

Figs & Thorn Bushes

This Sunday we hear a parable from Jesus' Sermon on the Plain. Jesus tells us every tree is known for its fruit. So, he reminds us, figs don't grow on thorn bushes. In other words, know the source. He applies that analogy to human beings: a good person shows goodness because it stems from within. And so, they naturally will bring out the good. But of course that means the reverse is true, too.

What's fascinating, especially for us in today's world, is that Jesus knows it will come out first and foremost in the words we speak and how we talk with each other. Jesus put it this way: "From the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks" (Luke 6:45). That's very true, isn't it? Words are powerful. They can be used as harsh weapons, or they can inspire people to brilliance. As we've seen this week, they can bring about war or they can find ways to peace.

And that's why this is a good gospel to prepare us for what's coming next: the season of Lent. Every Ash Wednesday is an open call to begin to take a look at what's within our heart. Chances are we each have some figs and thorns in all of us. A good place to begin is to take a look at the words we speak. If we find the words we use a little harsher these days, more judgmental, a bit more biting, then maybe those are some thorns we could look at.

In fact, Jesus encourages today to look at the guides we follow. For us that can be websites, YouTube videos, podcasts, and so much more. Not every source is going to lead us well. We can tell by the messages we hear and what it stirs within. Thank God for critical thinking. With the gospel in our life, balanced with the teachings of the Church, we know the voice of the one we follow, and so we go to the good that empowers us instead of the voices that lead us astray. Figs grow on fig trees and thorns on thorn bushes, and we know the difference.

Getting Ready for Lent!

Today's bulletin is full of opportunities to experience our Lenten journey together. Of course, it all begins Wednesday as we gather for the distribution of ashes. We'll have Masses at

7 AM, 8:30 AM with the St. Hubert School students, and 7:30 PM. This year, we'll resume our prayer services with the distribution of ashes at both Noon and 4:30 PM with the students from Religious Ed.

For those who are uneasy about being in a public space, or those with health concerns who need to continue to be very careful, we will also distribute ashes between 1:30 and 4 PM in the parking lot in front of the main entrance of the church.




Bring Palms for Ash Wednesday

What we say and how we say it reveals the true intentions of our hearts. The content and manner of our speech is a window into the recesses of our souls. Our consciences, attitudes, sentiments, weaknesses, and motives are displayed. As much as we think we can hide the truth of our lives from others, we cannot. Who we really are is not only expressed on our lips but is written on our faces. Jesus says precisely this, "For every tree is known by its own fruit." What does the fruit of our lives say about us?

Because we like to play the game of hide and seek with ourselves, in pretending that we are hiding we deflect attention others may give to us by becoming more critical of others. After all, the more time one can spend analyzing others' behavior the less time one has to look at his or herself.

Often, the behaviors we abhor most in others are the very ones we are guilty of ourselves. We just don't know it yet. The more we put ourselves in the role of a judge, the more satisfaction and control we seem to achieve. Yet, what about ourselves? In focusing our attention on the beams in others' eyes, the aridity and barrenness of our lives goes unchecked. St. Ambrose reminds us that "no one heals himself by wounding another." Bringing our brothers and sisters down by being overly critical, serves no positive purpose.

But the one who knows how easy it is to fall into sin and weakness and how quickly errors in judgment can be made, knows the depth of true compassion, mercy, and kindness. Having recognized our own poor choices, misguided opinions, negative emotions, and ability to do horrendous things, we can be more sympathetic and understanding of where others may be. We are designed to be mentors and guides to one another. In walking the journey together, we can help each other become the best we can be. Humility is the order of the day and the primary virtue that prevents us from being hypocrites.

What Does it Mean to Focus Our Attention on God?

Some years ago, I was at a religious conference where one of the speakers, widely known and respected for her work among the poor, made this comment: "I'm not a theologian, so I don't know how this plays out theologically; but here's the base from which I'm operating: I work with the poor. Partly I do this out of my humanity, out of natural compassion; but ultimately my motivation is Christ. I work with the poor because I'm a Christian. However I can go for two or three years on the streets and never mention Christ's name because I believe that God is mature enough that He doesn't demand to always be the center of our conscious attention."

