



All started with a doubt

DOUBTS, PILGRIMAGE, WAITING etc-ORIGINS of Corpus Christi

In 1263, a German priest named Peter of Prague was on a pilgrimage to Rome to pray on the tombs of saints to help his doubts about the Eucharist. Lately he had been having doubts about the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. Was the bread and wine really transformed into the Body and Blood of Jesus? On the way back when nothing changed he stopped in Bolsena, Italy, a town about 70 miles north of Rome. He said Mass at the Church of St. Christina. As Peter raised the Host and consecrated it blood started flowing out of it, onto his hands and the altar. God was telling him (and us) that yes, He is truly present in the host. Peter was confused and tried to hide the blood. Then he excused himself from finishing the Mass and went to the nearby city of Orvie to, where Pope Urban IV was staying. He explained everything to the pope, who ordered the host and bloodstained altar cloth brought to the cathedral at Orvieto, where they are still enshrined today. It is said that this miracle prompted Pope Urban to have St. Thomas Aguinas write prayers for a Mass celebrating the Most Holy Body of the Lord, the Feast of Corpus Christi. One year after the miracle, in August of 1264, Pope Urban IV introduced the saint's composition, and by means of a papal bull instituted the feast of Corpus Christi.

On the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus let us consecrate our families and also our priests - It is a day of prayer for sanctification of priests.

Act of Consecration to the SACRED HEART

O Sacred Heart of Jesus, to Thee I consecrate and offer up my person and my life, my actions, trials, and sufferings, that my entire being may henceforth only be employed in loving, honoring and glorifying Thee. This is my irrevocable will, to belong entirely to Thee, and to do all for Thy love, renouncing with my whole heart all that can displease Thee.

I take Thee, O Sacred Heart, for the sole object of my love, the protection of my life, the pledge of my salvation, the remedy of my frailty and inconstancy, the reparation for all the defects of my life, and my secure refuge at the hour of my death. Be Thou, O Most Merciful Heart, my justification before God Thy Father, and screen me from His anger which I have so justly merited. I fear all from my own weakness and malice, but placing my entire confidence in Thee, O Heart of Love, I hope all from Thine infinite Goodness. Annihilate in me all that can displease or resist Thee. Imprint Thy pure love so deeply in my heart that I may never forget Thee or be separated from Thee.

I beseech Thee, through Thine infinite Goodness, grant that my name be engraved upon Thy Heart, for in this I place all my happiness and all my glory, to live and to die as one of Thy devoted servants. Amen.

Tolerance is Not a Christian Virtue ... Render to God the Things that are God's

Real freedom demands an ability to think, and a great deal of modern life - not just in the United States, but all over the developed world - seems deliberately designed to discourage that... The most important fact to remember is this: As adults, each of us needs to form a strong and genuinely Catholic conscience... That's why really knowing, living and submitting ourselves to our Catholic faith are so important. It's the only reliable guide we have for acting in the public square as disciples of Jesus Christ.

We need to remember that tolerance is not a Christian virtue. Charity, justice, mercy, prudence, honesty - these are Christian virtues. And obviously, in a diverse community, tolerance is an important working principle. But it's never an end itself. In fact, tolerating grave evil within a society is itself a form of serious evil.

Likewise, democratic pluralism does not mean that Catholics should be quiet in public about serious moral issues because of some misguided sense of good manners. A healthy democracy requires vigorous moral debate to survive. Real pluralism demands that people of strong beliefs will advance their convictions in the public square peacefully, legally and respectfully, but energetically and without embarrassment. Anything less is bad citizenship and a form of theft from the public conversation.

The "separation of Church and state" does not mean - and it can never mean - separating our Catholic faith from our public witness, our political choices and our political actions. That kind of separation would require Christians to deny who we are; to repudiate Jesus when He commands us to be "leaven in the world" and to "make disciples of all nations." That kind of radical separation steals the moral content of a society.

We serve Caesar best by serving God first. We honor our nation best by living our Catholic faith honestly and vigorously, and bringing it without apology into the public square and its debates. We're citizens of heaven first. But just as God so loved the world that he sent his only son, so the glory and irony of the Christian life is this: The more faithfully we love God, the more truly we serve the world.

REQUIREMENTS FOR BAPTISM OR CONFIRMATION SPONSOR

Godparent/Sponsor must be at least 16 years old * Godparent/Sponsor must be in good standing with the Catholic Church. Must be a practicing Catholic (Attend Sunday Mass weekly). * Must have received the Sacraments of Baptism, Communion, and Confirmation. If married, must be married in the Catholic Church. * If single, not living with significant other, nor married civilly only. * Godparent/Sponsor cannot be the candidate's parent. Each child only requires one Godparent. If you wish to have two Godparents, there must be one female and one male. (Canon Law 872-874)

Sacred Matrimony on Sacred ground

"ceremony" at the venue is not a valid Sacrament

For the Catholic Church the Sacrament of Matrimony is such a sacred matter that the Church requires for two Catholics to be married Sacramentally in the Catholic Church, not elsewhere. All the Sacraments except Confession are always celebrated in Church. Baptism, First Holy Communion, Confirmation and the Sacred Orders (Priesthood is even celebrated at the Cathedral of a given Diocese). A Catholic priest can only officiate Sacrament of Matrimony of two Catholics on sacred grounds (Church). This wedding at the same time is a civil wedding. For more info contact Fr. Wojciech.

