

## Resting

We just concluded the “trifecta” of feasts: Pentecost, Holy Trinity, and Corpus Christi. And now, we ease back into a season called “Ordinary Time,” a time simply of walking with Christ, learning from him, watching him, and listening to him. He inspires us to bring God into the everydayness of ordinary life.

Summer can be a time to slow down a bit more and rest when things do get more ordinary. I remember as a kid having lazy days when my friends and I would lie in the grass to rest and take some time to watch the clouds roll by.

In the gospel today, we’re blessed to hear about three people who consider following Christ on his journey to Jerusalem, but Jesus realistically has them stop and think about it because it requires a full dedication to being able to put Christ first in our lives.

Jesus even told one of them that a life with him is a life on the move. He said, **“Foxes have dens and birds of the sky have nests, but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head”** (Luke 9:58).

When I served on the staff at the college seminary, each year our seniors would offer a reflection about how they grew during their time with us. It was one of the things I looked most forward to and valued. One of the seniors (now a Chicago priest!) chose this scripture passage about foxes and birds as being particularly important to him. Out of his own compassion and love for Christ, he responded to Jesus by saying “if you have nowhere to lay your head, what about me? You can rest with me.”

I will always hold onto that because I think it’s the perfect response of a disciple. Following Jesus isn’t meant to preoccupy us on what we *might* face in life because many times it is out of our hands. Instead, following Christ is being with Christ. It’s not worrying about the what ifs, but knowing we’re with the One who won’t abandon us no matter what we face. It’s being vulnerable and opening our hearts to him wherever we go. And then, at the end of the day when everything is through, simply inviting him to rest with us.

Jesus’ invitation is to be with him. I’m always uplifted when people tell me “I pray throughout the day” or “I talk to Jesus all the time.” Our prayer doesn’t have to be about the quantity of time we spend (for busy people with no time, that can even deter us from praying). Instead, it’s the quality of time. It’s that desire to connect with the living God who is there for us. One of the simplest prayers is just three words long: “I love you.” Those are powerful words, and if you’ve ever said it to someone, you know the significance of it when we really mean it.

Saint Augustine once said: “Our hearts are restless, O God, until they rest in You.” When Jesus is looking for a place to rest his head, why not offer him ourselves? Following Christ doesn’t have to be complicated. It’s as simple as resting in the One who gives us peace.

And to another he said, “Follow me.” In every moment of every day, in every circumstance and experience, God is calling us. We can easily get distracted and not hear it or simply ignore it, pretending it wasn’t even heard. When we do hear it and favorably respond, there are some conditions that must be met. Jesus makes it clear that once we say yes to his invitation, we must stay focused and forge ahead. We cannot keep looking behind or worry about unfinished business. There are some tasks, and discipleship is one, that require our full devotion.

There are many “masters” vying for our attention. We need something or someone to give us direction. Human nature requires it. Our motives and actions reveal what has our allegiance. It is tempting to give ourselves to masters that lure us with intriguing promises. When given the choice between a “master” that promises worldly success, abundant wealth, status, privilege, and security versus a “master” that asks for self-sacrifice, hardship, suffering, ridicule, and death, to whom do we go? While the

promise of immediate pleasure is enticing, there is always a catch. For all that secular masters can promise, they always keep us looking behind, checking on ourselves, second guessing choices, calculating options, and being slaves to excessive worry. Our guard can never come down. Only one master really promises life: Jesus Christ. Hearing his call, we either trust him or we don’t.

Saying yes to following Christ does come with a risk. But it also comes with the brightness of future hopes and dreams. There is no need to keep looking behind. Sins are forgiven and regrets serve no effective purpose. God is not there. He’s moved beyond all that stuff. God is in the today and the tomorrow and what he can continually do with our daily affirmation to follow Him. All we need to do is be obedient. St. Gianna Molla is credited with saying, “The stillness of prayer is the most essential condition for fruitful action. Before all else, the disciple kneels down.” Begin with prayer. We will not only hear God’s call but find the courage to trust that He will guide us where we need to be. God uses us in the most ordinary of ways through the simple daily expression of our lives.

## The Loneliness of Leaving Home

Among the kinds of loneliness that afflict us, there's one we don't often recognize and deal with very well, the loneliness of moving on. There's a loneliness that comes with leaving home, with forever losing loved ones, loved places, and loved things.