God doesn't demand to always be the center of our conscious attention! Is that true? Clearly the statement needs some clarification and nuance. On the one hand, there's a certain freeing-up inside of us that comes from hearing this said, given that most of the time God is not in fact the center or our conscious attention and, this side of eternity, will most likely never be. But, on the other hand, the consolation we feel in hearing this flies strongly in face of the clear challenge that comes to us from scripture, our churches, and spiritual writers warning us against losing ourselves in the ambitions, projects, anxieties, pleasures, and distractions of this world, of letting our focus on this life eclipse the wider horizon, God and eternity. Countless spiritual writers warn us that it's dangerous to be so immersed in this world so as to lose sight of anything beyond. Jesus too warns us of this danger.

And yet all of us know a lot of people who seem so immersed in this life, in their marriages, their families, their jobs, in entertainment, in sports, and in their daily concerns that they don't seem at all to have God as center of their conscious attention for any significant portion of their daily lives. Indeed, sometimes these people do not even attend church and often have very little in terms of a formal or private prayer in their lives.

But, and this is the seeming-anomaly, they're good people, people whose lives radiate a basic (and sometimes very generous degree) of honesty, generosity, goodness, warmth, and healthy concern for others. Moreover they are often robust and witty, the ones you want to be next to at the dinner table, even as they seem to be living and dying merely as devoted children of this earth, not much given to abstraction or religion. A good family gathering, a win by the home team, a good meal or drink with a friend, and a healthy day spent working, are contemplation enough. Their default consciousness focuses on the things of this world, its joys and its sorrows. A shift in consciousness would need to occur for any explicit notion of God to enter their lives. For these people, good people for the most part, ordinary consciousness is mostly agnostic.

How bad is this? Does this dangerously shrink one's horizons? How badly does a one-sided focus on the things of this life choke out the word of God or render it shallow and extraneous? Are we going to hell in droves because we can't give God more of our conscious attention and because we can't be more explicitly religious?

By their fruits you will know them! Jesus said that and it must be our criterion here: If people are living inside an honesty, generosity, goodness, warmth, health, solicitousness, intelligence, and wit that is life-giving, can they be much out of harmony with God? Moreover, we need to ask ourselves: If we are born into this world with such a powerful, innate gravitation towards the things of this earth, if our natural (default) consciousness wants to fix itself more upon matter than spirit, and this seems to be the case for most people, how then do we read the mind of our Creator? What divine intelligence is manifest within the natural instinct to give ourselves over to this life, even as we carry a faith that gives us a vision beyond this world?

Perhaps God is mature enough to not ask for, or want, our conscious attention most of the time. Perhaps God wants us to enjoy our time here, to enjoy the experience of love and friendship, of family and friends, of eating and drinking, and of (at least occasionally) seeing our favorite teams win a championship. Perhaps God wants us, in the famed-words of Yogi Berra, to sometimes just to sit back and enjoy the game! Perhaps God is like a blessing old grandparent; perhaps we pray in an inchoate way when we healthily enjoy the gift of this life; and perhaps there are less-conscious ways in which we can be aware of God.

Like the woman whom I quote above, I also don't know how this all plays out theologically, but it needs to be said.

SOMETHING TO HOLD ONTO



Our Lenten symbol this year is a pendant that contains three important images of our Lenten journey for us to hold onto: the word of God, the cross and the dove.

In the sixth chapter of John's Gospel, Jesus reveals that he will give himself fully to us—his flesh and blood. He is speaking of his passion and death, but also of his resurrection and his sacramental

presence in the Eucharist. Many of his followers couldn't understand his teaching and began to walk away from him. But Jesus invited them to open their hearts and minds to see what he was doing. He tells us, "The words I have spoken to you are spirit and life." Even though difficult to fully understand, the apostles chose stay with Jesus because as Peter says, "where else would we go?"


