PASTOR'S LETTER

“We Would Like to See Jesus.” John 12:21

In today's gospel, John tells us the Greeks who were in Jerusalem for the Passover ask Philip and Andrew (two strong Greek names!) to see Jesus. It leads Jesus to the conclusion, “The hour has come.”

In John's gospel, “the hour” is the point in Jesus' ministry when he will experience the cross—death that leads to resurrection. When Jesus heard the Greeks were asking to see him, he knew that his gospel message had reached well beyond Israel and into the Gentile world. It was a sign that the moment to complete his mission had come.

It led Jesus to say his heart was troubled, which reminds us of his time in the garden of Gethsemane in the other gospels. In the garden, Jesus' arrest was imminent. The realization that the hour was upon him led Jesus to ask the Father to take this time of suffering away from him.

But here in John's gospel—which takes place before the Last Supper begins—even though it's troubling him, he fully accepts that this is the way glory will come to our Father. A voice from heaven immediately affirms Jesus that he is doing God's will. It's what will lead him to eventually say in the garden in full trust, “your will be done.”

It's really a powerful gospel that sets the stage for Palm Sunday and Holy Week. Spiritually, the Church is helping us to get ready to see Jesus and to value his life and all that he did for us, which helps us value the life we share with him.

We see Jesus in the Eucharist, in the Church gathered together, in the sacraments that grace us with his presence, in the scripture we hear proclaimed, and in the faces of those we reach out to help with basic needs.

So, the Greeks' request, “we would like to see Jesus”, spiritually has become our own. And the good news is that Jesus answers us with the invitation to “Come and see” (John 1:39). Once we know where to look, we find him!

2020 Vision Update

Last month we completed surveys about the capital campaign we've proposed to help move us into the 2020s. In addition to the surveys, we also conducted some one-on-one interviews with parishioners to dig a little bit deeper and to learn what's feasible.

This week we received a report compiling the research. Our parish leadership teams—the Parish Staff, the Parish Council, Finance Council and School Board—are now meeting to talk it through and to determine where we go from here. We will provide an update shortly after Easter Sunday.

Thank you again to everyone who provided the feedback we need, so that anchored in prayer and working together, we can do what's best for all of us.

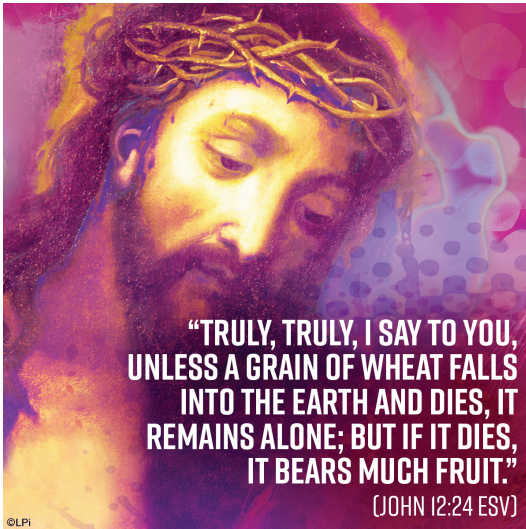

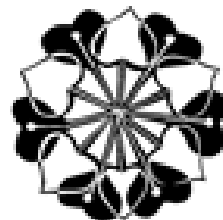

In our desire to trust God and follow Jesus wherever he leads us, it's not a sin to feel troubled about it.

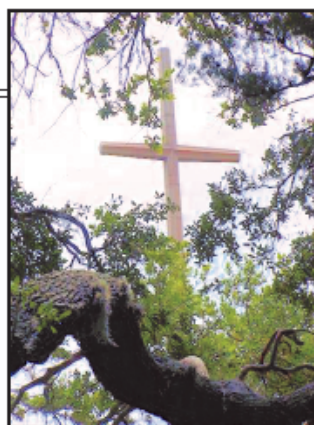
Yes, we do have to be willing to lose our lives (i.e., our own agendas, our own desires, our own ideas on what we should do with our time, etc.) so that we can unite ourselves to Christ and his mission. However, we don't have to like the loss.

The Gospel reading shows us that Jesus felt troubled by the sacrifices he would have to make. Yes, even Jesus himself felt troubled! And the Father glorified him.

Jesus came to earth to reveal God's ways and God's love and lead us to heaven. Now we, his followers, are called, commissioned, and prepared by the Sacraments to reveal God's ways and God's love to those around us, so that Jesus can lead *them* to heaven. That is the mission, the purpose of being Church, for all

of us – laity as well as clergy.

The Sacrament of Baptism initiates us into this calling. Confirmation commissions us to do it. Confession enables us to do it better. Marriage and Holy Orders give us a venue for perfecting it. The Anointing of the Sick converts our illnesses into opportunities to bear witness to Christ's Passion. And the Eucharist unites us so fully to the Passion of Christ that we become what we are called to do.



This is our everyday ministry of evangelization: We love others as Jesus loves them, we do for them what Jesus would like to do for them, and we spread the good news about this as a continuation of the ministry of Jesus.

Often, this involves making sacrifices and doing good to those who reject us and scourge us and crucify us or in any other way cause us to suffer. This is our unity with Christ, our Passion. We're not supposed to like it, but we are supposed to do it.

The Father honors us for this. Just like he glorified Jesus, he honors us with his compassion, his rewards, and his approval.

It's okay to feel troubled by the challenges we face in our mission. What keeps us going is knowing that God is raising us up. There is always resurrection after crucifixion.

Reflect & Discuss:

1. What troubles are you facing? Where is Jesus in this? Is he ahead of you, leading the way? Are you following him?
2. How do you feel hearing Jesus admit, "I am troubled now"?
3. When you make sacrifices for others, how does this connect you more closely to the human heart of Jesus?
4. How does the Father honor you as you serve in Christ's mission?

