

## All We Have

Today, the universal Church explores the mystery of the Eucharist in our life. The Church calls it the source and summit of our Catholic faith, precisely because the source is Christ himself.

One of the most meaningful analogies I've heard is that the Eucharist is the heartbeat of the Church. And that would make sense knowing St. Paul's great image of the Church as the Body of Christ. The Eucharist is more than food from heaven, it brings the body of Christ into our very selves. We have the pure gift of being able to share his heartbeat, his presence. Just as Jesus shares fully of himself, it compels us to want to do what we can to help each other.

And so, in the gospel we hear Luke's account of the multiplication of loaves and fish. When Jesus asked his apostles to feed the people, they replied, "Five loaves and two fish are all we have, unless we ourselves go and buy food for all these people" (Luke 9:13).

Jesus, of course, took the five loaves and two fish—what they had—multiplied it and fed 5000 people. To the apostles, what they had seemed too little. "It's all we have." But when Jesus is part of our life, what looks like a little can be multiplied to become more than enough. The Eucharist is meant to fill us, strengthen us, transform our hearts and attitudes, and open our eyes to what we can do to help others. We act through Christ, with Him and in Him.

So, to us, we may not seem like we have enough patience, enough kindness, enough generosity, enough faith or self-control. But to someone in need, they may see it differently. Even if we think it seems like a little, those effected may benefit greatly from what we are able to share and give. And so, we continue to offer it. There would be nothing sadder than to withhold it, giving in to thoughts "it's just not enough." Instead, we give what we can. And it just may end up being more than enough. A Eucharistic faith is routed in making the effort.

### Taking the Eucharist into the Neighborhood



Saturday after the 4:30pm Mass we left Mass following the presence of the Eucharist into the Narthex, out the doors, and right into the neighborhood. Thank you to everyone who made this happen: the parishioners who asked if we could embark on this journey, our choir and musicians, our deacons, our dedicated 4:30pm Mass Coordinators, the art and environment team, our Knights of Columbus who always say "yes" when we need some help, and the police officers from the Village of Hoffman Estates. What a great moment in the spiritual life of our parish!

### A Three-Year Eucharistic Revival

The US Bishops' National Eucharistic Revival begins today and will have a strategic three-year focus: year one will be focused at the diocesan level. In year two the archdiocese will provide opportunities that we can embrace here at the parish level. In year three, all dioceses across the US will come together for a National Eucharistic Congress set to take place July 17-21, 2024 in Indianapolis. Jesus went to those most in need. He forgave the sinner, ate with the outcast, defended, and fed those who were poor and hungry. He worked for true justice, risked being unpopular, willingly accepted suffering and death, and always stayed connected with his Abba, Father. Jesus also consistently reminded folks that God's compassion, love, and mercy trump everything, even the law. This is the Christ that the Eucharist calls us to be. As we look around our churches, our towns and cities, and our world, there are many people who need to see the face and body of Christ. Some of those most in need may be right within our families. But it is always in the poorest of the poor and those most vulnerable that we find the greatest need. There are many who cannot function on their own. When the gift of the Eucharistic Christ takes root in our hearts, we can more readily see the face of Christ in others.

Many people are vulnerable. Highest on that list are the homeless. They show us the face of Christ. Whatever the cause, to have no place to go and no place to call home takes a toll on the human spirit. For Jesus when there were hungry people, they were fed. God asks us to do the same ... feed people. There are many who are hungry physically, emotionally, and

spiritually. Gifted by the Eucharistic presence of Christ, we can bring them Christ. Who are the hungry around us and how can we feed them?

When someone is hurting, you comfort them. When someone is hungry, you feed them. When someone needs clothes, you provide them. When someone is cold, you warm them. When someone is in prison, you visit them. With over a million people who are homeless and over a quarter of them children, it is important to ask the question, "why?" and strategize for ways to lessen or alleviate the problem. Nevertheless, we are not off the hook for responding to the immediate needs that present themselves at our doors. Whether a person's current station in life is self-imposed or the result of being victimized, they are sacred vessels. We cannot lock the door and send them away and still believe we bear the Eucharistic presence of Christ. It doesn't work like that. ©LPi

## Rolling the Dice on the Gospel

They hadn't understood about the loaves! The Gospels use those words to describe the crowd that Jesus had miraculously fed with five barley loaves and two fish. They ate, but they didn't understand. What didn't they understand?

This is the story: Jesus had been preaching to a large crowd, several thousand people. But they were in a remote place and, after a time, the people had been without food for a long time. They were hungry, so famished in fact that they lacked the strength to return to their own towns and villages. The disciples approached Jesus and asked him whether they should go into the neighboring towns and buy food for the crowd. Jesus told them instead to feed the people themselves. They protested that they had too little food, almost none. Jesus asked them what they in fact did have. Their answer: "Only five barley loaves and two fish." And this came with a question: What good is that among so many? The equation is hopeless: so little food, so many people.