The spiritual life is filled with the normal ups and downs that come through any meaningful and important journey. In the midst of all we go through, we hold onto Peter's response, because it's ours, too. We return to Christ time and time again because he we know he reveals the truth. And so, we hold onto his word.

The cross signifies another return: the return to heaven, the return to the gift Jesus has given us, which is his very self. The dove signifies the gift of the Holy Spirt, our Advocate, who descends upon us in our baptism, giving us a place to belong, to gather and worship. We have a place to go to satisfy the longing to share our life with God. Christ brings us home.

Saint Ambrose said there are two conversions: "water and tears: the water of Baptism and the tears of repentance." The link, of course, is Christ, who turns our tears of sorrow to tears of joy knowing we don't have to stay away from God. God reveals within us a way to be, and we can always come home to God to experience him in the place we know he's present. So we hold onto his word, onto the cross, and onto the Spirit that gives us life.



Inner Soul-itude

Spiritual Direction - Soul Companion
Is spiritual direction for you? Try it during Lent 2022
Are you seeking ways to intentionally grow and deepen your faith with a trained spiritual companion?

Sometimes, in spite of a healthy spiritual life that you have developed, you get stuck. Perhaps you lose focus because life has gotten so busy and demanding that you find it hard to hear God speak to you. It may be that you are experiencing a particular struggle in a relationship or an issue at work, and you are uncertain about the right thing to do. Or maybe you simply have a deep hunger for God, and what you are currently doing to nurture that hunger seems inadequate.

In spiritual direction the spiritual director does <u>not</u> tell the directee what to do. They act more like a spiritual mid -wife, helping the directee to "give birth" to the new person they want to become in Christ by:

- 1. **listening deeply to the directee**, to the hopes, curiosities, longings, joys, disappointments, confusions, sufferings, and sorrows that are being experienced.
- 2. assisting the directee in listening to the Spirit and helping them him distinguish the voice of the Spirit from other voices vying for attention;
- 3. **and walking with the directee** as they continue to discern their relationship with God and God's will for their life as events and relationships unfold. thus bringing about inner solitude within the sacredness of their own life.



5 Red Flags in Relationships

"In relationships, red flags are signs that the person probably can't have a <u>healthy relationship</u> and proceeding down the road together would be emotionally dangerous," explains <u>Dr. Wendy Walsh</u>, PhD, a clinical psychologist specializing in relationships.

Note that <u>red flags in a relationship</u> might not be obvious. While some are very clear, many might present more as a clue or a hint that there's an underlying problem. Also, it can take some time for a red flag to present itself in a relationship.

Alcoholism & Drug Addiction - If alcohol or drugs are impacting your partner's life in a negative way—be it their work, health, or relationships—that is a <u>sign of addiction</u>. Similarly, if your partner relies on substances to get through the day, week, or a tough situation then that's indicative of addiction and signifies they haven't yet figured out <u>how to cope</u> without altering their mental state. <u>Lastly, if substance use ever leads your partner to harm you physically or emotionally, that is a clear sign to walk away.</u>

Violent Displays - Someone who <u>demonstrates violence</u> toward you, loved ones, strangers, and even animals is a serious red flag.

Persistent Jealousy & Distrust - "Another common red flag is jealousy and distrust," says Trueblood. "Often, the red flag of a very insecure partner looks like attentiveness at the start of a relationship, but there's an underlying control problem beneath all the attention. Later in the relationship, it's easier to look back and reinterpret that constant attention or overboard generosity as desperate insecurity."

Controlling Nature - A partner who is controlling in any way likely has deep personal issues they must work on. Rethink your relationship if your partner tries to control who you see, who you talk to, where you go, how you spend your money, what you do online, what your body looks like, what you eat, or even what you wear.

They Give You All Their Time - This red flag can sometimes tie into the last one. When a partner doesn't have other relationships, hobbies, or goals, that is a recipe for an unhealthy, unfulfilling relationship.



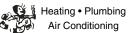