Home, T.S. Eliot says, is where we start from. But we never get to stay there for long. Neither does anyone else. From the time we're born until we die, we, and everyone else, are on the move. People, places, things, organizations, and knowledge are passing through our lives in a way that is forever cutting away at our roots, destabilizing us, and leaving us scrambling to find a home.

Finding a home is not, in the end, so much a question of finding a building, a city, a country, or a place where we feel we belong. That's part of it. More deeply, finding a home is a question of moral affinity, of finding another heart or a community of hearts wherein we feel at one, safe, warm, comfortable, able to be ourselves, secure enough to express both faith and affection. To find a home is to feel what Adam felt when he first saw Eve: "At last, bone from my bone, flesh from my flesh!" That's not so much an expression of sexual attraction as it is of moral comfort. What Adam sensed in Eve, that he didn't sense in the rest of creation, was a home.

We go through life lonely, looking for a home, aching to stand one day before some person, some place, some truth, or some family and, like Adam, realize that this, among all the others, is what we are looking for - "At last, bone of my bone!" But how to find that? Where is home?

Everywhere and nowhere, it would seem. There's an incident in the gospels where Jesus tells us where home is. He's seated among a circle of disciples when someone comes to him and says: "Your mother and brothers and sisters are outside asking for you!" Jesus' response is a curious one. No doubt, he loved his mother and his relatives; yet he doesn't get up and go out to them. Instead he says: "Who is my mother? Who are my brothers and sisters?" Pointing to those around him, he says: "Here are my mother and my brothers. Anyone who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother."

By saying this, Jesus is not distancing himself from his natural mother, Mary, since she, in fact, among all the people around him, is the one who most truly fits the description for discipleship that he has just laid down. She, more than anyone else, did the will of God. What Jesus is doing is redefining what makes for family, for home, for homeland.

Normally we define family by blood-ties, common ancestry, ethnicity, language, skin-color, gender, nationality, or geography. Blood, we say, is thicker than water. But, according to Jesus, the waters of baptism and faith are thicker even than blood. A shared faith, more than a shared blood, ethnicity, language, skin-color, religion, gender, or geography, is what makes for a family. Faith is what ultimately gives you a home, a homeland, a nationality, a mother-tongue, a skin-color, and a family that is lasting.

Simply put, when we share a common faith we find ourselves within a community of hearts that is our true country; when we speak the language of faith we have a common language that is understood by all; and when, as Jesus challenges us to, we are willing to sacrifice some of our blood in love, we help create the real blood that makes for one family - Bone from my bone, flesh from my flesh!

Home is where the heart is. Jesus would agree with that. But in his view of things, what ultimately draws the heart and makes for family are not the historical accidents of birth, biology, ethnicity, language, gender, and geography. Family that lasts is constituted not by biology but by faith. In another incident in the gospels a woman says to Jesus: "Blessed is the womb that bore you and the breasts that nursed you!" In today's idiom, she's saying: "You must of had a wonderful mother!" Jesus' answer: "Blessed rather are those who hear the word of God and keep it!" He's saying: "Yes, I had a wonderful mother, more wonderful than you imagine; but she didn't just give me biological birth, she gave me faith!"

We come into this world as a stranger and some people pick us up and make us part of their family. In faith, that happens again, except our new family is bound together by something beyond blood, ethnicity, and geography, and so it outlives these.

There's a loneliness that comes with leaving home. Something always stays behind, and even that doesn't stay the same. But there's an answer to that loneliness, a new home inside a community of faith.

## Renew My Church: What is it? Why are we doing it?

Our parish, like all parishes of the Archdiocese of Chicago, is participating in a process of renewal called Renew My Church. Pope Francis calls for the Church to look outward and to reach beyond herself, as she seeks to bring Christ to the world. Every day, we see signs of pain and immense suffering even in places where we used to find comfort. We are called to be witnesses to the new life and new possibilities that God offers us in the death and resurrection of His Son. We must always turn back to Jesus Christ who is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. It is through our personal encounters with Jesus in His community of disciples and His Church, where we will find healing, forgiveness, and possibilities for the new life that God offers us.