Gabriel Marcel once said: “To love someone is to say, *you at least will never die*.” That might sound like romantic wishful thinking, but, in Christian faith, we believe that this is deep insight, an article of faith, a truth of the incarnation.

If we take the incarnation seriously, then to love someone is to say to him or her: “You will never die because, in this life and the next, you will never be separated from the community of life, God’s family, because in accepting my love you are touching the body of Christ just as really as did anyone who touched the historical Jesus. You will never die and you will never go to hell because you are bound to Christ.”

That is an astonishing belief! Few take it seriously.

Ten years ago, I wrote two rather modest articles on this. In these, I pointed out that the incarnation, the mystery of God taking on human flesh, is not a 33-year experiment, a one-shot incursion of God into human history that ended with the ascension of Jesus.

The truth is rather that, as the body of Christ on earth, we can continue to do all the things that Jesus did and, as Jesus himself assures us in John’s Gospel (14:12), we can even do greater things.

Scripture tells us that we are the body of Christ on earth. It does not say that we are like his body, or that we replace his body, or even that we are his mystical body (which wouldn’t be so wrong, if we understood “mystical” in the deep sense of that word).

No. Our Christian faith informs us that we are the body of Christ—flesh, blood, tangible, visible, physical, available to be touched, and all of this definitely and clearly residing in nameable persons on this earth. We are the ongoing incarnation of God, the anointed ones of God, Christ.

This, as I pointed out in those articles, has some rather incredulous implications. Among them, the following: When Jesus walked around Palestine, people were healed and forgiven, not to mention given eternal life, by touching him, by being touched by him and simply by relating to him.

If we are the ongoing incarnation, and we are, then this is also true for us (and not just in the sense of it happening through the institutional churches, as important as that is).

The mystery of the incarnation is incredibly extensive. It is not just the institutional churches that carry on, carry forth and carry the mystery of God in human flesh. All love that is in grace is the Word made flesh. To touch it is to be touched by Christ; to touch with it is to touch with Christ

because it is the ongoing incarnation.

From Augustine through Pius XII, we are told that this is wild doctrine, something beyond our limited imaginations and measured hopes. Nobody dares hope for us as much as God has already given in the incarnation. What are we given there?

The power, literally, to block death and hell. If we love someone, she cannot go to hell because Christ is loving her. If we forgive someone, he is forgiven because Christ is forgiving him.

If children of ours, or anyone else we love, no longer go to church, our love for them and their love for us binds them solidly to the body of Christ. They continue to touch the hem of Christ’s garment as surely as did the woman in the Gospels who suffered with a hemorrhage. Their end result, unless they reject their bond to us, will be like hers, namely, healing.

Every time I have ever written about this, I have received a flood of letters, almost all of which suggest that what I am saying is dead wrong or, at the very least, horribly exaggerated. These letters generally have one of two difficulties with this:

Many people write saying simply: “How can you say this? Only Christ has power to forgive sins, to heal, and to bind people to the community of grace.” That objection is valid enough; except it is Christ who is doing this. We, as St. Paul so clearly assures us, are the body of Christ.

Almost as frequent in people’s response to this is the statement: “I would like to believe this, but it would be too good to be true!”

Part of the difficulty in believing in the incarnation is precisely the fact that it is too good to be true: God is not hidden and hard to contact; forgiveness, grace, and salvation are not the prerogative of the lucky and the few; we don’t have to save ourselves; we don’t have to get our lives perfectly in order to be saved; we don’t have to make amends for our sins; human flesh and this world are not obstacles, but part of the vehicle to heaven; we can help each other on the journey; love, indeed even human love, is stronger than death; and to love someone is indeed to say: “You at least will never die!”

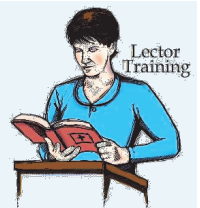
Proclaiming the Word—LECTOR TRAINING

DEMENTIA, CAREGIVING & ELDER ABUSE



Caring for a person with dementia can be all consuming. Researchers have found that a person who provides care for someone with dementia is twice as likely to suffer from depression as a person providing care for someone without dementia. These caregivers spend significantly more hours per week providing care which causes personal stress, mental and physical health problems, lack of sleep, less time to do the things they enjoy, less time to spend with other family members, and more family conflict than non-dementia caregivers.

Dealing with dementia-related behavior is a big contributor to developing depression. Dementia-related symptoms such as wandering, agitation, hoarding, embarrassing conduct, and resistance or non-cooperation from the loved one makes every day challenging and makes it harder for a caregiver to get rest or assistance in providing care. The more severe the case of dementia, the more likely the caregiver is to experience depression. It is critical for caregivers, especially in these situations, to receive consistent and dependable support and respite.

Feelings of isolation and depression and lack of sleep are major risks for elder abuse. To prevent this from ever happening:

The caregiver can possibly attend a class at the local hospital on how to take care of the elderly. This would give the caregiver a chance to meet other individuals who are also caring for family members and to possibly set up a line of communication with other classmates to prevent caregiver isolation.

Loss of sleep as a result of caring for a loved one can lead to serious depression. The important thing to remember is that even though you may not be able to get your loved one to rest throughout the night, you can arrange to get much needed sleep. Hiring a respite worker or engaging a friend to be with your loved one while you take a nap, finding a day care center, or scheduling a stay over with another family member for a few nights are a few ways to keep your care giving commitment while getting the rest you need.

Even 5 to 10 minutes of any of the following techniques may be beneficial. Meditation. Prayer, deep breathing, yoga, massage, listening to music, creating art, or journaling.