St. Thérèse's Love of Corpus Christi Procession!



When St. Thérèse was little, she loved to walk in front of the monstrance and throw rose petals in the procession. St. Thérèse looked forward to Corpus Christi for many reasons, as she saw it as a beautiful feast that honored her greatest love in life, Jesus Christ, present in the Holy Eucharist. In particular, she had fond memories of it as a child and wrote about it in her autobiography, <u>Story of a Soul</u>.

She mentions it first in connection to her retreat before receiving the sacra-

ment of confirmation, which at that time was given at a younger age. Ordinarily, there was only one day of retreat made for Confirmation, but the bishop was unable to come on the appointed day and so I had the consolation of having two days of solitude. To distract us our mistress brought us to Mont Cassin and there I gathered very many big daisies for the feast of Corpus Christi. Ah! how happy my soul was! It should come as no surprise that St. Thérèse loved flowers of all kinds, and many local traditions surrounding Corpus Christi involve flowers.

It is often customary in certain countries for girls to precede the Eucharistic procession, strewing flowers in front of the priest carrying the monstrance. Typically girls who have received their First Holy Communion are those who lead the procession of the Eucharist.

This is something that St. Thérèse loved most of all, as she explains in her autobiography.

The feasts! what memories this word brings back to me. How I loved the feasts! You knew how to explain all the mysteries hidden under each, and you did it so well that they were truly heavenly days for me. I loved above all the processions in honor of the Blessed Sacrament. What a joy it was for me to throw flowers beneath the feet of God! Before allowing them to fall to the ground, I threw them as high as I could and I was never so happy as when I saw my roses touch the sacred monstrance.

St. Thérèse had an innocent and childlike faith that persisted as she grew older. While she wasn't able to strew flowers as an adult, she did whatever she could to honor Jesus. She treasured these memories in the convent and looked forward to the times she spent in prayer before Jesus, her spouse, in the Blessed Sacrament

IMMACULATE HEART OF MARY CURED PADRE PIO

When Padre Pio could not go to her, the Blessed Mother came to him.

Padre Pio was one of the Blessed Mother's greatest advocates and tenderest admirers. One rarely found the saint without a rosary in his hand as he worked to fulfill the Blessed Mother's plea to save souls from hell. He especially loved her Immaculate Heart.

You can imagine his excitement and joy when Fatima's statue of the Immaculate Heart of Mary began its tour of Italy in



1959. The statue was set to arrive in his diocese in August, where a magnificent procession and solemn Mass awaited it in Foggia's cathedral.

Suddenly Padre Pio fell ill. From May onward, he suffered no alleviation of his illness. He knew he could not travel to Foggia to venerate the statue, and he was grieved.

Then his bishop called him and said he'd arranged for the statue to visit San Giovanni Rotundo, Pio's own monastery, instead of the cathedral.

Padre Pio immediately prepared for the Blessed Mother's visit with a public novena. Every day, he led the faithful gathered in San Giovanni's church - but he was still so ill that he used a loud speaker and prayed the novena from his bed.

At last the statue arrived. Padre Pio forced himself - weak as he was - to get up and go to it in the church, where he kissed it and hung a golden rosary on its hands.

Later, Padre Pio watched the statue's departure through his bedroom window. He wept and said to the Immaculate Heart, "My Lady, my Mother, you came to Italy and I got sick, now you are going away and you leave me still ill."

After he spoke, a force shook his body and he found himself cured of his illness - in fact, he'd never felt so well or so strong before!

First Millennial Saint will be Canonized CARLO ACUTIS

On Friday, June 13, 2025, Pope Leo XIV announced he will canonize two new saints on September 7, 2025: Pier Giorgio Frassati and Blessed Carlo Acutis!

Blessed Carlo Acutis will become the first millennial saint of the Catholic Church. Blessed Carlo is best known for his computer programming skills and website dedicated to Eucharistic miracles. He died of leukemia on Oct. 12, 2006, at age 15. Pope Francis beatified him on Oct. 10, 2020.

The news of his upcoming canonization is the perfect time to honor and turn to Carlo Acutis for prayers. Since many people cannot visit his tomb in Italy, online users can visit it virtually.

Carlo Acutis' tomb lies in Assisi, Italy, at the Sanctuary of the Renunciation, inside the Church of Saint Mary Major.

The National Catholic Register reported:

"The sanctuary is located on the spot where a young Saint Francis of Assisi is said to have cast off his rich clothes in favor of a poor habit. "In a letter written for the Sanctuary of the Renunciation's inauguration in 2017, Pope Francis called it 'a precious place where young people can be aided in the discernment of their vocations."

The YouTube Channel Maria Vision Italia began livestreaming Carlo Acutis' tomb in 2024. The channel also links to a website where users can submit personal prayer intentions. The intentions are read "during the veneration on Wednesday live at 7:00pm." The intentions are printed and "entrusted directly to Blessed Carlo Acutis" during Mass at the Parish Church of St. Mary Major.

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




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
