivals of this kind spread to other parts of Europe, reaching their height in England during the Middle Ages. Dances around flower-bedecked maypoles were common, and festivities often blossomed into riotous and wild occasions. Often a May queen was chosen as part of the festivities. Devotions, specifically to Our Lady, on the first days of May date to St. Phillip Neri (16th century), who began the custom of decorating the statue of the Virgin with spring flowers. Then, after Annibale Dionisi, an Italian Jesuit, proposed devotions to Mary throughout the entire month, the Church did incorporate the pre-Christian May celebrations and gave them a Christian dimension - as it had done with many other pre-Christian customs.

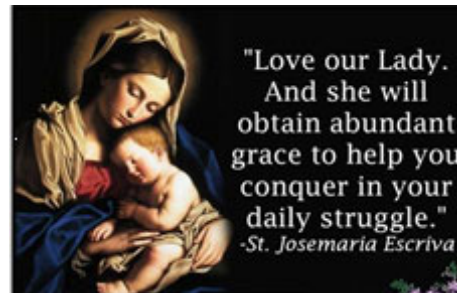

Are you an **ADULT** without **Confirmation, Communion or Baptism?**

If you want to become a Roman Catholic or complete your Initiation into the Church, the RCIA is for you! For information, phone the rectory. *Adult Catholics* who have not yet celebrated *Confirmation* or Holy Communion should contact the rectory for preparation class/information.

REQUIREMENTS FOR BAPTISM OR CONFIRMATION SPONSOR

Godparent/Sponsor must be at least 16 years old * **Godparent/Sponsor must be in good standing with the Catholic Church.** Must be a practicing Catholic (*Attend Sunday Mass weekly*). * Must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation. If married, must be married in the Catholic Church. * If single, not living with significant other, nor married civilly only. * **Godparent/Sponsor cannot be the candidate's parent.** Each child only requires one Godparent. If you wish to have two Godparents, there must be one female and one male. (Canon Law 872-874)

Start your marriage at the altar with God

"wedding" at the venue is not a valid Sacrament

Start your married life with God and receive grace for your married life through Sacramental Marriage in Church. In this Sacrament, God's own divine life can be experienced and lived. **Were you married only civilly** by a mayor or justice of the peace and would now like to be married in the Catholic Church? SPIRITUAL EXCERPT

Happy, indeed sublimely happy, is the person to whom the Holy Spirit reveals the secret of Mary, thus imparting to him true knowledge of her. Happy the person to whom the Holy Spirit opens this enclosed garden for him to enter, and to whom the Holy Spirit gives access to this sealed fountain where he can draw water and drink deep draughts of the living waters of grace. That person will find only grace and no creature in the most lovable Virgin Mary. But he will find that the infinitely holy and exalted God is at the same time infinitely solicitous for him and understands his weaknesses. Since God is everywhere, he can be found everywhere, even in hell. But there is no place where God can be more present to his creature and more sympathetic to human weakness than in Mary. It was indeed for this very purpose that he came down from heaven. Everywhere else he is the Bread of the strong and the Bread of angels, but living in Mary he is the Bread of children.

What Happens When a Pope Dies?

One might think the world's smallest country would go quiet after a papal death—but no! Vatican City springs into action with a sacred blend of ancient ritual and precise logistics. Here's what actually happens when a pope dies:

1. First to Act: The Camerlengo Ever heard of the **Camerlengo**? Think of him as the temporary steward of the Vatican. When the pope dies, the Camerlengo confirms the death - once traditionally done by calling the pope's baptismal name three times! Today it's a bit more clinical, but the symbolism remains rich. The Camerlengo then smashes the pope's Fisherman's Ring with a silver hammer. Why? To prevent forgery of official documents during the time between popes.

2. Nine Days of Mourning After a pope dies, the Church enters a special nine-day mourning period called the **novendiales** - Latin for "nine days." Each of the nine days features a **special funeral Mass** celebrated in honor of the deceased pope. These Masses are offered in St. Peter's Basilica and are often led by different cardinals, with intentions for the repose of the pope's soul, the needs of the Church, and the faithful worldwide.

3. Lying in State The pope's body is displayed in St. Peter's Basilica, allowing faithful pilgrims to pay their respects. The passing of a pope is truly a historical event, and a time when the whole world pays attention to the Church. When Pope John Paul II passed away, over **4 million people** flooded into Rome to honor him. Rome experienced a city-wide traffic jam that lasted nearly four days!

4. The Papal Coffins (Yes, more than one!) The pope is traditionally buried in **three coffins**: one made of cypress wood (symbol of humility), one of zinc (for preservation), and one of elm or oak (for dignity). They are all stacked within each other, with the pope being laid directly into the humble one made of simple cypress wood.

5. The Conclave Begins Once mourning ends, it's time for the **conclave**, the sacred and secretive process of electing the new pope. Every Cardinal that is eligible to vote (all those under the age of 80) gather in the Sistine Chapel and vote in silence. The cardinals are literally locked in - *con clave* means "with a key" in Latin.

6. The Pope is Chosen During the conclave, the world watches a tiny chimney atop the Sistine Chapel like hawks. Why? Because they use an old-fashioned stove to send up smoke signals: black for no decision, white for *Habemus Papam!* (We have a pope!)

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How Can We Honor Mary this Month?

Pray the Rosary

The Rosary is the Marian devotion par excellence. When people think of Marian devotion, they usually think of the Rosary. If you do not pray the Rosary regularly, then consider making May the month when you commit to praying it every day.

Pray the Regina Caeli

You might hear Church bells ring daily at 6AM, 12PM - Noon, and 6PM. Those bells indicate the traditional time of praying the Angelus, a prayer which focuses on the incarnation. From Easter Sunday through Pentecost, the Regina Caeli replaces the Angelus Prayer. The Regina Caeli focuses on Easter joy, and the resurrection of Jesus. Try praying it at least once each day, if not all three times. If you cannot observe the traditional Church times, then consider praying it before breakfast, lunch, and supper.