And so Jesus asked them to bring the loaves and fish to him. He blessed the food and asked the disciples to distribute it among the hungry thousands. We know the rest of the story: They set out the food; everyone ate as much as he or she wanted, and they gathered up twelve baskets of scraps left over afterwards. And the crowd was impressed, so much in fact that the next day they followed Jesus around the lake, hoping for another such feeding. Jesus, for his part, was saddened by their lack of understanding: They hadn't understood about the loaves.

What hadn't they understood? Two things:

First: When the disciples initially approach Jesus and ask him whether they should go into the neighboring towns and buy bread, their question betrays that they are unaware that they are with the bread of life. They are in the presence of that which is the object of all the world's hungers and which, in its bounty, is unlimited and infinite. Yet they want to go off and buy food elsewhere. The lesson: When you are with the bread of life there is no need to go off to buy food, or anything else, elsewhere! You have all the resources you need to feed every kind of hunger. The disciples' wanting to go off to buy food elsewhere betrays their lack of awareness of this. They didn't see the incongruity, the irony, in their request: Jesus is the bread of life, food for the life of the world, and they ask him if they should go off elsewhere to buy what is needed to feed the crowds.

The second thing they didn't understand was the meaning of the equation: so little food, so many people. A few small loaves of bread and a few fish are hopelessly inadequate to feed a crowd of thousands. It goes against common sense to put such a pathetically meager fare before so many people. How can five loaves and two fish feed a crowd of thousands?

Sometimes well-meaning homilists have tried to explain what might have happened by suggesting that Jesus' invitation to share drew out from the people the privately guarded resources of food that each had brought and, when everyone shared what he or she had, all were fed and there was food to spare. Such a homily has its own good lesson, but the point of the story is precisely the hopelessness of the equation. In essence, the resources of the Gospel always seem hopelessly dwarfed by the world's power, the world's hunger, the world's sin, and the resources that the world itself seems to offer.

Five loaves and two fish set out to feed a crowd of thousands is the Gospel equivalent of the famous story in the Jewish scriptures of the young shepherd boy, David, standing before the giant, Goliath: A young boy, barefoot, holding a boy's plaything, a slingshot, standing before a giant, a trained soldier, clothed in iron, with a sword-bearer carrying his weapons, is also a hopeless equation: So little power against so much strength. But the young boy triumphs because God is on his side. It's the same with the loaves and the fish.

What do we need to understand about the loaves? We need to understand that we are with the bread of life, everything we need to feed the world we already have. We don't need to go anywhere to buy anything. We have the resources already; though on the surface those resources will always look over-matched, hopeless, dwarfed, nonsensical, wishful thinking. On the surface, invariably, we will look like David before Goliath, puny and pathetic, not up to the task of defeating a giant or feeding a hungry, greedy world.

The challenge is to roll the dice on the reality of the Gospel. The Gospel works! It is adequate to the task, both of feeding the world and defeating the giant. It only needs to be trusted

## Renew My Church: The San Damiano Cross Keeps Our Focus

Praying before the San Damiano cross, St. Francis of Assisi heard Jesus call to him: "Go repair my Church, which, as you see, is falling completely into ruin."

At first, St. Francis initially took this to mean he was to repair the church buildings of San Damiano. However, he eventually discerned that Jesus was calling him to rebuild the spiritual life and vitality of the entire earthly Church. Likewise, we must see that the future of the Catholic Church is bigger than any of our parish buildings.

This icon of Jesus helps us remain focused on three very important realities as we renew our faith lives, parishes and the archdiocese:

1. It portrays Jesus speaking to us even though he is dying, which serves as a reminder that we need not be afraid to take up this work even if it costs us something, for Jesus is with us always.
2. Jesus is surrounded by others, highlighting the fact that, as we take up the challenge of renewal, our unity should not be diminished but strengthened.
3. Jesus is also featured as the Risen One at the top of the cross - a sign of hope to us that in this renewal, which will require us to die to ourselves and familiar patterns, Jesus is offering us new life and vitality for the future.

Allow the image of St. Francis hearing Christ call to him from the San Damiano cross to guide your own prayer for Renew My Church as we take up the work of renewal together.

## CHILDREN'S MINISTRY OF INITIATION (CMI)



Whether your family is just entering the Church or returning to the practice of the Catholic faith, all are welcome to inquire about sacramental preparation through the OCIA Process, formally known as RCIA.

This is the process by which unbaptized young people of the age of reason come into The Church. (Infant Baptism is only for those children under the age of reason.) Older children who are already baptized, but who are un-catechized, can also prepare to celebrate the sacraments of Confirmation and Holy Eucharist together with their peers during the Easter Vigil or at a Rite of Full Communion.

The following is the criteria for attendance for CMI:

- **Unbaptized** children over the age of 7 who wish to learn more about the Catholic Faith and, possibly, become Catholic.
- **Baptized Christian Children** from other denominations who would like to learn more about the Catholic Faith and, possibly be received into, the Catholic Church.
- **Baptized Catholics** who would like to prepare for Eucharist and Confirmation by renewing their understanding of their Catholic Faith.


