Did You Use All Your Strength?



DARING St. Catherine of Sienna with the TRINITY:

A story is reported by Catherine's spiritual director, Raymond of Capua. According to Raymond, Catherine would often recite the office while walking along a cloister in the company of Jesus, mystically visible to the saint. When she came to the conclusion of a psalm, she would, according to liturgical custom, speak the words of the Glory Be, but her version was as follows, "Glory be to the Father, and to Thee, and to the Holy Ghost!" For her, Christ was not a distant figure, and prayer was not an abstract exercise. Rather, the Lord was at her side, and prayer was conversation between friends.

IN the NAME (not names) of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit: **SIGN OF THE CROSS** - The making of the sign of the cross, which professes faith both in the redemption of Christ and in the Trinity, was practiced from the earliest centuries. St. Augustine (431) mentioned and described it many times in his sermons and letters. In those days Christians made the sign of the cross (Redemption) with three fingers (Trinity) on their foreheads. The words ("In the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost") were added later. Almost two hundred years before Augustine, in the third century, Tertullian had already reported this touching and beautiful early Christian practice: In all our undertakings — when we enter a place or leave it; before we dress; before we bathe; when we take our meals; when we light the lamps in the evening; before we retire at night; when we sit down to read; before each new task — we trace the sign of the cross on our foreheads.

"Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost"

DOXOLOGY — The ancient Christian doxology (prayer of praise) "Glory be to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Ghost" was used in the Oriental Church. The second part ("as it was in the beginning...") seems to have been added at the time of Emperor Constantine. During the fifth century this beautiful short prayer came into the Western Church and spread very quickly. Since then it has been in constant use in both liturgical and private devotions. Finally, the Council of Narbonne (589) prescribed that it should be added after every psalm and hymn in the Divine Office. It is an ancient tradition that in poetical hymns of the liturgy the Gloria Patri is rendered in a paraphrase (free version) within the last stanza.

Saint of the Trinity

Sister Elizabeth of the Trinity was a Carmelite nun, contemporary to Saint Therese of Lisieux. She was canonized in the year 2000. She fashioned all her life on the Trinity. Her act of oblation is sublime and real:

"O my God, Trinity whom I adore! Help me to become utterly forgetful of self, that I may bury myself in Thee, as changeless and as calm as though my soul were already in eternity... O my Three, my All, my Beatitude, Infinite Solitude, Immensity wherein I lose myself! I yield myself to Thee as Thy prey. Bury Thyself in me that I may be buried in Thee, until I depart to contemplate in Thy light the abyss of Thy greatness!"

She used to say: "I have found my heaven on earth, since heaven is God, and God is in my soul." What wisdom!

REQUIREMENTS FOR BAPTISM OR CONFIRMATION SPONSOR

Godparent/Sponsor must be at least 16 years old * Godparent/Sponsor must be in good standing with the Catholic Church. Must be a practicing Catholic (Attend Sunday Mass weekly). * Must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation. If married, must be married in the Catholic Church. * If single, not living with significant other, nor married civilly only. * Godparent/Sponsor cannot be the candidate's parent. Each child only requires one Godparent. If you wish to have two Godparents, there must be one female and one male. (CanonLaw 872874)

Sacred Matrimony on Sacred ground

"ceremony" at the venue is not a valid Sacrament

For the Catholic Church the Sacrament of Matrimony is such a sacred matter that the Church requires for two Catholics to be married Sacramentally in the Catholic Church, not elsewhere. All the Sacraments except Confession are always celebrated in Church. Baptism, First Holy Communion, Confirmation and the Sacred Orders (Priesthood is even celebrated at the Cathedral of a given Diocese). A Catholic priest can only officiate Sacrament of Matrimony of two Catholics on sacred grounds (Church). This wedding at the same time is a civil wedding. For more info contact Fr. Wojciech.

Intensity of God

It was Pope John XXII who in 1334 extended to the universal Church the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity. A thousand years earlier the great Ecumenical Councils of Nicea (325) and Constantinople (381) had defined this essential truth of the faith, that in the one Divine Nature there are three Divine Persons.

Trinity Sunday is however not so much a celebration of a doctrine but of a Family. God is not a lonely being, aloof from everything for lack of equals, a solitary who creates a world to dispel idleness. He is a Trinity of persons. He is a communion.

A family so much in love that they overflow in us and for us. We become sons and daughters of the Father, brothers and sisters of the Son and temples of the Holy Spirit. All fellowships, be it marriage, family, civil society, can be patterned on this Eternal Communion. The vitality of this God puts everything in perspective.

St. Gregory Nazianzen, one of the earlier Fathers of the Church, explains how God prepared us for the revelation of this sublime truth by the progressive revelation He provided in Sacred Scripture.

"The Old Testament proclaimed the Father clearly, but the Son more obscurely. The New Testament revealed the Son and gave us a glimpse of the divinity of the Spirit. Now the Spirit dwells among us and grants us a clearer vision of himself."

Why do we call Priests "Father"?

Catholics are unique because our dads aren't the only men we call father. We also address each of our priests in the same way. The Church has used this title for clergy since its earliest days. In the beginning, the title "Father" was reserved for the pope, but it eventually widened in use until all bishops and priests were also addressed in the same way.

While our priests are not our biological fathers, they are our **spiritual fathers.** Just as a father leads his family and protects them from harm, so do our priests guide and defend us, the people God has entrusted to their care. They also provide us with the spiritual nourishment we need to grow in holiness and ultimately reach Heaven: in particular, the nourishment of the Eucharist and the healing power of Confession.

A virtuous father takes responsibility for himself, as well as for the welfare of his wife and children. Likewise, a good priest cares for his spiritual family and holds himself accountable for their spiritual wellbeing. While we see them most frequently saying Mass, they also hear confessions, provide spiritual direction, visit and anoint the sick, help couples prepare for marriage, baptize, and much more.

During their daily prayer and Liturgy of the Hours, they are praying and interceding for us and our intentions, placing our needs and petitions at the feet of the Father, God.

Priests are called to sacrifice so much in order to serve us. A man whom God calls to the Roman Catholic priesthood gives up having his own earthly marriage and physical family in order to be fully and wholehearted available to whomever God places on his path. Priests dedicate every day of their lives to serving their flocks sacramentally and practically, and sacrifice biological fatherhood in order to live out God's gift of spiritual fatherhood.

We call priests "father" because of their spiritual leadership in that great family which makes up the Body of Christ. Today, we certainly encourage you to honor your dad's love and sacrifice over the years—however, don't forget about your priest, who also gave his life to serve you and help lead your soul to heaven! -Catholiccompany/getfed
