Staying Grounded

The readings today help us focus on the virtue of humility. I had a wise spiritual director when I was in the seminary who helped me see that humility isn't about a lack of being assertive, or having to disregard the good traits we've been blessed with, or to resist taking initiative for fear of gaining attention.

Instead, he'd tell me humility is about being grounded. And that makes sense when we look at the root of the word, which in Latin is *humilitas*, which can be translated "from the earth."

That definition has always stayed with me. My spiritual director helped me see that humility accepts the truth of things. In fact, it's about living in the truth. It helps me see that just like everyone, I am blessed with some good talents and traits, but at the same time I know I lack others. And so it helps me see that I don't have to become envious when others excel at something I'm not too good at or to pretend I'm someone I'm really not. As Jesus would say, it's better to be asked by the host to sit in a more prominent place at the table than assume it's ours to take. What's important is being invited to the table no matter where we sit.

Humility is a virtue that helps us realize we don't have to have everything others have or dwell on what we don't have. Instead, we can appreciate the things we do have. Or instead of pretending to be someone we really couldn't ever be, to simply be ourselves—faults and all.

It took me a long, long, long time to understand this, and I have to "school myself" and remind myself time and time again. But it does lead to certain kind of freedom (in fact Webster's defines humility as a freedom—a freedom from pride). The Catholic life moves us to not just dwell on ourselves (even though self-care is very, very important), but to see what others need and to pay attention to those around us. When we're grounded, our feet will be ready to move to go and serve.

A Renew My Church Update



This past Monday, Church of the Holy Spirit hosted the "Grouping Feedback & Discernment Teams" of Saint Hubert, Church of the Holy Spirit, Saint Marcelline and Saint Matthew.

We received an overview of the process and had a chance to talk about the Cardinal's vision, which isn't just to look at how the parishes in our area should be structured, but to also find ways to renew the spiritual life of our Archdiocese. It's to live the primary mission of the Church: to make disciples and build communities that are centered on the gospel.

The Teams will all head here on Monday. We'll be talking about the realities we all face—looking at the strengths and challenges of each of the parishes as well as outside factors and data, things like the census data and trends. After the third meeting on September 12, each parish team will meet with their various leadership councils. Then, we'll bring the discussion to the wider parish at a Town Hall Meeting on Monday, September 26.

In the meantime, as we look ahead, we stay anchored with our feet on the ground. May God continue to nurture us, lead us, guide us and sustain us in all we do.

People who are concerned with their own advancement and agenda have little room for anyone else. With an almost addictive pursuit of esteem and acknowledgment from others, they become little more than entitled embodiments of the vice of pride. Public humiliation or embarrassment can hit them hard. While avoiding humiliation and embarrassment may be advantageous to obtaining worldly success, they are much less desirable motivations for entering the Kingdom of God. Avoiding embarrassment is a self-serving motivation. Pride and all of its manifestations have no place on God’s agenda, neither do worldly success and fulfillment. In fact, we have been clearly told that if we love our lives, we will lose them. Therefore, if you really want to find your true station in life, learn to give yourself away.

While this may sound foolish to secular ears, it actually makes perfect sense. God, who is love, makes each of us in His image. Love, and therefore God, is in our DNA. That being the case, love is never love if it is kept to oneself or hoarded. Love needs to be shared and given away. Therefore, it is the only proper motivation for entering the Kingdom of God. The door to happiness is only opened when we realize that all we are and all we have is due only to God’s grace. Without God we are nothing.

Love is the remedy for pride and protects us from ourselves. God asks us to be humble. Only when we are free from the traps of pride and arrogance that we can begin to follow the path to true humility. Only one who is humble can rightly love and be of service to God. “God makes use only of the humble as his instruments (Jean-Pierre de Caussade).” The humble one does not need others to give them worth and value. Their self-esteem comes from the much more secure foundation of God. Only those who are entirely free can give themselves freely to others. Love must always be our motivation for doing all things. Be content that God has invited you to the banquet of life. Concern yourself with accepting the invitation, and don’t worry about where you will sit.

On Not Faking Humility

It's hard not to fake humility; yet, seemingly, we need to do just that.