Every generation experiences challenges in faith. Today, secularism seems to have pushed God out of the picture. Our culture promotes individualism and faith in ourselves rather than belief in God. This individualism leads to breakdowns in family life, respect for life, and a whole host of social ills. We need healing and redemption in Jesus Christ now more than ever.

Today, many people do not know Jesus Christ and often reject Him and His Church without knowing who He really is. Even many believers in the Church have a weak sense of who Jesus is and what it means to follow Him as a disciple.

- Mass attendance in our archdiocese has decreased by 27% over the past 20 years
- 36% of millennials claim no religious affiliation
- One in 5 children baptized Catholic do not receive 1<sup>st</sup> Communion
- 85% of eighth graders stop practicing their faith by age 21

We cannot assume that faith will automatically be handed on to a new generation. We must proclaim the Gospel in new ways; to renew the Church.

What a wonderful gift we have as Jesus invites us to renewal. The Lord of the universe speaks these words to us just as he spoke them to the saints before us. It seems like a tall order to renew the Church. Isn't that someone else's job? Our own little parish, maybe. But, the whole Church? Yes. And we will, because renewal always, always, always begins within our own hearts.



### AMI Companion

One of the most important elements of the OCIA (RCIA) process is the role of the "companion".

A companion is a practicing Catholic who provides a supportive presence to someone preparing to receive the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and Eucharist.

The companion does not have to teach; they simply make the commitment to attend the OCIA learning sessions and liturgical celebrations. The only requirement is faith and a welcoming attitude.

## Introducing the new Parish Social Outreach Ministry

In the Gospel of Luke, Jesus reads this passage: *“The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free...”* (Luke 4:18-19).

That, in a nutshell, is the Lord’s mission. And Jesus is telling us that this is our mission, as well. We must apply the Lord’s teachings and put these into practice. It’s all about recognizing and using the gifts and talents that God gave us for the good of others and to share Jesus with others.

A few months back, I began looking at how to re-energize our peace and social justice activities at the parish. I’ve been working with our various **Community Outreach** ministries, and we’ve formed a new group called the **Parish Social Outreach Ministry**. Our focus will be on these four ministry areas:



1. Direct service
2. Legislative advocacy
3. Global solidarity
4. Community organizing and development.

All our activity will be reinforced through formation and education in Catholic Social Teaching. What is Catholic Social Teaching? Catholic Social Justice teaches us that all people are made in the image of God and so possess an equal and inalienable worth. Because of this essential dignity, each person has a right to all that is needed to allow him or her to live their full potential as God intended. It applies the Gospel values such as love, peace, justice, compassion, reconciliation, service, and community to address modern social problems.

Some of the things we’re looking into will be providing direct service to those suffering the pain of poverty, striving to eliminate the evil of racism, working with the imprisoned, educating one another on the need to carry out the principles of Catholic Social Teaching through our parish activities, and so much more.

We are just starting out on what will be a long journey - and there is so much that needs to be done. But we cannot do this alone. I strongly encourage you to look into our **Community Outreach** ministries at the parish and get involved. We need to have this entire Body of Christ helping us out to make this a reality.

In the coming weeks, we will be providing more information on the 7 Themes of Catholic Social Teaching and how our parish is responding to each of these themes.

Just as Jesus proclaimed, each one of us is being called to be Jesus to the world: so that the poor will know the good news, that the captives will be rescued, that the blind will see, and the oppressed will be freed. And we do this by using our God-given gifts and talents and by working together.

Adult Ministry of Initiation (AMI) may be the place for you!

We follow the OCIA process, formerly known as RCIA. OCIA stands for the Order of Christian Initiation of Adults and it is the process through which people join or complete their initiation into the Catholic Church.

The OCIA process is an opportunity for those who have never been baptized, or baptized with little or no affiliation or religious training in the Catholic religion, to learn and ask questions about the Catholic faith. This includes those who may have been baptized Catholic, but have not yet received their First Communion or Confirmation.

Sometimes after the information meetings, prayer and reflection, participants choose to begin the process for becoming Catholic, or coming into full Communion with the Church. It is important to note; however, that no commitment is expected of participants at this time.

We are scheduling interviews for those thinking about joining the Catholic Church or Adult Catholics wishing to complete the Sacraments of Initiation.

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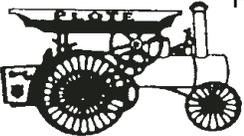
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
