

## The Narrow Gate

Jesus will urge us today to “Strive to enter through the narrow gate, for many, I tell you, will attempt to enter but will not be strong enough” (Luke 13:24). He is talking about a life in God, which is meant to last forever. What can get in the way of that? What can make us weak? Well, “stuff.”

Scholars tell us the image of the narrow gate would have resonated with Jesus’ followers. In Jesus’ day, there were walls around cities and gates to enter. There typically was a main gate where caravans of camels and livestock and baggage would be brought into the city. To accommodate the traffic (and all the possessions) it was very wide.

However, there were also narrow gates for fast entry where travelers could enter the city pretty quickly. (If you’ve done any travelling through airports these days, it’s kind of like going through the TSA pre-approved security screening vs. the traditional one that has long lines and takes forever.) The narrow gates in ancient cities were too narrow for camels and lots of stuff to pass. But if you didn’t have much baggage—a lot of “stuff”—then that was the way to go.

It’s an analogy for the spiritual life that we’ve been hearing all throughout the summer. The key to a healthy spiritual life is to “travel lightly.” It’s to only take with us what we truly need, which is our trust God, and leave behind the material things that can bog us down. We can learn from the airlines here, too. Let’s limit our baggage to one carry on. It’s an easier way to travel.

A life in Christ is meant to free us, because we’re meant to give away the intangibles that make a difference in life: goodness, kindness, faithfulness, belief in humanity, and acts of charity. Giving those things away frees us and helps us focus on what, deep down, we know is important: not the things we possess or carry around, but the people with whom we live life.

The narrow gate is really an image of simplicity, freedom, and a way to get to our final destination.

## A Renew My Church Update

**Fr. Jeremy Thomas** of Church of the Holy Spirit, **Fr. Tony Bury** of St. Marcelline, **Fr. Joseph Glab** of St. Matthew and I met with Fr. Jason Malave of the Renew My Church team for two afternoons this week to go through the Priest Leadership Program. It was a way to come together and talk about the needs, hopes and desires of our four parishes as we enter into the Renew My Church Process. It was a real blessing, but not something new to the four of us. Throughout the past year we’ve been meeting socially each month to get to know each other better, to talk about our parishes, and to build relationships.

On Thursday, all the pastors of the final wave of Renew My Church parishes (about 10 in all) met with Cardinal Cupich to hear his perspectives. Later that day, all of our parish’s “Grouping Feedback and Discernment Teams” (the teams that represent our parishes) met online with the Cardinal to pray with him and talk about the important task ahead.

Our first meeting of the four parishes will be Monday, August 22. The official name of our grouping is “**The Hoffman Estates-Schaumburg Community**”. We will keep you posted as we go through the process—something we do together as a community of faith. Please be sure to join us for the Saint Hubert Town Hall Meeting on September 26 to learn more about our discussions. In the meantime, let’s continue to pray for and with each other.

## WORLD MISSION Sunday

This weekend we are hosting Sister Helen Murage, S.M.I from the Sisters of Mary Immaculate of Nyeri, who is speaking at all Masses.



Sisters of Mary Immaculate of Nyeri is a women religious community that was founded in Kenya by Bishop Filipo Perlo and three founding members in 1918. In founding the congregation, Bishop Perlo, an Italian missionary, believed that anyone who would become part of the new community would walk in the footsteps of Jesus Christ in caring for the poor, the needy, and the suffering. Today, more than 400 sisters actively serve in teaching, healthcare, pastoral care, and a variety of social ministries in Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, Zambia, Italy and the U.S.

In Kiamumbi – one of Nairobi's outlying neighborhoods – children live in squalid slum conditions and are often orphaned, neglected and abused. For this reason, Maria Immaculata Children's Education Center serves as a beacon of hope. Founded in 1997 by the Sisters of Mary Immaculate, this combined home and school helps the area's neediest children grow into healthy, productive members of society. Its mission is to instill moral and spiritual values through care, encouragement, education and community intervention. 

The serious disciple knows the necessity and value of discipline. Thinking of discipline as something punitive in nature, we underscore its place in our spiritual lives. Discipline is really about a radical trust in God and his guidance. “When you are conducted by a guide who takes you through an unknown country at night across fields where there are no tracks, by his own skill, asking no advice from anyone, giving no inkling of his plans, what choice do you have but to give yourself completely to his guidance? If you are convinced that he is a good guide, you must have faith in him and abandon yourself to his care (Jean-Pierre de Caussade).”

If someone wants to be physically fit, they readily find a competent trainer who sets them on a rigorous schedule. Determined to reach their goals, they sacrifice personal pleasure and trust in his guidance. Why should it be any different with God? In order to remain true to the way Jesus places

before us, we have to listen, learn, and be willing to change. Falling in love with God and maintaining that relationship requires an investment of time, energy, and hard work. Putting personal preferences aside in pursuit of the Gospel and giving proper attention to our spiritual lives is challenging work. At first, “all discipline seems a cause not for joy but for pain, yet later it brings the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who are trained by it (Hebrews).”