For instance, some of the sayings of Jesus on humility seem to raise more questions than they answer. For example, in the parable of taking seats at the table, Jesus suggests that we should not move towards the highest place, lest somebody more important comes along and we will be humiliated by being asked to move lower. Rather, he says, move towards the lowest place so that the host might come and ask us to move higher, and in this way our very humility will be showcased before the other guests. Whoever humbles himself will be exalted, and whoever exalts himself will be humbled. On the surface, this would seem like little more than a strategy to get honored while all the while looking humble.

The biblical invitation to not consider oneself better than others begs the question: Can someone who is living an essentially moral and generous life really believe that he or she is no better than someone who is uncaring, selfish, or even malicious in how he or she relates to God, others, and the world? Do we really believe that we are no better than others? Did Mother Teresa really believe in her heart that she was no better than anyone else? Could she really look at herself and say: "I'm just as great a sinner as there is on this planet?" Or, did she, and must we, in the end, feign humility because we don't really believe that we're no better than what's worst on this planet?

And so we can ask ourselves: Is our belief that we are no better than others, often times, really only a pose, something we have to affirm about ourselves but which doesn't stand the full test of honesty? Further, isn't our humility, in the end, really not just a subtle strategy to be honored in a deeper, more-respected way? Who wants to be seen as proud and full of himself? And, can we ever be humble without then taking pride in that? Do we really believe that we are no better than anyone else?

I'm partial to an insight John Shea once offered in trying to answer this. Looking at some diary entries by Bede Griffiths, where Griffiths openly confesses that he is no better than anyone else, Shea asks whether given the quality of Griffiths' moral and spiritual life and given the depth and compassion he developed through years of prayer and discipline could Griffiths really have believed that he was no better than anyone else? Could he really not compare himself with others? Is it really possible for any of us not to compare ourselves with others?

Shea suggests that the key to those questions lies in looking closely at what Griffiths means when he asserts that he is no better than anyone else. When Griffiths makes those assertions he is not focused on his, or anyone else's, moral actions. At the level of moral actions, it is humanly impossible not to make comparisons. We all make comparisons, even when we deny that we do so. But the roots of humility do not lie in where we stand, above or below, others in terms of our moral actions.

When Griffiths sincerely sees himself and believes himself to be no better than anyone else in this world, he is looking rather at his core, at the depth of his heart, where he sees that he, like everyone else in this world, is vulnerable, alone, fearful, naked, self-centered, inadequate, helpless, contingent, just as much in need of God and others as absolutely every other person on this earth, and, thus, no better than anyone else.

Nobody gives himself life, sustains himself in life, or gives himself salvation. We are all equally inadequate and helpless here. Our contingency levels us all, from Mother Teresa to Hitler, and the key to genuine humility lies in recognizing that. Indeed, the more morally and psychologically sensitive we are, the more likely we are to recognize our neediness and our solidarity in weakness with everyone else. When a Bede Griffiths makes the claim that he is no better than anyone else and that he stands in need of God's mercy just as much as every sinner on earth, he is not faking humility, but he is not making moral comparisons either. He is speaking out of something deeper, namely, the fact that ultimately we are all equally helpless to give ourselves life.

The invitation to humility is a clear and constant echo inside of Christian spirituality, from Jesus, through Bede Griffiths, through Mother Teresa, through every spiritual guide worthy of the name: Become like a little child. Take the lowest place. Never consider yourself better than anyone else. Know that you need God's mercy as much as the greatest sinner on earth. However we don't come to this by comparing ourselves to others, but by recognizing how utterly naked we all stand outside of God's mercy.


Interested in the Catholic Church and becoming Catholic?

FACT: Domestic Violence happens to people of every educational and socio-economic level at the same incidence. Domestic Violence happens in all races, religions and age groups.

Some Domestic Violence Statistics:

- Every 9 seconds in the US a woman is assaulted or beaten.
- Most often the abuser is a member of her own family.
- Domestic violence is the leading cause of injury to women—more than car accidents, muggings, and rapes combined.
- Domestic violence happens to men as well as women
- Studies suggest that up to 10 million children witness some form of domestic violence annually.
- Nearly 1 in 5 teenage girls who have been in a relationship, said a boyfriend threatened violence or self-harm if presented with a breakup.

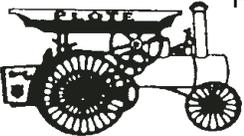