“What God does is essentially good. It does not need to be reformed or controlled...If you would live according to the Gospels, give yourself completely and simply to the action of God (Jean-Pierre de Caussade).” Submission to the holy will of God is not a submission to a set of pre-ordained set of circumstances. Rather, it is an abandonment and trust in God’s creative, life-giving, and salvific power. God brings light out of darkness and life out of death. Nurturing this bond of trust and seeking God in all things creates an intimate and particular relationship and bond between our Creator and us. When He comes, there will be no issue with us recognizing Him or Him recognizing us. We will have met before.

## What is Your Practice?

Today, the common question in spiritual circles is not, “What is your church or your religion?” But, “what is your practice?”

*What is your practice?* What is your particular explicit prayer practice? Is it Christian? Buddhist? Islamic? Secular? Do you meditate? Do you do Centering prayer? Do you practice Mindfulness? For how long do you do this each day?

These are good questions and the prayer practices they refer to are good practices; but I take issue with one thing. The tendency here is to identify the essence of one’s discipleship and religious observance with a single explicit prayer practice, and that can be reductionist and simplistic. Discipleship is about more than one prayer practice.

A friend of mine shares this story. He was at a spirituality gathering where the question most asked of everyone was this: what is your practice? One woman replied, “My practice is raising my kids!” She may have meant it in jest, but her quip contains an insight that can serve as an important corrective to the tendency to identify the essence of one’s discipleship with a single explicit prayer practice.

Monks have secrets worth knowing. One of these is the truth that for any single prayer practice to be transformative it must be embedded in a larger set of practices, a much larger “monastic routine”, which commits one to a lot more than a single prayer practice. For a monk, each prayer practice is embedded inside a monastic routine and that routine, rather than any one single prayer practice, becomes the monk’s *practice*. Further still, that monastic routine, to have real value, must be itself predicated on fidelity to one’s vows.

Hence, the question “what is your practice?” is a good one if it refers to more than just a single explicit prayer practice. It must also ask whether you are keeping the commandments. Are you faithful to your vows and commitments? Are you raising your kids well? Are you staying within Christian community? Do you reach out to the poor? And, yes, do you have some regular, explicit, habitual prayer practice?

What is my own practice?

I lean heavily on regularity and ritual, on a “monastic routine”. Here is my normal routine: Each morning I pray the *Office of Lauds* (usually in community). Then, before going to my office, I read a spiritual book for at least 20 minutes. At noon, I participate in the Eucharist, and sometime during the day, I go for a long walk and pray for an hour (mostly using the rosary as a mantra and praying for a lot of people by name). On days when I do not take a walk, I sit in meditation or Centering prayer for about fifteen minutes. Each evening, I pray Vespers (again, usually in community). Once a week, I spend the evening writing a column on some aspect of spirituality. Once a month I celebrate the Sacrament of Reconciliation, always with the same confessor; and, when possible, I try to carve out a week each year to do a retreat. My practice survives on routine, rhythm, and ritual. These hold me and keep me inside my discipleship and my vows. They hold me more than I hold them. No matter how busy I am, no matter how distracted I am, and no matter whether or not I feel like praying on any given day, these rituals draw me into prayer and fidelity.

To be a disciple is to put yourself under a discipline. Thus, the bigger part of my practice is my ministry and the chronic discipline this demands of me. Full disclosure, ministry is often more stimulating than prayer; but it also demands more of you and, if done in fidelity, can be powerfully transformative in terms of bringing you to maturity and altruism.

Carlo Carretto, the renowned spiritual writer, spend much of his adult life in the Sahara Desert, living in solitude as a monk, spending many hours in formal prayer. However, after years of solitude and prayer in the desert, he went to visit his aging mother who had dedicated many years of her life to raising children, leaving little time for formal prayer. Visiting her, he realized something, namely, his mother was more of contemplative than he was! To his credit, Carretto drew the right lesson: there was nothing wrong with what he had been doing in the solitude of the desert for all those years, but there was something very right in what his mother had been doing in the busy bustle of raising children for so many years. Her life was its own monastery. Her practice was “raising kids”.

I have always loved this line from Robert Lax: “*The task in life is not so much finding a path in the woods as of finding a rhythm to walk in.*” Perhaps your rhythm is “monastic”, perhaps “domestic”. An explicit prayer practice is very important as a religious practice, but so too are our duties of state.

## Renew My Church: The Journey of Renewal

At the heart of our Renew My Church efforts is the renewal of vital, sustainable parishes that have the leadership, resources, and vision necessary to create an effective culture of evangelization that makes disciples, builds communities and inspires witness.

This requires prayerful discernment and challenging conversations on our part. It also necessitates great trust that Jesus, our Good Shepherd, will lead us to where He wants us to go.

Our parish is working with Church of the Holy Spirit, St. Marcelline, and St. Matthew as one group to discern and provide input into how we can best structure our parishes and ministries to make disciples, build community, and inspire witness. Together, we are working through stages on a shared journey of renewal:

**Discernment & Decisions:** This is the phase we are starting now. The Grouping Feedback and Discernment Team (GFDT) will reflect upon potential scenarios of how our local parishes and schools may be organized differently in the future and develop potential ideas to achieve the mission imperatives. This stage concludes when Cardinal Cupich makes his final decisions regarding any structural changes affecting the grouping.

**Building the New Reality:** This is where the exciting work really begins. The grouping will focus its efforts on vibrantly living out the three imperatives. At the core will be a culture of evangelization that supports the work of making disciples, building community, and inspiring witness. This will be a journey over the next several years in our parish.


